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
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CDDHS Students honour local veterans

The students are selected in Grade 10, said teacher Neil Orford, and go on a European battlefields tour following two years of research work on a Dufferin veteran. They complete a digital portfolio which becomes part of the record of the Dufferin County Museum, and the students presented those profiles at the reception May 5. Students also raise money for a commemorative brick with the veteran's name to be placed at the Juno Beach Centre in Normandy, France this November at the beach where the Canadians fought on D-Day. The vets could be from any conflict in which Canadian forces served. Cpl. John McMurray, Veteran of the Afghanistan conflict, who is also accompanying the group to the Canadian Battlefields, representing all Veterans of Dufferin County, on behalf of the County of Dufferin & the DCMA.

Although February's audit of fire departments in central and north Dufferin by the Ontario Fire Marshal (OFM) contained 30 recommendations, none criticised the ability of the departments but were generally administrative in nature. Now – three months after the report was released - the discussion has begun as to what to do about the report.

But, at the end of the day, there must be consistency among the municipalities. To some extent, the recommendations could also affect Southgate as it also serves Melancthon. The Rosemont department serves generally Mono and Adjala-Tosorontio.

Mayor Crewson said it appears the only way to meet the OFM's requirements would be to have a full-time person. Before that happens, however, Shelburne's position is that a consultant should be retained to devise ways to meet the requirements.

There have already been discussions among the three mayors with re-

Among the OFM's requirements, firefighters are to lay charges when there are chargeable violations of the municipality's fire bylaw and/or the current fire code. In

the service, and not the responsibility of the fire boards.

"The Fire Marshall's position is that we may choose to use a fire board as the vehicle (to deliver the service), but it is the council's responsibility."

He said the OFM is not requiring implementation of recommendations within a specific time. It could be two years.

Her motion, seconded by then-deputy mayor Sue Snider and approved unanimously in a recorded vote, called among other things for a review and report on fire prevention and protection activities and the current status of buildings "in terms of conformance to the Ontario Fire Code;" development of critical administrative policies, and a training program.

Arrest made after car drags man down street

Shelburne police arrested a man on Sunday, May 12 in connection with an incident May 1 in which a man was dragged 17 metres down a Shelburne street by a car during an alleged argument with the occupants.

On Sunday May 12, Shelburne Police located and arrested 47-year-old Stephen Nicholson of Shelburne. They stated that the man was "on the run" from police since the incident occurred.

Police earlier in the week had located the vehicle used in this offence abandoned near Nottawa.

On May 1, the victim was in an argument with the driver and the occupant of the front passenger seat of the car when the car sped away dragging him for over 17 metres. The injuries suffered by the victim were serious and will leave permanent scars on many parts of his body.

Stephen Nicholson was arrested and charged with the following Criminal Code offences: Dangerous Operation of a Motor Vehicle Causing Bodily Harm, Fail to Stop at Scene of Accident and Drive While Disqualified.

Further, Nicholson was charged with the following Highway Traffic Act and Compulsory Automobile Insurance Act charges: Drive While Under Suspension, Drive Motor Vehicle No Insurance, Plates Unauthorized for Motor Vehicle and Fail to Apply for Permit.

When this incident occurred Nicholson was disqualified from driving due to previous convictions.



NDACT gets Food-Water-First support; More Garbage Bag Debate at County Council

NDACT is not being lulled to sleep by either the Highland Companies withdrawal of the mega-quarry application or by the recent unanimous vote of the provincial Legislature for completion of the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) report and early drafting of the legislation.

Instead, North Dufferin Agriculture and Community Taskforce is pounding the pavement to advance its Food and Water First campaign.

Melancthon Township has agreed to take part, and has a link to the campaign site on its own home page.

NDACT recently was encouraged and grateful that Green Party leader Mike Schreiner and Dufferin-Caledon candidate Paula Conning have signed pledges in support.

Although the ARA review has been undertaken by an all-party committee, there has been no guarantee that any amendments would totally overcome the weaknesses of the present form of foodland protection in both the ARA and Provincial Policy Statement.

The Food and Water First campaign is intended to ensure that there would be no future development on prime farmland (Classes 1, 2 and 3) and that no development should threaten water resources.

NDACT spokesman Carl Cosack said his organization has been asking businesses, ministries and other organi-

DEATH RODAK – John, at Grey zations to include a link to NDACT (www.ndact.com) on their websites. Under present legislation, there is no guarantee that Highland would not resurrect the mega-quarry application.

Shirley Boxam, secretary of NDACT, is urging residents to display Food and Water First signs, much as they did the Stop the Mega-Quarry ones. Mr. Cosack said Ms. Conning and Mr. Schreiner have promised to ask Green Party members to do the same.

"Everyone has to work on a full stomach," said Mr. Cosack in an interview. "Development should not be allowed on prime farmland. There are 127,000 acres a year disappearing. In the '60s, you could look in any direction from the GTA and see open fields; not so in 2013."

He praised Mr. Schreiner and Ms. Conning for their pledges. "It was good of Mike Schreiner to come from Guelph to sign the pledge here. It is great for non-elected to work on the campaign and challenge the elected to support it."

The urgency locally of the campaign is that "Highland still owns 8,000-acres of the rarest agricultural land in the province. Its true intentions for the land and aquifer beneath the fields are unclear. The fight to stop the mega quarry also revealed that while Ontario is home to most of Canada's Class 1 farmland, this land is not protected and constantly

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The provincial urgency, according to Mr. Cosack, is that "agriculture is still the greatest economic driver in the province. It's not just growing the food, but also the processing. There are more food processors here than in any other jurisdiction in North America," he said.

Rhetorically, he asked how many would stay if there were no guarantee that growing food would not continue at its current pace.

In other environmental issues, Shelburne has taken the lead among Dufferin County's municipalities that are introducing mandatory clear garbage bag rules on June 1 by trading clear bags with residents for their leftover green or black ones.

The issue had arisen at county council last Thursday during a raucous session on the use of clear bags, when Wes Cowan of Shelburne asked the council what he would do with a large quantity of green bags he had purchased. Shelburne council followed up on Mr. Cowan's question by voting to replace bags for residents.

Back at county council, for the second meeting in a row, a group of Orangeville anti-clear-bag activists led by town councillor Jeremy Williams proved to be a disruptive presence, often shouting disapproval of council's actions from the gallery and, otherwise, prolonging the question period by making speeches instead of asking questions.

They did succeed in getting approval for there to be two "privacy bags" of up to 22 inches each within the clear bag. That amendment applied county wide. Shelburne Veterans Association has lost its battle to preserve the former hospital as a medical centre. County council has approved a \$3.7-million tender for the conversion to 24 housing units, 10 of which would be "affordable."

Canadians are often reminded of horrific crimes and the dreadful outcomes that can result from them, whether through the news, social media, or in their very own communities.

The recent epidemic of teen suicides following online bullying is just one example. While Canada is regarded as one as the best countries to live, work, and raise a family – there's always more that can be done. Once and for all, the rights of victims need to be held above the rights of criminals.

Our Government is committed to keeping our streets and communities safe. Indeed, our Government has a strong track record of taking real action for victims, including establishing the Office of the Federal Ombudsman for Victims of Crime, creating the Federal Victims Strategy, and eliminating the faint hope clause which prevents convicted murders from applying for early parole.

In late April, our Government launched consultations with victims of crime, victim advocates, and victim-serving organizations to discuss key priorities for the Canadian Victims Bill of Rights. This is in keeping with our Government's plan for safe streets and communities, one of four priorities identified by Prime Minister Harper. The plan includes tackling crime, victims rights, and fair and efficient justice. Online consultations will be open to the public, starting May 1 to June 30, 2013. Anyone who is interested in participating is urged to visit the Department of Justice's website, www.justice.gc.ca, for more information starting May 1, 2013.




NEW WASTE PROGRAM STARTS JUNE 1, 2013


June 1 marks the start of a new curbside collection program in Dufferin County. Keep in mind that starting June 1:

- Blue Boxes, Green Bins and garbage will be collected every week.
- Your current municipal bag limit will remain in effect and be converted to a weekly limit (as opposed to a bi-weekly or yearly limit) where applicable.
- Your collection day may change (see map below).
- Yard waste will now be collected in rural areas on a call-in basis.
- Bulky items and white goods will be collected on a monthly call-in basis for a fee.
- Clear bags will be required for garbage. Each clear bag can contain one small opaque "privacy" bag and garbage can be placed at the curb in a container, if desired.

CAUGHT HEAVEN AND EARTH (by Reverend Barbara Moulton, Faith Community Wesleyan Church)

Spring has finally sprung! And our hearts are glad! We turn our faces to the warmth of the sun and enjoy seeing the earth come to life around us. As the old gospel song says, spring is a "wondrous time."

Last week, as I was turning on to Faulkner from Broadway, I noticed how lovely the spire of Westminster United Church looked against the blue sky, with the budding trees in the forefront. I gazed at the view as I rounded the corner; my thoughts turned towards the heavens. My spirit soared. Fortunately, I did not hit the two pedestrians who were

crossing, because they slowed their pace when they saw my distraction. Embarrassed, I rolled down my window and apologized. They smiled graciously and waved me on.

But as I pulled away from them, I thought to myself that it was a good illustration of the importance of keeping a proper focus in my life. What good would it have been to be inspired by the architecture of a church if it caused me to injure someone?

When I was growing up, the phrase that was often used was that someone was "... so heavenly minded that they are no earthly good." I always thought that was a little harsh, but the sentiment does have some value, in that it reminds us to remain aware of the needs of those around us.

Jesus spoke sternly to those who put the religious life before the needs of others. Whether He was speaking about the Sabbath, the tithe or worship, He had a consistent theme. Things related to our religious life, while not to be neglected, should not become a distraction from (or a substitute for) living out our faith in a life of love and compassion.

We see this in the Epistles

BETWEEN the homeless and loveless in their plight, and guard against corruption from the godless world."

> There was absolutely nothing wrong with noticing the lovely spire. There was nothing wrong in allowing my heart to soar heavenward to God, in the spirit of worship that the view inspired. We need to cultivate a spirit of worship so that our hearts may be attuned to God in every moment. But if we allow ourselves to be so distracted by the trappings of worship that we forget to be alert to the needs of those around us, we have lost our focus.

> There is another truth to live out as well. If we allow ourselves to be so driven by the needs of those around us that we forget the heart of worship, we have also lost our focus.

Albert Orsborn was the sixth General of The Salvation Army, serving from 1946-1954. A hymn writer and poet, he penned these inspiring words:

I must love Thee, love must rule me.

Springing up and flowing forth

From a childlike heart within me.

Or my work is nothing worth. Love with passion and with patience.

Love with principle and fire, Love with heart and mind and utterance,

Serving Christ my one desire.

Orsborn beautifully communicates the truth that loving worship will be reflected in loving action. The tension between things of heaven and things of earth ceases to be when they are bridged by the movement of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

As the Spirit breathes into our worship, we will find our hearts moved to respond to those around us. As we minister in the name of Christ to those around us, we will draw closer to Him in worship.

125 Years Ago

Thursday, May 17, 1888

• The regular monthly meeting of the People's Christian Temperance Union was held in Shelburne Presbyterian Church Monday evening. The newly elected president, Mr. Alex McLachlan, occupied the chair, and addresses were delivered by Revs. McClelland and Abbs. There was a fair attendance and a short program was rendered. Misses Willson and Clarridge sang a duet in their usual pleasing manner and the readings given by Messrs. James Torrance and W. T. Hall were well received. On motion, the name of the society was changed to the "People's Prohibition League of Shelburne" and the regular night of meeting will hereafter be the second Monday of each month. Delegates will be sent to represent Shelburne at the grand Prohibition Convention to be held at Montreal, the first week in July.

• Quite a crowd attended the public meeting of the Young People's Literary Association in connection with the Shelburne Methodist Church last Friday evening. Through the kindness of the officials of the church of the United Brethren, the meeting was held in that church. The programme of the evening was introduced by a duet by Misses Willson and Clarridge, entitled "Beautiful Dove," after which the much talked of spelling match took place. The captains chosen at the meeting - Miss Willson and H. T. Smith – were allowed seven persons each. The words were taken from the Daily Mail and were given out by Dr. C. H. Hamilton, while Rev. George Abbs acted as umpire. The Mail's news and editorial columns were ransacked to puzzle the spellers who, one by one, were lopped off until only one person was left on either side. At length a bright idea struck the Dr. and he proceeded to wade through the patented medicine advertisements, and after steering clear of the doctors jaw-breakers for a time, both spellers came to grief on the same word, and the match accordingly ended in a draw. Smith, editor of the Shelburne Economist, spent considerable time on Tuesday endeavouring to find some good butter in Shelburne, but he failed to find a bit - some offered being almost poisonous — "and if Billy McLean's election in Cardwell will result in bringing good butter out of Mono and stop whiskey from going into it, then we shall support him heartily," said Mr. Smith. • Saturday morning Justice of the Peace J. D. Wilson held court in the council chamber of Shelburne Town Hall. The cases were of a trivial character, and arose from a dispute over the wages of two servant girls, sisters named and Alice and Elizabeth Henderson, who had been in the employ of George Holmes and

George Wilson, living near Corbetton. George Holmes charged Alice Henderson with abusing his wife; he also charged Robert Henderson, brother of the defendant, with abuse and chasing him to Wilson's house; Elizabeth Henderson charged Margaret Holmes with assault and threatening. The Magistrate dismissed all three cases with costs.

• Laurel: We had a light fall of snow on Monday night. Police Magistrate Gray left here on Friday last for Indiana. He had received word that his son, Mr. A. Gray, was very ill and not expected to recover.

The brick work of the Presbyterian Church is almost completed. Mr. John Taggert, of Shelburne, has, we understand, taken the contract for this part of the work. The new Methodist Church will be commenced shortly.

The cheese factory will start running on the 28th, and we hope to see the farmers patronize it as they should do. There is no doubt but that it pays best to send your milk to the factory.

100 Years Ago

Thursday, May 15, 1913

• On Friday May 2, the ratepayers of East Garafraxa Township were asked by their municipal council to endorse a bylaw to provide money for building new bridges over the Grand River by a \$13,000 issue of debentures extending over a period of 20 years. Only 71 voters took the trouble to go to the polls. Of these, 42 marked their ballot for the bylaw, while 29 recorded their votes in opposition. The bylaw was therefore sustained by a majority of 13. The light vote is attributed partly to lack of interest and partly to the fact that farmers being in the midst of their seeding did not care to take time to go to the polls.

• The last toll road in York County has just been sold, says the Toronto Telegram. It belonged to Miss Anna Thorne and her sister, two old ladies who live in Toronto. All motorists who have driven to Barrie will recall the quaint old toll house, burned down last year, which stood to the right of the roadside, just beyond the village of Holland Landing. Here Yonge Street ends its 30-mile length and the portals which bar further progress until the wayfarers have paid tribute to the gatekeeper, give access to a four-mile stretch on to Bradford. Many years ago, in 1866, when the Thorne family, after whom Thornhill was named, lived up Yonge Street, the road in question was granted by the Legislature of that day, to the late owners in perpetuity, they to collect tolls over it in return for keeping the highway in good state of repair, no light undertaking. The road, which is now part and parcel of the King's Highway to the north, commands the whole route of travel along York County's chief thoroughfare. Save by it, one must travel miles out of the way in order to cross the wide stretch of marsh and water at the Holland River. Back in the 1860's it was a very primitive affair, leading over boggy ground through damp swamps and being in the early days of cheap local timber, consructed of planks. Later, sand was dumped in, until in the course of years a firm foundation has been obtained. Orangeville Council has voted to spend \$3,000 to alter and renovate the Town Hall. The building was a good one in its time but has become antiquated. The auditorium in particular has been an eyesore for years and has been the subject of caustic comment from public entertainers who happen to visit the town. • Notwithstanding the fact that two meetings have been called to arrange for the retention of Idylwyld Park as an athletic ground, it is evident no person takes any interest in the matter, says the Orangeville Sun. Last Friday night only four persons turned up at the meeting and, of course, nothing could be done. The mortgage

and interest amount to about \$480, and the property is worth twice that much. "We understand J. Armstrong, who holds the mortgage, has instructed his solicitor to go ahead and sell the property. He has got tired waiting and no one can blame him, as he has given every opportunity to those who wish to redeem the property. The Sun has tried very hard to get this property retained as an athletic park and if the Town doesn't take it over as a last resort, Orangeville will very soon have no suitable athletic grounds."

• This week, the work of tearing down St. Paul's Anglican Church, Shelburne, to make way for a new edifice to be erected on the same site by the congregation, is going rapidly on. The old church was erected about 38 years ago, and two of the men who helped in the building thereof - Messrs. E. Berwick and S. Jelly – are still members of the congregation. Additions were made to the original building at different times. The bell, which was given its farewell toll on Tuesday, and then taken down from the tower, was put in place in June 1882. The bell weighs 416 pounds and was manufactured by Meneely & Co., Troy, N.Y. The money for it was collected by the late George Timbury and his is the only name on the bell. Rev. Mark Turnbull was rector in 1882. The last services in the old building were held Sunday, May 11, and conducted by the rector, Rev. R. J. Seton-Adamson. The new building, which will be of Owen Sound brick, will be T-shape, 66 feet long, 30 feet wide east, and with west wall 45 feet wide, making organ chamber and vestry on each side of chancel. It will have a seating capacity of 165. Underneath will be a basement with Sunday School and Guild rooms and kitchen. The entrance to the church will be through a turreted tower 45 feet high, situated at the southeast corner of the building. From this tower the old bell will again send forth its call to worship. While the work of the building is going on, the church services will be held in the basement of the public library.

• Rosemont: The 4-H Club Girls and their leaders, Mrs. Joanne Irwin and Mrs. Grace Molloy, attended the Summary Day in Shelburne last Saturday. Shirley McDowell, who spoke for the club, was judged the best orator, telling of the work in her group.

The largely attended farm sale for Russell Halbert, had to be postponed because of the downpour of rain which turned into wet snow, making it impossible for the auctioneer and bidders to brave the elements.

Letter from Queen's Park

YOU CANNOT SPEND YOUR WAY OUT OF DEBT

Ten years of Liberal taxing and spending has eliminated Ontario's competitive advantage and has driven business, investments and valuable jobs out of the province. We see this locally as manufacturers have been forced to close their doors or move their operations to another jurisdiction.

Too many Dufferin-Caledon residents are without a job.

On May 2, Finance Minister Charles Sousa presented his first budget in the Ontario Legislature.

Unfortunately, like so many of the other Liberal budgets we have seen, it does nothing to change the direction Ontario is heading and it completely ignores the insurmountable debt Ontarians collectively face. Ontario's debt is now higher than all Canadian provinces and territories combined, doubling from \$139 billion in 2003 to \$273 billion in 2013.

Instead of recognizing the severity of the debt problem and initiating measures to reverse this trend, the Liberal budget proposes to increase spending by \$3.6 billion; including \$1 billion in new initiatives included to gain the support of the NDP.

You cannot spend your way out of debt. This Liberal budget is an exercise in profligacy at the expense of Ontarians, once again, to try and win the NDP's favour in the hopes of avoiding an election. You will recall that the NDP did not support the budget in 2012, instead they abdicated their responsibility and chose to abstain from the vote, allowing the budget to pass.

If the NDP support this Liberal budget by voting in favour or abstaining from the vote, then they are accepting and supporting the Liberal government's reckless spending, the shameful \$585 million wasted on the cancellation of the Oakville and Mississauga gas plants, and complete lack of response to the provincial debt.

Ontario needs a government that has a plan to reduce spending, create jobs and has the courage to make the difficult decisions. The only way to help Ontario become strong again is to set a new course with a new team.

Those who believed that Premier Wynne was going to be different from her predecessor Dalton McGuinty need only study the new spending initiatives her government announced in its budget. Spending has increased by \$3.6 billion; including increases in 2 out of 3 of government ministries. That and new spending initiatives has created a budget deficit of \$11.7 billion. When Don Drummond's report was released in February 2012, it was supposed to be used as a roadmap to begin reversing the tide of overspending. Instead, after investing in the report, the Liberal government is implementing only partial measures that will not come close to solving our debt crisis. The fact is, a child born in Ontario today is saddled with \$20,000 of provincial debt. It is the legacy Dalton McGuinty and Kathleen Wynne have chosen to leave our children and grandchildren to pay.

• The CPR wants to do away with the position of agent-operator at Grand Valley and quotes figures to show the inadequate revenue. Grand Valley Council passed a motion to the effect that: "the Council does not agree with the CPR request to close the station."

• At its May meeting, held at Mono Centre, Mono Township Council decided to change its meeting day from Friday to Saturday for the remainder of 1963, since Reeve Ellwood Madill, Dufferin-Simcoe's new MP, will be at Parliamentary sessions in Ottawa during the week.

• The latest round in the smoking debate at Dufferin County Council saw no changes made to the controversial bylaw. But changes may still be ahead. The bylaw, regulating smoking in public places, became effective March 1, following the achievement of a triple majority vote by municipal councils and County Council to bring the responsibility to the County level.
