

Kyle Charron dominates Shelburne once again

Old Time Fiddle Championship just finished in Shelburne.

This year's Canadian Open Old Time Fiddle Champion, Kyle Charron of Barrie, Ontario, was crowned at the finals on Saturday, August 9.

This was Kyle's fourth Championship. His previous Championships were in 2011, 2009, and 2007 when, at 17, he was the youngest fiddler to ever win the Championship.

The previous holder of that crown Louis

The sun shone on the 64th Canadian Open Schryer, was one of the contest judges in 2007. Award results for all of the competition classes are attached and are also available at www. ShelburneFiddleContest.com. Kyle also won the Canadian Tune of Choice trophy and award with Rose's Swing by Webb Acheson.

With 60 contest entries from as far away as Fairbanks, Alaska, and over 1,500 audience members joining us over the course of the event, another successful edition of Canada's premier fiddle championship has passed into the history books.

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Sandra Gallaugher, Chair of the Shelburne Rotary Club's contest organizing committee, said, "This was a great year for the fiddle contest and we are already getting geared up for the 65th next year – we're going to pull out all the stops. I really want to thank all of our contestants, judges, audience members, sponsors, helpers and supporters for assisting us in making it such a success."

The youngest competitor this year was five year old Bailey Lemelin; the oldest was 84 year old Leon Stachnyk.

The Junior Championship (13–18 year olds) was won by Celine Murray of Dorchester, Ontario, home of the Donnybrook Fiddle and Stepdance Competition. This was Celine's second Junior Championship in a row. Look for her in the Championship Class at future contests.

The Invincible Vince Mountford Memorial Trophy for "Most Entertaining Fiddler" was presented to Duncan McDougall from Uxbridge, Ontario who won the 10-12 Year Class with a great deal of showmanship.

The hat was passed at the Saturday night show to raise money for the Shelburne Food Bank – the collection of \$750 will be matched by the Rotary Club of Shelburne for a total donation of \$1,500.

The traditional corsage presentation, sponsored by the Hardick family, was made to Helen Lyon, who has been at every fiddle contest since 1951.

The Saturday afternoon show at the arena featured The Ballagh Bunch in a crowd pleasing fiddling, stepdancing, and singing show for a crowd of over 250. On Thursday night, the Beckett Family were a huge hit, with a crowd of over 400 treated to a variety of fiddle tunes.

Becketts and Ballaghs - exceptional shows

Watching the Beckett family perform, at the Centre Dufferin Recreation Complex on August 7, it was hard not to feel amazingly lucky to see such talent in small town Ontario. The Becketts are exceptional performers and to watch them

on stage live is something to be remembered.

The Becketts had not been back to perform at Fiddlefest for nearly a decade and John Beckett, who was interviewed for the 50th anniversary documentary on the fiddle contest, commented that it was "a pleasure to come down; it brings back a lot of great memories – we saw a lot of people we hadn't seen in a long time."

The stars of the show, Linsey and Tyler Beckett, are both past fiddle contest winners, and Linsey is an award winning step dancer. The two are also two time Canadian duet fiddle champions and three time Ontario duet champions. Since graduating with a business degree, Tyler has played with Jason McCoy, Jason Blaine and Tara Oram, and with the award winning bluegrass band, The Chapman's. Linsey, who had a smile that lit up the stage, toured with The Don Messer Jubilee Tribute Show starting at the age of 13, performing as the lead in her last year, 2005. In 2009, she began working with the stage production Bowfire, comprised of some of North America's finest violinists, touring across the United States, Mexico, Germany and Canada, including a performance for

Sean Connery's 80th birthday.

The Becketts, who incorporate three generations of the family into the show, have opened for acts like the Barra McNeil's, Natalie Mc Master and Ashley McIssac. It was not so long ago that there were more generations playing great grandfather Elmer Beckett was featured on their first album entitled "Four Generations." Stan Beckett is the grandfather of the family, who sixty years ago, at 18 years of age, was the youngest fiddler in the Shelburne fiddle contest. Stan played fiddle and mandolin Thursday night, never missing a tune, and blended vocal harmonies beautifully with his son John on bass guitar. John, as the lead vocalist, had a warm country tone that delivered old favourites, like his Ray Price medley, to an audience he obviously knew well. The quiet pride both men had in Tyler and Linsey, as they took centre stage, could be felt throughout the room.

The Becketts knew how to shine the spot light on all their band members, which included pianist Mel Aucoine, who had played with Al Cherney; Doug Johnston on steel guitar; Kenny Post on drums; and award winning, lead guitarist Steve Piticco who sang "Chew Tobacco Rag" and Hank Williams' "I'm Satisfied with You." Linsey recently toured Europe and Scandinavia with Steve Piticco and the award winning country group South Mountain. Also featured were two fabulous, young Beckett students, Christian and Gabriel Routenburg-Evans who stepped danced and trick fiddled like professionals.

Every musical number was special, but El Cumbanchero which closed the first set and is featured on their new CD "The View From Here" was a wonderful composition, new to many in the audience; and "The Water is Wide," a number the Becketts dedicated to Mr. Chuck Joyce, whose violin Tyler now plays, was mu-

sic, that like nature itself, could make you weep for its beauty.

August 9th brought another great show to Shelburne as the Ballagh Bunch took their turn on stage. The family, from near Teeswater, includes four musical kids ranging from 14-23: Devan, Michael, Paige and Matthew. For the last decade they have entertained audiences from Disney World in Florida to major festivals and theatres across Canada performing first rate shows built around traditional Irish, Celtic, Scottish and Canadian music. Award winning dancers, as well as talented musicians, the three oldest children, Devan, Michael and Paige have "multiple step dance titles, including the Canadian Open Step Dance Champions in both group and solo classes.

The group, which included Dad, Gary on bass guitar and Mom, Janice on vocals and piano, delivered the energetic excellence they promised, including original songs sung by Paige and Devon "Dancing Shoes," "By the Sea," and "Together." Devon's lovely, high voice filled the arena with the sweet vibrato of the Irish ballad "Homeward Bound" and Paige's deep, rich vocal tones showed her range in the original tunes with a voice that is well on its way to rivalling current pop stars. Both voices were a perfect balance with Mom's harmonies in "Heave on the Bowline." Devon and Paige, both fiddle players, stepped danced to "Jenny's Chickens" and the boys, also excellent dancers and fiddlers, added dimension to the show with Michael on acoustic guitar and Matthew on drums and cajon. A highlight of the show was all four Ballaghs on the fiddle for a beautiful rendition of John Newton's "Amazing Grace." The Rotarians did an amazing favour for Shelburne when they brought both these exceptional shows, The Becketts and The Ballaghs to Fiddlefest.





According to her mother, Michelle Mayo, 14 year old, Nicole Rist-Petrovic always wanted to help others. When Nicole was in the first grade, she learned about "Homeless" people and that year for Christmas, decided to organize 30 bags with toothbrushes, tooth paste, shaving cream, a Christmas card, \$5 phone card, and other much needed essential items that were donated

to her for this reason and she was able to go to Toronto and deliver the bags.

Today the 14 year old has set her sights even higher and now wants to travel to Kenya with the Me To We program, http://www.metowe. com/volunteer-travel, in the hopes of really making a difference to those in need. Rist-Petrovic has many ideas on the subject, "I have attended concerts for the organization and I heard about the program through my school over the years. I'll be carrying water, helping to build a school, and even learning to hunt over a 21 day program. It'll be my chance to learn about another culture, it's so unlike our own. It'll be so different being there instead of watching it on TV. This way I will get to interact."

The desire to go on this journey although admirable, is not cheap. Me To We, being a

non-profit organization, Rist-Petrovic must come up with the entirety of the cost which can eclipse anywhere between \$4000 and \$5000. To offset the cost, Rist-Petrovic, family and friends held a giant yard sale over the passed weekend. Scotiabank jumped in full hands on deck promising to match any money made at the end of the sale. The support was overwhelmingly positive, pulling in a much needed and appreciated, \$2,203.75 and with Scotiabank's contribution, Rist-Petrovic brought in over \$4000 towards achieving her goal.


According to single Mom, Michelle Mayo, her daughter is still shy approximately \$700 and reports that many items from the yard remaining found their way to those who really needed the items, commenting, "It's great when that kind of thing happens. What goes around, comes around, paying it forward. I really can't thanks everyone involved enough. Support from the community was amazing. Some people stopped and just donated without even buying anything. We've always supported Nicole in all her goals and this is no different. She'll be 15 years old when she goes and though I will have little contact, I will receive pictures sent that will likely be three days delayed. I'm very proud of Nicole."

And it seems by the response to the yard sale, Rist-Petrovic's community will be travelling with her to Kenya in supportive spirit.

Fraud alert in Shelburne

Shelburne Police has received several reports of similar fraud schemes from local residents.

In all of these incidents a male calls the victim over the phone and claims to be an employee, security investigator or manager of a local credit union.

The male makes inquiries over the phone about the victims banking practices while explaining he is investigating suspicious activity by a bank employee.

The male then requests that the victim makes a withdrawal from their bank account and meet him with the cash somewhere in town away from the bank. The male promises that all the money withdrawn will be deposited back into the account. The male tries to convince the victim that this strange practice is necessary due to the sensitive internal investigation.

Victims have lost up to \$4200 through this scam.

Shelburne Police are reminding everyone to be extremely cautious when dealing with any financial transactions over the phone, the Internet or with door to door sales people; unless the contact was initiated by the customer through a known and trusted business.

If anyone phones you from a financial institution do not provide any information unless you know the person well or have verified the call. If you have any suspicions hang up and call the financial institution back on their regular phone number (can be found on their website, back of credit or bank cards, yellow pages), or attend the branch in person to verify the legitimacy of the inquiry. A financial institution will never request anyone to withdraw money and meet outside of the financial building.

Always verify with your branch any requests or offers you obtain over the phone, in person outside the branch, or over the Internet. If you can't verify the information be sure to contact police or the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre.

"I love the intensity. You might not get a ball the whole game but you're right in the middle of it the whole time."





"Excuses, we have all heard them and possibly even all used them from time to time. It is our attempt to justify and release ourselves from a particular duty by minimizing the severity of the outcome of not following through." It is nothing new, it dates back to Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, (Genesis 3:8-13.) How easy it is to make excuses and play the age old blame game, it is a human response to avoid responsibility for our actions but God holds us

we should, empower us now to boldly tell of all

accountable. given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." We do not go for Him, but He goes with us into whatever situation He calls us. Moses thought he had many legitimate excuses, he did not feel adequate, he knew he was wanted for murder back in Egypt, he felt he had no authority, he thought no one would believe him, and alas he pointed out that he wasn't good with words, (Exodus 3:13, 4:1, 10-11). God understood and at every excuse He had the perfect reassuring answer and God promised all that Moses would need to accomplish the task, "God said I AM that I AM, I give you authority, I will be with You, I will convince people with signs and wonders, I will send Aaron your brother, (Exodus 3:14-17, Exodus 4:8, Exodus 4:16). Even after all of God's reassurances and promises, Moses still pleaded to send someone else.


