# Long-time Councillor Tom Egan dies at 64

One of Shelburne's long-serving Council members, Councillor Tom Egan passed away surrounded by his family Saturday, July 22, at the age of 64.

Subsequently the flags at town hall were lowered to half-mast.

Tom Egan was first elected to the Town of Shelburne Council in 1998 and has always been re-elected with strong support from residents.

He was an employee of Canadian Tire Acceptance for 24 years, and then for 17 years, an employee of the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Commission (OLG).

Department board since 2002 and was Chair of the Board from 2012 until present.

"Tom contributed a lot, prior to and during, the most recent expansion of the Fire Station," says Town of Shelburne CAO John Telfer.

"We sat on the Canada Day Committee together for 15 years, and he was always a behind-the-scenes kind of guy," Telfer tells us in a recent interview. "He had a good logistic sense of what was right and wrong and didn't think residents needed to be burdened with tons of by-laws. When a new one was introduced it had better have facts backing up why it was needed, or you know Tom would have questions, always wanting to keep the small-town charm

# Egan mourned, Water considered, appointments announced

Monday's Council meeting opened with a moment of silence for recently deceased Councillor Tom Egan, who sadly passed unexpectedly last Saturday morning.

A memorial is scheduled to be held at the Legion this coming Thursday.

## WATER RATES

Andrew Grunda from Watson and Associates Economists Ltd. presented Council with an overview of the company's recently completed Water and Wastewater Rate study, the first such since the original study, from 2011.

The new study shows that Shelburne's current rates, though currently keeping pace with growth and development, will not be sufficient to handle future demands for infrastructure upgrades and expansion to handle projected demands.

The study recommends that, over the course of its ten year projections, both water and sewage rates be increased gradually and the additional funds be held in the Town's reserves for future needs.

Current rates are based on a two part formula, that being a base rate, that is constant and a consumption rate, that varies er. Jennifer Willoughby will assume the with the actual amount used.

opposite will be the case for wastewater charges.

The study was based on the average family in Shelburne, consisting of 2.8 people. Compared to other municipalities with similar figures, the Town was behind some and equal to others in rates.

Over the ten year span of the study, the changes will amount to approximately \$5 per user per month.

Retiring CAO John Telfer pointed out to Council that the study did not nor could it account for the fact that the Town helps to finance infrastructure with various grants, from other areas of government.

Since receiving said grants is not a certainty, they could not be factored into the study. However, if received, they would allow the Town to consider other options, beyond raising rates.

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# What I heard at Changing Workplaces Committee

The Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs Committee has been consulting on the government's recent introduction of Bill 148.

The proposed legislation would make substantial changes to the labour laws in the province of Ontario. The proposed changes include expanding personal emergency leave to 10 days, including two paid days, expanding vacation time, changes to the rules around shifts and changes to the collective bargaining

While these changes are substantial and important, most of the media and public discussion has been focused on a proposed increase to the minimum wage to \$15 an hour by 2019, a 32 per cent increase in 18 months.

The proposed changes in Bill 148 – Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act, 2017 are substantial. Bill 148 passed first reading on June 1st. Understanding that the proposed amendments are significant and include many changes in Ontario labour laws; the Legislative Assembly referred Bill 148 to the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs to hold public hearings over the summer after first reading.

On July 18, I joined the Standing Committee's meeting in Kitchener. I heard from businesses leaders, labour law experts, employees and more. What is clear from these discussions is that the changes proposed are wide-ranging and complex. It reinforces to me several things. First, many businesses are concerned about what the changes will mean to their future.

Many feel that the 32 per cent increase in the minimum wage is coming too quickly. Many businesses felt "blindsided" by the proposal because it was only recently that the government had been defending its plan to tie the minimum wage to inflation, as well as giving businesses ample forewarning of an increase.

Some businesses emphasized that they would love to pay their staff more, but are seriously concerned that they cannot handle such a swift increase. As one presenter put it, "I have to come up with \$1.5 million and I don't really know how I'm going to do that."

Second, it is clear to me that many Ontarians are feeling pressure on their

Life has simply become more unaffordable for many families across Ontario: from hydro rates to housing prices. I heard emotion testimony from individuals who are facing immense pressure to pay the bills.

Finally it is clear that before we move ahead with these changes, the government needs to have an economic impact study so we can know what these changes mean for employees and the businesses they work for. After all, the Premier's own Advisory Panel on minimum wage found that for every 10 per cent you raise the minimum wage, youth employment goes down 6 per cent.

# **Ottawa Journal:** Trudeau's Carbon Tax

Undoubtedly, the current Liberal government's carbon tax is going to be expensive for Canadians. It's going to impact every Canadian, as well as businesses in Canada.

It understandably raises questions and concerns for hardworking Canadian families who are trying to pay their bills and don't need to be burdened with another tax to pay for Prime Minister Trudeau's pet projects.

The Conservative Official Opposition has stood up for Canadians ever since the current Liberal government announced its carbon tax.

# New downtown parking system coming

The Town of Shelburne will be implementing a permit parking system within the downtown

Store owners, employees and tenants will have designated areas to leave their vehicle parked without having to move every three hours.

Parking spaces on Main Street, Owen Sound Street, William Street, and Victoria street within the downtown core will remain free three-hour parking. This will allow more downtown parking to be open for customers to do their shop-

There will be twenty-eight permit spaces at the William Municipal Lot, eight permit spaces at the Victoria Municipal Lot and thirty-five permit spaces at the Wellington Municipal Lot. Ext.255.

Permit passes will be available for purchase at Town Hall for \$150.00 per year or \$12.50 per month. Each lot will have a color-coded permit associated with it that will hang on the rear-view mirror of the vehicle to indicate where the permit is to be used.

A new time schedule has been set out for the different Municipal Lots.

The William Municipal Lot has no time limit for permit holders. In the Victoria Municipal Lot, free parking is available from 4:30pm -12:00am, but to park during business hours a permit is required. The Wellington Municipal Lot will allow customers and business owners to park unlimited during the day but require a permit if a vehicle is being left overnight from 12 midnight to 7:00 am.

Tickets are \$10 per person daily, \$25 per person for a weekend pass without camping, and \$80 per person for a weekend pass with camping included.



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


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

Mandala is a Sanskrit word for circle and an artistic starting point that Art Therapist Tiffany McCabe uses to help her clients "bring a sense of connection from self to the outer world."

Ms. McCabe shared her work at the Shelburne Farmers' Market last Thursday, June 20, giving Market patrons an opportunity to experience the power of art as a tool for healing.

"Art therapy is a form of psychotherapy," says Tiffany. "It uses colour, imagery, and shapes when words just are not enough. It gives us a platform to invite creativity into our lives. When we start to

become creative with art work, such as painting, colouring, drawing or using clay, we are able to look at situations or problems in a creative way. Art therapy essentially trains our brains to 'look outside the box.

"Creating Mandalas at the Farmers Market is so beautiful because they are both about making connections. Mandalas allow us to connect our inner self, to the outer world, much like the farmers market where we are able to connect to food, art, and community. As we build these connections we are able to better understand self and our environment, once we have established these connections we can then appreciate and build gratitude

Tiffany says, "Personal mandalas can hold images that have specific meaning for the artist. Starting with a circle is easier to express our thoughts, emotions, and feelings" as "circles can be found everywhere, from the sun and the moon, to the centre of flowers, to wedding rings."

Her goal for the Farmers' Market was to "allow

She says, "The market for me is a place to bump into neighbours, buy fresh produce for my families, and learn about new things our community has to offer."

Shelburne Farmers' Market runs every Thursday from 3 pm until 7pm at the corner of First and Owen Sound Street. She has traveled around the world for numerous competitions, has won many feats and was a presenter at the 2013 International Olympic Academy Young Participants' Session. Her notable achievements include, Commonwealth Games Gold medalist, World Silver & Bronze medalist, 2009 Brampton Hall of Fame Inductee, Canadian Olympian, two-time silver medalist at the Pan American Games and ten-time Senior National Champion.

As a high-performance athlete, she has gone through many challenges and victories.

Her many accomplishments played out on the world stage, has led her to discover numerous techniques that religious leaders, professionals, educators and young people can use to identify possibilities in their own lives and careers.

Raised in Southern Alberta near Taber, singer-songwriter Corb Lund is known for his Country-Roots sound and his Albertan pride.

The Juno Award-winning Lund is the headliner for the Heritage Music Festival on the evening of Friday, August 11 at the Centre Dufferin Recreation Centre (CDRC) in Shelburne.

Sandra Gallaugher, Shelburne's Heritage Music Festival Co-Chair says, "It was a challenge to find a Friday night headliner that was as popular as Jim Cuddy," last year's big draw, "but we have found a lineup that is sure to

please."

Co-Chair, Bobbi Ferguson says the plan is to "continue the momentum of last years' success" with the lineup.

"When we were searching for entertainment we were looking at many different options," says Bobbi Ferguson. "We asked people for their opinions and for suggestions of what they would like to see. Eventually, Lund turned his talent to Country music, forming the Corb Lund Band in 1995, later changing the name to Corb Lund and the Hurtin' Albertans.



The next album, "Hair in My Eyes like a Highland Steer" was awarded Album of the Year by the Canadian Country Music Association in 2006, with a follow up album "Horse Soldier! Horse Soldier!" in 2007.

In 2009, Lund signed a three-album deal with New West Records home of major recording artists like Dwight Yoakam and Kris Kristofferson.

His first record on New West - "Losin' Lately Gambler," was released in September of that year followed by "Live at the Edmonton Coliseum" and then 'Cabin Fever." Next, "Counterfeit Blues" featured songs cut live from Memphis Sun Studios, and in 2015 Lund released new songs on his album "Things That Can't Be Undone" which was produced in Nashville.





# Feral Cat Rescue presents business plan to Council

Monday night's Council meeting saw the presentation of a much-anticipated business plan from the Feral Cat Rescue.

Previously, Council had instructed the owner, Sharon Morden, to come back to them with both a business plan and a financial overview of the operation in order for it to better understand the needs of the Rescue and ascertain how Council could assist in relocating – and possibly helping to support –Sharon's enterprise.

Feral Cat Rescue presented a detailed accounting of its financial requirements and the aforementioned business plan.

They also presented a copy of a Cat By-law from Saugeen Shores for Council's consideration.

The Feral Cat Rescue, or FCR, is currently not registered as a not-for-profit company, but, as a part of the business plan, will become incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation.

They currently depend entirely on donations and Sharon Morden's income to survive.

The plan outlined the goals and services currently offered by FCR as well as a Mission Statement and a detailed outline of their search for a new location within the Town.

The hope is that these new quarters will allow FCR to offer more public services.

These would include assisting other, non-feral cats, small animals and dogs, if space allowed.

The Feral Cat Rescue would also be interested in becoming the Animal Control Service for the Town, if feasible.

FCR's projected budget for operation in a new facility is approximately \$62,000, this figure being partly based on the costs associated with the only suitable space that could be found within

Monthly expenses for that space would amount to approximately \$2,200.00 per month, or \$26,400.00 annually.

Sharon's current expenses run at roughly, \$48,000.00 annually. FCR hopes to be able to fund the move and the first year from grant monies, in addition to their present funding revenues.

The Cat By-law accompanying the FCR presentation offered Council some options for a similar one in the Town. It was a comprehensive document, outlining such things as licensing charges, non-compliance penalties and reclamation fees when a cat has been taken in under the By-law.

Mayor Bennington noted that he felt these fees were far too low, compared to those for reclaiming a dog, from animal control.

The Saugeen Shores charge was only \$10 for a first offence, whereas most dog reclamation would be more in the neighbourhood of ten times that amount. Nevertheless, the By-law was well received by Council who definitely intend to study it further.

Jennifer Willoughby, informed Council that a RFP is currently out for animal control in Shelburne and that one respondent has included felines in their proposal. This would give Council an idea as to the cost of such a service.

Mayor Bennington then assured Sharon Morden that before any company would be hired to

perform this type of service, in Shelburne, he would offer her the opportunity to match their proposal.

CAO Telfer asked if FCR knew the cat population of Shelburne. Sharon replied that her estimate would be approximately 1,400 animals. Telfer then noted that based on a tag fee of \$20.00 per cat and assuming that every cat owner complied, this would only generate \$28,000.00 in

He also asked Sharon exactly what type of space would be required by the rescue, how many rooms and if they had to be finished walls. Her reply was that between seven and eight rooms were required and that they had to be finished drywall.

Both Councillors Sample and Chambers noted that a request for an amount this large would have to be vetted through the budget process, which will begin in September of this year. However, in past years, Shelburne has offered a total of \$20,000 in grant money that has been spread amongst eight recipients.

Councillor Sample went on to ask if figures were available from other, similar businesses, in the region and was FCR aware of them, as this would aid them in knowing how and where to solicit funding. This is a pressing concern for FCR as their relocation deadline is in October.

Although the Mayor stated that he was not able to extend this deadline, Councillor Sample said he would be in favour of a short extension so as to allow for these figures to be investigated and to search further for a new location.

Councillor Benotto also noted that Council needs to consider these proposals and set a date to address the matter further.

As a final question, Mayor Bennington asked that if a suitable building was available at no charge, could FCR then sustain itself with current financing.

Sharon's answer was yes, assuming that renovations were not prohibitively expensive. She also noted that she realized that the monies required by the business plan needed to come from various sources and not simply the Town.

Council, at this juncture, thanked Feral Cat Rescue, for their presentation and their efforts and passed a motion to assess all the information provided and bring the matter before Council again by September 25.

# **Streams Community Hub** aims to empower youth

Executive Director Andrew James says he co-founded Streams Community Hub as a way to help Shelburne youth to "discover passion, potential and purpose."

The not-for-profit organization focuses on providing programs that enrich the lives of youth in the community by providing camps and activities at little or no charge whenever possible.

The Streams camps are running for the first time this summer at Centennial Hylands Elementary School and registration for two of the camps are already full with a waiting list – "which is great," says Andrew.

The organization says it will cost \$25/day per participant to provide the Streams Arts Camp experience this year. "We are aiming to accommodate 15 participants per week for the four weeks."

Already, there are 40 kids registered. Andrew James pursued an acting career in New York after winning the Dramatic Arts Award for his High School. Later, in Toronto he started his own Christian entertainment company called S4 and produced a nationally distributed music magazine as well as an annual drumming skills com-

petition. Recently, Andrew published his first inspirational book "Bird Words," and produced an Urban Gospel talk show airing weekly on the Miracle Channel.


He and his wife Juli-Anne, one of four members on the board of directors for Streams, live in Shelburne with their three daughters.

"Trinity United Church and the Royal Canadian Legion Shelburne sponsored several children to attend," Mr. James says. "[Streams camps, and the group] received a lot of great feedback and response from parents" at the Streams information booth during the Shelburne Street Festival.

"A few teachers at Primrose, Centennial, Hyland and Centre Dufferin have praised the group's efforts and desire to bring creative arts and education to our youth."

Andrew is also appreciative that, "The Town of Shelburne, John Telfer and Carol Maitland, have been a great support."

Streams is offering area kids programs such as

Digital Storytelling, Broadway Bound Musical Theatre, and Sing, Dance, Play day camps running from 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. starting the last week of July and running until mid-August. Supervision is available from 8:00 a.m. before the start camps and until 5:00 p.m. after closing.

The group has been actively fundraising with the hope of making the camp accessible to all kids.

"Equality of accessibility is one of the core values" for the group and if they cannot make it free, they at least hope to subsidize costs for parents.

Streams camps ask that those who can - pay half the week's cost for a child to participate. Families who can afford the full registration fee may donate the other half to support Streams programs.

"Many have expressed that this is a wonderful idea and a great need for our youth here in Shelburne," says Andrew James.







Her smarts caught the attention of Mr. Bassel, and he asked her to work in the office for him. At first she resisted, because she made good tip money as a waitress, but later she ended up managing Bassel's and many of his other business affairs. In all she was at Bassel's throughout its heyday and for over 30 years, retiring in the late 60's.

She moved up north to Larder Lake after retirement, where her sister Connie lived, but it was a difficult transition for her after so many years in the heart of the city, and she moved back down to a condo in Etobicoke. She returned to the work force as well, with several years at Pinkerton Security in payroll, as well as doing taxes for H&R Block Even after retiring again, she found part time work to stay active.

Her talents went beyond the business world as well. An avid reader and learner, Nan excelled at dressmaking, often copying the fancy outfits of the day; she would reminisce about nights on the town, and would always interject "...and I looked sharp!" She loved nothing more than to cook a fabulous meal for family and friends, and of course, she had access to all the secret recipes from Bassel's. Her baking and cooking were renowned; she always knew that you had room for just a little more. She lived in her condo independently well into her nineties, until her health faded a bit, and her last few years were spent at Dufferin Oaks in Shelburne,

where her family was close. Doris was a strong, smart, loving and caring woman. She will be forever loved and missed by all who knew her.
