Shelburne appoints new permanent CAO

Shelburne Council has finally found the right person for the job after news broke late last week the local municipality has hired a new permanent CAO to replace John Telfer, following a near 6-month search.

Coming to the Town from a similar position in nearby Meaford is Denyse Morrissey, an experienced administrator with years of municipal management under her belt. A graduate of Dalhousie University with a Master's Degree in Public Administration, Ms. Morrissey spent five years as CAO with the Town of Meaford having previously served as Director of Recreation and Culture Services with the City of Oshawa.

Ms. Morrissey's employment with the Town will commence on Feb. 26 and Deputy Mayor Geoff Dunlop couldn't be happier with the appointment.

"With Shelburne growing and developing dramatically, the choice of a permanent replacement as CAO was an important decision. I believe we've got it right with Denyse Morrissey," Mr. Dunlop said. "I was impressed with her extensive experience, leadership and management capabilities. I look forward to developing a productive and successful relationship as we embrace the exciting changes and challenges facing the Town."

Mr. Dunlop confirmed Ms. Morrissey beat out 39 other applicants for the position. He also reserved special praise for Carol Sweeney, who stepped into the position of Acting CAO upon Mr. Telfer's departure in August of last year. With the hiring of Ms. Morrissey, Ms. Sweeney will revert back to her previous position as Town Treasurer.

"Carol has successfully managed the responsibilities thrust upon her with skill, grace and good humour. Having someone with her expertise has ensured that the Town of Shelburne has been able to continue to provide quality services for our residents," Mr. Dunlop noted.

The deputy mayor was not alone in welcoming Ms. Morrissey to Shelburne as councillors Steve Anderson and Walter Benotto praised the appointment.

"Denyse appears to be a great hire," said Coun. Anderson. "She understands the town, she understands, I believe, what the town needs and she's coming in with lots of great ideas. In brief conversations with her, she touched on the right things with regards to managing our growth, building our infrastructure. I think she will add tremendous value to the community."

"With all the development happening in and around town, I feel it's very important to have someone in the position that can lead the municipality in the direction it needs to go into. I believe Denyse is the right person for the job," Coun. Benotto said.

In a release to media, Ms. Morrissey stated her excitement at having secured the position, noting she couldn't wait to start work at the end of next month.

"I'm looking forward to working with Shelburne council and staff to meet the challenges of rapid growth and an increasingly complex legislative and regulatory environment for municipalities," Ms. Morrissey said.

\$15,000 raised for hungry, young minds

Owner Bill Gillam and the staff of Shelburne Home Hardware were congratulated by The Children's Foundation of Guelph and Wellington Food & Friends Program on January 24th for a donation of \$15,000 dollars raised by the community and Shelburne Home Hardware through the store's "Donate a Plate" fund raising efforts.

Heather Verpaalen Student Nutrition Program Manager for Food & Friends, told the Free Press it was one of the largest donations of its kind to come out of Dufferin in the ten years the program has been running. This was the third year that Mr. Gillam and his staff led the fund raiser to support the breakfast programs at Shelburne and area public schools. The community was asked to support the fund raiser and Mr. Gillam matched donations made at his store.

Mr. Gillam expressed his thanks to the community, the contractors, customers and staff for their support, calling it a "fantastic

cause" and "a positive for everyone."

There are over 100 student nutrition programs supported by the Children's Foundation of Guelph and Wellington Food & Friends program, and nearly 16,000 students will be provided with a healthy breakfast, morning meal, snack or lunch in the 2017/18 school year.

Almost exclusively run by 2,100 volunteers, Heather Verpaalen says, "The program is able to support elementary and secondary schools in Dufferin, Wellington and Guelph with healthy food in a safe, convenient environment in order to maximize students' potential to learn. The programs also offer an atmosphere for social inclusion amongst students who may otherwise feel marginalized."

Shelburne breakfast programs include Hyland Heights Elementary School, Glenbrook Public School, Centennial Hylands Elementary School, Centre Dufferin District High School, and Primrose Elementary School. All the money raised during Shel-

burne Home Hardware's Labour Day BBQ, Ladies' Night, and Donate A Plate campaign is split evenly to all five programs in those schools.

The Children's Foundation of Guelph and Wellington Food & Friends student nutrition programs receive core funding from the Ministry of Children and Youth services covering up to 15% of the costs for individual programs. This means each school program must raise 85% of their own costs.

"This task can be an overwhelming addition to the already exemplary volunteer efforts made by parents, teachers and other volunteers," says Ms. Verpaalen. "With the help of Bill Gillam at the Shelburne Home Hardware and the Shelburne community, the funds raised support local Food & Friends Breakfast programs to bring healthy food to hungry minds," says Ms. Verpaalen.

Between all five Shelburne breakfast programs, about 450 students are served a meal each day. "Creating happier and healthier children and youth will only help to

Businesses adjusting to new min wage

More than a million Canadians work at minimum wage jobs – around eight per cent of the country's work force.

The rate varies depending on where you live from a low of \$10.85 in Nova Scotia to Alberta where the minimum wage is set to increase to \$15.00 in October.

In Ontario, the General Minimum wage rose to \$14.00 on January 1, and is scheduled to go up to \$15.00 next year.

The wage varies for students and people who work as liquor servers.

The rapid increase in Ontario has people on both sides of the issue weighing in on the good and the bad side of raising the minimum amount you can pay someone.

Previously the government kept minimum wage increases somewhat in line with the cost of living but this sudden increase is unprecedented in Ontario.

"This increase was too much to fast for business to react to it," said Nick Lumia, Communications and Policy analyst at the Dufferin Board of Trade. "Previously it (minimum wage increases) was tied to the Consumer Price Index."

The Dufferin Board of Trade and other related organizations across the province were opposed to the the increase in such a

short period of time.

"We were in opposition when this bill was announced," Lumia said. "We met with our members – now we are seeing the consequences of this bill. Retail and the service industry will be the most effected. Each business is evaluating their situation. Businesses that can adjust will do so."

While the Ontario government's stance is that people making extra money will put that money back into the economy, others think it will lead to fewer hours for employees, fewer businesses hiring and in some cases elimination of jobs through automation.

The effects of automation are already being seen with the use of automatic customer checkouts and an ordering system at some restaurants that eliminates the process of actually going to the counter to place your order.

While making a couple of dollars extra per hour may be good thing, the positive impact on the economy doesn't seem to pan out.

"It's not just an opinion," Lumia said. "What we have is an independent analysis that was done. Businesses will have to find a way to structure around this and it will have a significant impact. Now we have to give recommendations to government to help businesses to stay competitive. It's our job to make sure we keep the government accountable."

Ontario PCs work to put testing week behind them

Last week was not an easy time for Ontario's Progressive Conservatives.

In fact, Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones confirmed Saturday that she was glad the week was over.

Things got rough for the party last Wednesday night, in the face of reports of allegations of sexual misconduct having been launched against party leader Patrick Brown.

That was followed a couple of days later by Party President Rick Dykstra resigning.

Mr. Brown at first asserted he would not resign, but changed his mind early the following morning and announced he was leaving his position, and Ms. Jones said she concurred with the decision.

"In the interest of the Ontario PC Party, we unanimously agree that Mr. Brown cannot continue serving as the Leader," Ms. Jones said in a statement she jointly released with fellow deputy Leader Steve Clark last Thursday morning.

It was reported that two women had alleged serious sexual misconduct. One of the alleged incidents took more than 10 years ago, and the other apparently was more recent.

According to media reports, one of the women, who was in her teens and still in high school at the time, said that while Mr. Brown was a Barrie city councillor he asked her to perform oral sex on him. The other woman said she served in Mr. Brown's constituency office while he was an MP. She said Mr. Brown tried to aggressively kiss her without permission while she was drunk.

Mr. Brown initially "categorically" denied the allegations, but issued a statement a couple of hours later announcing he was stepping down.

"Mr. Brown is entitled to a legal defence and due process, but he cannot lead us into an election as a result of these allegations," the statement from Ms. Jones and Mr. Clark added. "The Ontario PC Party unequivocally upholds the principle that a safe and respectful society is what we expect and deserve. We need to move forward to eradicate sexual violence and harassment across the province."

"We were shocked," Ms. Jones told a press conference that she and Mr. Clark held early Thursday afternoon, as she asserted that allegations such as this must be taken seriously.

"These women deserve to be heard," she declared.

Ms. Jones said Saturday there was a conference call last Wednesday night involving Mr. Brown and several members of the Tory Caucus.

"I have not spoken to him since," she said.

She also said all the Caucus members involved in the call agreed that Ms. Jones and Mr. Clark had to go to Queen's Park the following day and face the media.

She thought that media conference did generally go well.

"We needed to show that we were united behind the need for Mr. Brown to resign," she said. "It wasn't a pleasant situation."

"I'm not sure how much more quickly we could have reacted," Ms. Jones said, pointing out they held the conference call that had called for the resignation that night.

"At the end of the conference call, there was no doubt what had to happen," she added. "Mr. Brown had to step down."

Ms. Jones also maintained that Mr. Brown has been treated fairly in this situation. She

said politicians and public figures must be held to a higher standard of behaviour. "That has happened," she said.

Nipissing MPP Vic Fedeli was unanimously named interim leader Friday, and the party is planning to go through a process to pick a new leader before the general election in June.

Ms. Jones said the new permanent leader will be in place by the end of March.

While Mr. Fedeli was eligible to seek the position, he announced Tuesday he will not be running. According to published reports, he is more interested in looking to "root out any rot" in the party.

Ms. Jones is also eligible to seek the leadership, but she asserted Saturday that she will not.

"I love what I do as a Member representing Dufferin-Caledon," she commented, adding she's worked for two party leaders and has seen the commitments that take away from their time in the community. She said she doesn't want her attention diverted like that.

Ms. Jones also said she's confident the party has a chance to recover in time for the coming election. She expects people will take an added interest in what the party is offering as an alternative.

She also believes the party has a chance of forming the next government "if we do it right, if we stay united."

"If people are willing to move together as a team and present themselves as a team, then we win," she added.

Dufferin-Caledon Progressive Conservative Riding Association President Wayne Innis said he had mixed feelings about this affair, pointing out that there were many ways for the party to pick a new leader.

"They picked a way, and I hope it all works out," he said Monday.

Mr. Innis also expressed the feeling that Caucus acted hastily in forcing Mr. Brown out, believing it would have been better to step back and wait a day or two.

"It seems to be the way of the new world," he added.

"There's no doubt I was clearly shocked to hear these very serious allegations," commented Bob Gordanier, who will be the Liberal candidate in Dufferin-Caledon in the coming election, adding he was glad to see the PCs took action.

"What is there to say?" observed Dufferin-Caledon Green Party candidate Laura Campbell.

She said it was unfortunate the party didn't do a better job of vetting its leader, although she thought there's still a lot of time to find a new one.

NOTICE OF COMPLETE APPLICATIONS

UNDER SECTION 51 OF THE PLANNING ACT

Take notice that the Corporation of the Town of Shelburne has received complete applications for a Draft Plan of Subdivision and Draft Plan of Condominium. The Town will be processing the applications in accordance with the Planning Act, and the applications are now being circulated to Town departments and public agencies for technical review. Town Council may not make a decision for approval of the applications until a Public Meeting is held in accordance with the Planning Act. Notice of a Public Meeting will be given and a Public Meeting will be held to receive comments on the applications at a future date (to be determined), in accordance with the Planning Act.


A related application for Zoning By-law Amendment (Holding Zone) under Section 36 of the Planning Act has also been received by the Town. A by-law considered by Council to remove a Holding Provision under section 36 of the Planning Act is not subject to the requirement of a public meeting and cannot be appealed by anyone other than the applicant.

The land subject to the proposed Draft Plan of Subdivision, Draft Plan of Condominium and Zoning By-law Amendment is located at Main Street West (Highway 89) and Gordon Street. The site is legally described as Part of Lot 1, Concession 3, Old Survey (Geographic Township of Melancthon) in the Town of Shelburne, County of Dufferin. The subject property is approximately 1.2 hectares in size and is currently vacant. A map showing the location of the subject property is provided below.





The purpose and effect of the Draft Plan of Subdivision and Draft Plan of Condominium applications are to permit a proposed development consisting of 38 street townhouse dwellings on parcels of tied land fronting a private common-element condominium road, one block for unspecified purposes (zoned for a semi-detached or single detached dwelling) at the south end of the development at Main Street West and Gordon Street, and a stormwater management area.

The purpose and effect of the related application for Zoning By-law Amendment is to lift the Holding provision currently applied to the property to permit the proposed development.

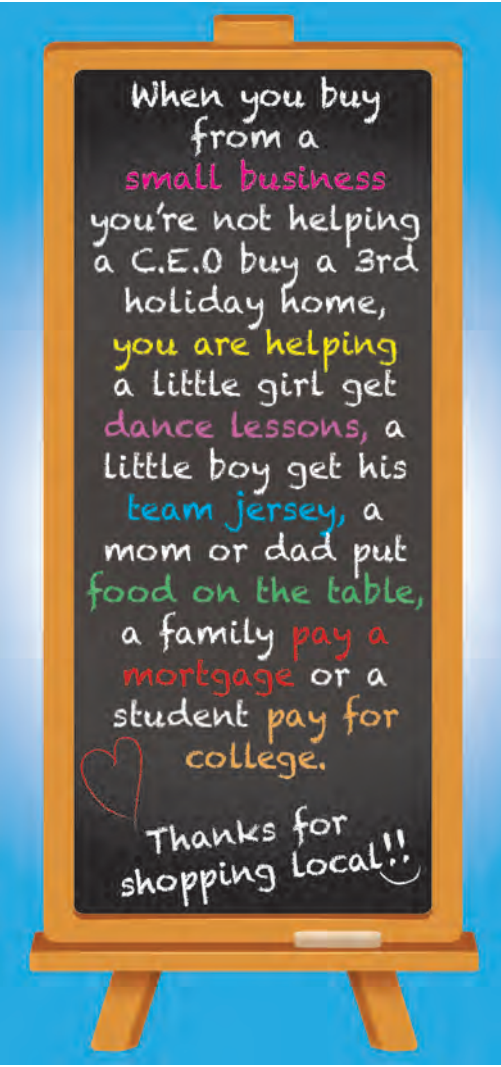
