In the second incident, a youth as defined in the criminal code (less than 18 years of breach of a condition they were under as a result of a criminal charge from earlier this year. This youth was arrested by a Shelburne officer in relation to that breach. Upon arrest a quantity of marijuana was found to be in the youth's possession.

Under the new provincial cannabis laws nobody under 19 can be in possession of any quantity of marijuana at all. Under the federal laws, a youth in possession of more than 5 grams of dried marijuana (or equivalent) is chargeable under the federal level laws. In this circumstance the youth allegedly had more than 5 grams of marijuana in his possession, and therefore was charged under the federal Cannabis Act, in addition to the court order breach charge.

Here is a summary of some of the key new laws in regards to Cannabis in Ontario: Under 19 years of age cannot, possess, consume, purchase, attempt to purchase, distribute, cultivate, propagate, harvest, offer to cultivate, offer to propagate, offer to

Cannabis in any form or quantity (some exceptions if the person under 19 has a medical prescription) Nobody can: Sell, distribute, cannabis to an intoxicated person or an apparently intoxicated person, purchase any type of cannabis from an unapproved source, sell or deliver cannabis



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The new federal and provincial cannabis to a person who appears under the age of 25 time. - must have legal proof age


Penalties include fines from \$400 to \$4000, Bicycles (which are considered vehicles up to six months in jail and six demerit points upon conviction for drivers.
