

Her minivan was subsequently pulled into the Grand River. Both Ms. Hanson and Kaden Young, who was in the vehicle with his mother, managed to escape the vehicle but Kaden was pulled from his mother's arms. On April 21, two months to the day that Kaden went missing, two fishermen found his body under a bridge in Belwood Lake.

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
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


BUT HE DOES!
