Residents of Dufferin County placed over 2,000 kg of used and unwanted batteries to the curb last week in a special curbside battery collection.

The program, which was introduced last November, coincides with Daylight Savings Time and the Fire Department's reminder to change batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

"Official numbers won't be available for a few weeks, but with 6 drums collected by GFL, we can estimate that it will be close to 2,000 kg," says Cory Graper, of Raw Materials Company (RMC).

The used batteries are sent to RMC, where zinc, manganese, potassium and steel are recovered and recycled safely.

"I'm pleased at the positive response to the

environmentally responsible. Well done!" said Councillor John Oosterhof, Chair of the Community Development Committee.

Southgate energy project won't use DWP line

In the face of an element of skepticism about the transmission of electricity from a planned 170 MW wind and solar installation in Southgate Township to the Hydro One grid, a spokesman for the proponent says the power would connect directly to the Bruce to Milton line, which crosses through Southgate.

The mega project is a partnership of Samsung Renewable Energy and Pattern Energy. It also developed the Chatham-Kent installation.

Blackburn News had reported in late January that the development would comprise about 40 turbines in the east (former Proton Township) and 700 acres of ground-mounted solar in the northwest (former Egremont).

By early February, Wind Concerns Ontario tagged Mayor Brian Milne as the "wind-happy mayor," but the mayor on March 5 voted to oppose declaring the township a "willing host" until satisfactory agreements had been executed with the partnership.

The "willing host" condition also applies to the solar panels, according to a separate vote of township council. But former township mayor Don Lewis was quoted as in favour of the solar farm as it is on already-leased 700 acres of Class 4 farmland. Mayor Milne had declared a conflict with respect to the solar installation.

Proton shares its eastern boundary with Melancthon. A Van Harten map of the proposed wind farm shows five study areas as being close to, or situated on, the Melancthon boundary.

Samsung representative Ken Smitheman said in a phone interview Monday, however, that the studies for the turbine development do not in any way involve Melancthon.

Specifically, he said there are no plans to connect to Dufferin Wind Power's transmission line on the rail corridor through Dufferin.

Samsung Pattern "have been assured" there is capacity on the Bruce line that runs right through the township.

He said the study for the turbines "does not involve any development in Melancthon (and) we are not crossing Highway 10."

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Hill still awaits minister's response to exemptions letter

As of St. Patrick's Day, March 17, Dufferin Warden Bill Hill was still awaiting a response from municipal affairs Minister Linda Jeffrey to his Feb. 26 letter in which he generally pointed out that stripping the established authority of Orangeville and Mono over their official plans could potentially block adoption of the provincially mandated Dufferin County Official Plan.

Warden Hill's letter was written following his meeting with Minister Jeffrey at the Good Roads/ROMA convention in Toronto.

At the meeting, the minister evidently said that to exempt the two municipalities from OP amendment approval by the upper-tier would be "precedent setting." The warden's letter takes issue with that response.

"I suggest that as Warden I am prepared to work with you, your staff and senior staff at the County to ensure Dufferin County complies with Ontario Regulation 352/02 of the Planning Act.

"Dufferin County staff has been working diligently with your staff to achieve that goal. We

can write the (county official plan).

"While not finalized I am confident we can prepare a workable administration system to manage the plan. However, without a minimum of the status quo (for Orangeville and Mono's authority) I doubt the plan will pass at County Council as the Municipalities of Orangeville and Mono have 16 of the 29 votes at the County table

"Respectfully, considering that Owen Sound retained the authority that they enjoyed prior to 'rejoining' Grey County, asking that Orangeville and Mono retain their powers does not seem precedent setting or unreasonable. Your reconsideration of our request would be appreciated," the warden's letter reads.

The council has been aiming at completing its required OP prior to the October, 2014, municipal election. As mandated, the county would generally replace the province as the approval authority for lower tier planning.

The county could delegate approval authorities for such as subdivisions and consents to the lower tier, but could not delegate control over

OP amendments.

Only the province would be empowered to exempt lower-tier municipalities from upper-tier OP authority, according to advice from consultants, who have said that they are in discussions with the ministry with respect to Orangeville and Mono's established status but, so far, the ministry has been unyielding.

An explanatory note on the ministry's website states: "An upper-tier municipality with an approved official plan is the approval authority for lower tier official plans and official plan amendments pursuant to subsections 17(2) and (4) of the Planning Act and for subdivision applications pursuant to subsections 51(5) and (5.1) of the Planning Act."

It goes on to say that the minister has "the authority to exempt by order an official plan or proposed official plan amendment(s) from his or her approval."

The interpretation appears to be that the min-

ister retains control over the upper-tier OP, and has authority to approve or disapprove such as the county's authority to exempt the lower tier from upper-tier OP control.

A 37-page chart on the website confirms that the Grey County City of Owen Sound is thus far the only lower-tier municipality in Ontario to have been exempted by the minister from OP amendment approval by the upper-tier.

Consultant Chris Tyrell of the MMM Group has explained that Owen Sound had been a separated city within Grey County, and had rejoined the county as a lower-tier municipality. The reunion evidently earned the city special status.

Dufferin County Council has a different view of things, as do Orangeville and Mono. They believe in effect that the ministry, in downloading its responsibilities, should not also relieve lower-tier municipalities of their existing powers by transferring those to the upper tier.

The Gardener's Corner: Radiant Orchid

The Pantone colour for 2014 is 'Radiant Orchid', a blend of fuchsia, purple and pink that will look spectacular in the home and garden.

Anyone who knows me, knows my love for all things lavender. Flowers in this colour range marry well with yellow, olive and deep green. In the home it successfully pairs with turquoise, teal and light yellow.

We are going to see a lot of Radiant Orchid this year featured in clothing, accessories, nail polish and home furnishings. In the garden there are already flowers to choose from in this colour tone and many are popular selections already in gardens.

Starting in spring we have light and dark purple muscari, hyacinths, and crocuses, often in mass plantings to produce a dreamy drift of colour. These spring bulbs can be purchased in pots to decorate the home too and they bring an early scent of spring to glide through the home.

We mustn't forget the purple hues of lilacs which are a fragrant addition to any property, especially when branches are brought indoors to fill a big vase.

Purple alliums make a bold statement in beds as they stand like tall sentries over shorter plants and when spent and turned to seed, can be spray painted to extend their usefulness and colour.

Agastache (hyssop), nepeta (catmint), peo-

nies, lavender, spiderwort, hollyhocks, clematis and many annuals are good choices to bring some purple into a garden.

A few of my favourites are the peony 'Gay Paree' which has strong fuchsia outer petals with lighter pinkish-purple ones in the centre; a gorgeous David Austin rose called 'Othello' and 'Lavender Chiffon', a rose of Sharon shrub.

Gerbera daisies are a long time favourite for fresh flowers in a vase and can be found in a shade similar to Radiant Orchid. If purchased from a florist, they may come with a short clear straw to hold the stem upright. I like to keep these and slip them over stems from the grocery store, otherwise they flop in no time but are one flower that lasts well.

A new introduction from Proven Winners is the heuchera 'Blackberry Ice' which collectors will want to add to their shade garden. Green and silver leaves appear to have been painted around the edges and into the centre with pink and I can see this looking quite nice beside any of the green or maroon leaved varieties.

Purple has always been a regal colour with a magical side to it but is known to induce a relaxing feeling.

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County to hire added building inspector

A new provincial regulation is forcing Dufferin County to expand its building department this year at an unbudgeted cost of more than \$70,000.

County council last week approved the hiring of an additional building inspector based on a report from Chief Building Official Mike Giles that the new Building Code requires inspections of all septic systems that are within 100 metres of well-head protection areas.

"This alone is going to create approximately 300 inspections across Dufferin County at a minimum. The inspections need to commence in the summer of 2014 to fulfill the regulations.

"In 2014, Dufferin is going to experience high volumes of building activity with new homes. The current staffing complement will not be able to carry this new function and keep up with the high volume of building activity," Mr. Giles said in his report to the council.

The county does inspection services for all Dufferin municipalities except Orangeville. The septic inspections are required every five years, according to Mr. Giles' report.

"This position is not included in the 2014 budget because the scope of the work was not known at budget time. The salary for the position will be covered by the permit revenues. This position is Salary Grade 9 (\$66,827 to \$78,197)," he said in his report.

In another similar situation, it's not clear whether the county will require additional staff for the downloaded responsibilities entailed in the mandated Official Plan, whenever a plan has been adopted.

Winning authors were then visited by a film crew and the video of the interview was shown at the Award Ceremony in Toronto for all to see.

This years theme, 'you cannot lock up an idea,' was based on the famous speech of Politician, Tommy Douglas, then the leader of the Saskatchewan Co-Operative Commonwealth in 1944, who retold the story of Mouseland, originally told by Clarence Gillis, Cape Breton Mp,

in 1940. Mouseland depicts a political situation where Mouseland was run by cats creating hardship for the mice. Ending with the powerful words, "But I want to remind you that you can lock up a mouse or a man but you cannot lock up an idea!"

Arbeau's story entitled "Light Bulb" has all the right stuff as Arbeau won in his category being Pose/Poetry/A2 Intermediate Grades 9-10 Applied/Essential category. Light Bulb is a four part prose each beginning with a favorite quote of Arbeau's as an introduction and explores a struggle with the protagonist.

"It feels really good to win this award and the experience taught me to be a little better with editing and writing. My favorite thing about Light Bulb is the quote by Abraham Lincoln, 'My great concern is not whether you have failed, but whether you are content with failure'," commented Arbeau. "Someday I'd like a career in writing. Working for National Geographic would be great because I like animals so it would be the best of both worlds."

Arbeau didn't achieve this feat on his own and under the guidance of his English teacher, Lela McKee, his effort paid off. "I'm excited for Conor and I'm happy for him. I'm so glad he got the recognition he deserves," a proud, modest McKee admitted. "Connor is strong in English, he was interested in writing but didn't start writing until high school. I'm very proud of him."

And so McKee should be proud of this feather in her cap as this young mans accomplishment clearly revealed McKee's dedication to her students and their abilities. Travelling to Toronto to accept this award, Arbeau's parents and grandparents attended the ceremony with pride.



Hargrave was released on a promise to appear and undertaking with a court date in April at the Orangeville Courthouse.

Haliburton woman charged with mischief

On Saturday March 15th Shelburne Police responded to a call for a possible fire and an intoxicated female who emptied a fire extinguisher in a stairwell of a downtown apartment building. Both the police and the fire department responded to the call. No evidence of a fire was found.

As a result of the police investigation 41 year old Evlynn Morrison of Haliburton was arrested and charged with mischief under \$5000. She was released on a promise to appear and undertaking with a court date in April at the Orangeville courthouse.

R.I.D.E. program leads to drug seizure

On Monday March 10th members of the Shelburne Police were conducting a R.I.D.E. program during the late evening hours. A gray Toyota caught the attention of the officers which triggered an investigation. As a result of the investigation a significant quantity of marijuana was seized and the driver, 27 year old Ryan Carey of Mulmur Township was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance. Carey was released on an appearance notice with a court date in April at the Orangeville courthouse.

Dog Bylaw and dog tags

The Shelburne Police regularly responds to calls about dogs. To effectively and efficiently deal with these calls the police need to be able to identify the dogs and their owners. If police are unable to identify a dog's owner or home the only option is to have the dog taken

to a pound. This is one of the reasons for the town bylaw requiring all dogs to have current dog tags. These tags need to be renewed every year. The deadline for 2014 dog tags is April 1st. The cost of the 1st dog tag is \$20. If a second tag is required the cost is \$30 and the third tag is \$80.

Dog owners are also reminded that unless dogs are fenced in or in a home on private property, they must be controlled on a leash. Dogs are not allowed to run free anywhere in the town of Shelburne including any parks. It is also the responsibility of dog owners to clean up all excrement their dogs leave anywhere other than on their own private property.

Here is a list of the bylaws that relate to dogs in the town of Shelburne: Fail to procure licence, fail to secure tag to dog, fail to secure dog by lead, permit dog to run at large, permit dog to howl or bark excessively, and fail to remove excrement. The fine for all these infractions is \$55.

Stunt driver charged

On March 17, an officer from the Dufferin Detachment of the OPP was conducting speed enforcement in the Town of Mono. OPP wrap-up Distracted Driving campaign – in time for fines to increase

The OPP has concluded its recent Distracted Driving campaign and is reminding drivers that as of March 18, new legislation kicks in that will have officers issuing much heftier fines to those caught using a hand held device or watching an entertainment device while driving.

During the March 8–14 campaign, officers throughout the province were busy raising awareness among motorists that using a handheld device and engaging in other forms of distraction while driving is a dangerous behaviour that, for three years in a row (from 2011–2013) has taken the lives of more innocent people than impaired driving (on OPP patrolled roads).

A total of 11 people have died so far this year (2014) in distracted driving related collisions on OPP patrolled roads and, according to some of the OPP's Facebook followers, the public recognizes how serious a threat this driving behaviour poses to road users.

"I see many people driving and using their cell phones and not paying attention (to) traffic. They should be kept off of roads," said one follower.

The OPP is reminding drivers that effective March 18, 2014, distracted driving fines increase from \$155 to \$280 (this includes the \$225 fine plus a \$50 victim fine surcharge and \$5 court cost).

The OPP supports this and any other laws that help put an end to distracted driving. While OPP officers remain committed to doing their part to help eliminate this dangerous behaviour, they know that drivers themselves have to take action to put a stop to it.

This latest campaign brings the total number of province-wide OPP distracted driving charges up to 4,000 in 2014.

The OPP would like to thank all drivers, passengers and others who support their efforts to make Ontario roads free of distracted driving. Whether it be through responsible driving, speaking up to a distracted driver as a passenger or encouraging family and friends to put down their phone and leave it alone while driving, the OPP appreciates these positive actions, which can go a long way to helping make our roads safer

Fraud: Romance and dating scams

Single or recently unattached people – often females – are among the growing number of vulnerable population to be victimized by criminals through fraudulent means. Usually this occurs through contact online via e-mail blasts, social media (Facebook, Twitter, Pinterest, etc...) or singles and dating-related 'meet' websites. Among the more prevalent schemes are money transfers via Romance or Dating Scams. In some cases, prolonged interaction with individuals has cost some victims tens/hundreds of thousands of dollars before the relationship ends – usually after the culprit gets what they want

According to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC), in 2013 there were 1,728 complaints from Canada of romance fraud – a year-over-year increase of nearly 300.

Of those complaints, 1,149 victims were identified and their combined financial losses exceeded \$15.6 million – more than any other identified financial loss due to fraud. Almost 60 per cent of all victims were in their 40s and 50s – often female.

Knowledge is power. All consumers – regardless of age and gender – can take basic steps to better protect themselves from becoming victims of fraud, such as never giving out personal information over the phone, the Internet or through social media/dating websites.

Always get independent advice – from family members, a trusted friend or advisor -- if any offers involve money, personal information, time or commitment.

If you or someone you know suspect they've

been a victim of fraud, contact your local police service, the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, or Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS).

Tips to Avoid Being a Victim of a Romance / Dating Scam

- Check website addresses carefully. Scammers often set up fake websites with very similar addresses to legitimate dating websites. Make sure you only use legitimate and reputable dating websites.
- Never send money, or give credit card or online account details to anyone you do not know and trust. A request to send money to a foreign country (using Western Union or MoneyGram) to this person you have never personally met should be a red flag.
- Don't give out any personal information in an email or when you are chatting online. Like any scam, use your computer to your advantage. Educate yourself. Check the person's name, the company name the addresses used, and ask yourself, "Would this be normal?"
- Ask yourself "Would someone I have never met really declare their love for me after only a few letters or emails?"

Several motor vehicle collisions over the weekend

Grey County OPP investigated 23 motor vehicle collisions between 6 p.m. on Friday, March 14 and noon on Monday, March 17. The majority of collisions were minor in nature, with the exception of one, where the driver exited his vehicle on Grey Rd. 8 in the Township of Southgate during a whiteout condition and was struck by a tanker truck. The pedestrian was pronounced dead at the scene.

Grey County OPP wish to remind motorists that should they encounter winter whiteout conditions, activate the vehicle hazard lights – pull over to the far right as possible – or better yet, into a nearby laneway. Do not exit your vehicle unless it's absolutely necessary. Wait till the whiteout condition passes before continuing.

Of the 23 collisions investigated, eight involved deer. Hitting a deer or any animal could lead to a serious injury and could, at times, be fatal. At the very least, the experience will be unpleas-

ant, inconvenient and costly.

Consider these tips to minimize the chances of being in a collision with a wild animal:

- Scan the road ahead from shoulder to shoulder. If there is wildlife beside the road, sound your horn to scare the animal away. Continue slowly and cautiously don't assume the animal will move in a predictable manner. They may leave the roadway and turn right back into your path
- Use high beams at night where possible and watch for glowing eyes of animals.
- Stop as safely as possible if a wild animal is crossing the road. Remember, if there is one there's usually one or more following.
- Never swerve suddenly. This could cause your vehicle to go out of control and result in a more serious collision.
- Always wear your seatbelt.

Should you be involved in a collision with a deer, or other animal, and you or your passenger(s) are injured or where the vehicle damage apparently exceeds \$1,000, you must report the collision to police.

Dundalk Little Theatre spring production postponed due to venue issues

last week, that our insurance provider will not continue to provide liability coverage on public occupancy events in the Olde Town Hall theatre area.

In December, 2013 our staff delivered a report to Council on the state of the building structure and challenges related to fire code. As a result of that report, Council commissioned a structural engineer's report to confirm the building condition prior to investing between \$60,000 to \$100,000 in fire and exit upgrades. Southgate Council in February, 2014 commissioned the Olde Town Hall Building Task Force. The task force is made up of 5 public members that live in the municipality and will be reviewing the structural engineer's report, the cost of the building upgrades, possible funding options and making recommendations on the next steps for the future of the building.

The Dundalk Little Theatre group, Southgate Council and staff have dialogued all the way through this process about the insurance companies concerns. The Dundalk Little Theatre group considered a backup plan in case

The Township of Southgate was advised late the Olde Town Hall would not be available. Unfortunately, Southgate received first notice last week from the insurance company that stated, "no further assemblies be permitted at this location until such time that you have received a written report by either an engineer or the Fire Department confirming that all known fire and life safety issues have been complied

As a result of this notice, Southgate staff held a meeting last Friday afternoon with the Dundalk Little Theatre group to advise them of the insurance issues. This short notice will not allow adequate time for a new location to be setup in time for the DLT production, set to open March 28, 2014. The Dundalk Little Theatre group also met over the weekend and made the decision to postpone indefinitely their play "Boeing Boeing" until an alternate, appropriate venue can be arranged.

As soon as information is available for a new location we will post the dates on Southgate's website, the community signs and through the local newspapers. The Dundalk Little Theatre group will also be advertising any new information when it becomes available.

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
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
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NEWS FROM THE CHURCHES—

"Father forgive them", Luke 23: 32-38

Picture the scene on Golgotha; the large crowd following and surrounding Jesus, their voices hoarse from yelling and howling Crucify, Crucify, Crucify him!! They hit Jesus when they get close enough, spit on him, taunt him all the way to the place of crucifixion and even then it does not stop, They taunt and jeer while hanging in agony from the cross, reveling in the spectacle.

Look at the Elders and teachers of the law...just look at them: trying to stay dignified but it is hard to hide their gleeful satisfaction at their triumph over this despised rabble rouser, he has bested them for the last time: who looks like the fool now! And so they walk proudly along noting with satisfaction that the common people still follow them rather than this Jesus... and they smile.

The roman soldiers laugh and try to keep this event moving along. It has been an interesting diversion from the everyday drudgery of soldiering. They had some good sport with this Jesus... but he is a strange one: not crying out or trying to fight back just taking it all, it almost spoiled the fun they had with him. They shrug their shoulders so what if he is or is not deserving of death, orders are to be obeyed. And so they arrive at Golgotha: the place of the skull. How appropriate because this is where death reigns! Hammer strokes ring out, cries of agony, curses and perhaps pleas for mercy from the murders but never a word from Jesus. Cheers from the crowds when the crosses get raised.... Cat calls, laughter and jeers... all directed at Jesus....." Father

forgive them, for they know not what they do..."
This is the season of Lent, the time when man

This is the season of Lent, the time when many Christians prepare themselves for the time of Easter. They reflect on their lives and think about the things they have done wrong. Some people give something up for Lent (eg coffee, chocolate or pop) a kind of fasting if you want. It helps them to focus on Jesus' suffering and death to make up for our shortcomings (sin).

The great bible teacher Huston Smith once gave a number of lectures in which he taught the most outstanding characteristics of the world religions. For Christianity he concluded that the most outstanding characteristic was "Forgiveness" It was what Jesus taught and in the end exemplified on the cross. The first word off the cross is Father forgive..... Doesn't this strike you as different or odd?

In matters where we have been offended or wronged we are more likely to wait for an apology, an admission of wrong doing before we will even consider to forgive the person that has hurt us. To forgive the offender who has deeply hurt us is not easy even though he/she has apologized, how much harder, near impossible would it be if the offender was cold and hard without a shred of remorse? Augustine one of the early church leaders noted that members of his congregation omitted the phrase "forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors" when they prayed the Lord's Prayer. They did not dare to pray the first since they could not do the latter; forgiveness can be a hard and dif-

ficult thing. And yet this is what Jesus models on the cross for us: "Father forgives them" Jesus just doesn't forgive he "preemptively" forgives.' He doesn't wait for an apology: here forgiveness comes before repentance. Picture for a moment a young child who put a huge deep scratch on the new family car with his bike... Now he stands before his angry and strict father..... Fearing the worst too scared to open his mouth. But the father picks up his child and hugs him and says you are forgiven, and only after that does the child stammering and crying say I am so sorry daddy.... That is where we find ourselves standing before almighty God knowing full well our guilt and afraid of the consequences. Then the words from the cross: "Father forgive them...."

The prophet Isaiah prophecies about the day when: "the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea (Is.11:9) we long for that day but that day is not here yet. But today we remember Jesus beaten and bloody hanging from the cross and remember it is our wrongdoing, our ignorance that put Him there. Then as Jesus speaks the first word from the cross and we are astounded by His incomprehensible Grace and Mercy: Father Forgive them!

May this season of Lent be a time of genuine reflection, where once again you contemplate on what Jesus did for you. Why don't accept Him as your Saviour and Lord and experience His Grace for yourself.

After a blistery Saturday, the Lord greeted us and the Son shone brightly, Pastor Don smiled, shared announcements and offered the service in prayer; we remember those who have lost loved ones this winter due to harsh driving conditions and we pray for those facing uncertain times due to unemployment or health concerns; may they find healing peace as they put their trust in the Lord who comforts, provides and heals. "What makes an Olympian a podium contender and winner? They get off on the right start right?" Whether we are parents or teachers we also aim to steer our children to the right start for a successful life. As a Pastor I also bring the word of God in order to guide and instruct you to repentance, salvation and following what is pleasing to God, all these teachings are all about preparation for a better life. Can we agree that the road to a better life begins with God? God left us His word to steer us the right way, (Hebrews 1:1). In the times before Jesus He spoke through angels, (Genesis 16:8-9). God also speaks through visions,(-Genesis 15:1). Many times we fear what lies ahead but trusting God will bring us through it. Throughout the Bible God spoke, he created life, he birthed a nation, freed that nation, made it a dynasty, taught and corrected that nation and alerted that nation through men, prophets, judges and angels that He chose to share part of His plan, but they were only parts of a puzzle. This all changed when He sent His son Jesus, (Hebrews 1:2), Jesus was the fulfillment of the puzzle, the crowning of God's plan. Jesus is the image of God, (Colossians 1:15-16).

Jesus is supreme, no one can rival or equal

Him, He is the Lord of all. He is superior in every way and He is the final word and the only right way to God, (John 14:6). Through Jesus we have the benefits of becoming children of God, He is our path to God and the reality of all His promises and His life becomes our eternal life. Jesus' supremacy is in creation, we are all created for Him we are His and without Him we have nothing, our existence depends on Him,(John 1:3). We may sometimes feel like God doesn't understand or that

He is not concerned with us, this is a lie keeping us in darkness, evil does not want us to see God's light nor does it want us be the light for others to find Jesus, but nothing is impossible for God, He is our light and He does care, His light will never be extinguished, (John 1:5). When we follow His light, we can avoid falling into sin and we can see where we can let Him shine bringing hope and care to those who need it. Jesus is the glorious radiance of God, before Jesus' sacrifice, God appeared behind the veil of the temple, now He shines bright for all to see, (John 1:14).

Jesus is the exact representation of God, not just a piece of the puzzle, He is the full puzzle! Jesus told His apostle Phillip that anyone who has seen Him has seen the Father! (John 14:9-10). When we daily seek Jesus, we see God plain and simple and when we trust him Jesus is the sustainer of all things, (Colossians 1:17). Jesus is our forgiveness and redemption purifying us from all sins, our final sacrifice, we no longer need to offer lambs as in the old testament because Jesus is the perfect sacrificial lamb buying our pardon and making atonement once and for all, (Hebrews 9:11-14). We can be certain that Jesus' superiority does not end here, after His life and sacrificial death, He was risen as the greatest message to mankind, God gave Him all authority, He is ruler of all things in heaven and earth He has the power to defeat all

evil and we can place our faith in Him for no evil powers of this world can separate us from His Love. Contrary to some beliefs, Jesus is not a superior angel, Jesus is God among us, our Immanuel and he alone deserves our worship, (Matthew 28:18Hebrews1:4-5).

Beloved we began 2014 with a simple resolution, to grow closer in our relationship with God, our "Right Start" begins with Jesus our firm foundation and the way to maintain our Right Start is staying on the right path with Him for He is the way the truth and the life. 
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
