Mayor Bennington told the Free Press that the costs of the repair remain unknown until all the information related to the incident, including equipment and man hours, can be gathered.








## Shelburne resident has a taste for the paranormal

Service Clubs in Shelburne began working together on the Hamper Program more than 25 years ago. Their work and dedication to the community continues as the need grows along with the town. The program offers assistance to families with an ongoing need, as well as to those who only use it once due to changes in personal circumstance, such as a temporary job loss.

"We need as many sponsors as we can get," says Bobbi Ferguson. "The dairy and eggs portion usually costs around \$700 or so, depending on the number of families. We had 62 last year and would think that following that trend and the increase in Shelburne's population that we will be closer to 70 this year. Money to purchase gift cards is increasingly difficult as companies willing to give money are difficult to find. Many are very generous with goods, but money is a challenge."

Although, not all locations have been confirmed, the elementary schools will be collecting donations, as well as Turn It Out Dance Studio, the Royal Bank, the Credit Union, and the Town Hall.
