"I don't know how these things get going," Tilson declared. "I'm not giving up my seat for Mr. O'Leary or anyone. That's definite." Tilson, who will be marking his 76th birthday Sunday, said he hasn't made up his mind on whether he will be a candidate in the next federal election, expected in the fall of 2019.

"I haven't decided what I'll do," he said, adding that decision likely won't come until some months before the actual election.

Tilson said he had heard nothing about the rumour until a colleague from eastern Ontario asked

him about it. "I've never even met Mr. O'Leary," he said. He seemed almost amused that the idea had

"It's a delicious story, of course, if Mr. O'Leary wants to come and represent this riding," Tilson observed. "He's going to have to wait for me to

In terms of the leadership race, Tilson con-

firmed that he's backing Michael Chong, from Wellington — Halton Hills.

"Michael's a long-time friend of mine," Tilson said. "He's a bright young man."

The matter was news to the local federal Conservative riding association.

"I have no idea where the rumour originated and had never heard of the blogger who tried to breathe life not it," association President Steve Cavell said in a statement. He also pointed out Tilson was elected MP and has served the riding well.

"And he does this with the full support of the riding association board of directors," Cavell stated. "That support extends to the end of the current term and beyond if he wishes."

And the O'Leary camp doesn't seem interested in moving Tilson out.

"It's a rumour," O'Leary's Press Secretary Ari Laskin said, adding their effort is completely focused on the leadership race. "We're not focusing on any riding."

Liberal Government's Changes to Mortgage Rules Raises Concerns

Home ownership is something to which thousands of Canadians aspire. It's also something the Conservative Party of Canada believes should be supported.

However, last October, the current Liberal government introduced changes which make it more difficult for hard-working Canadians to qualify for a mortgage. The changes are removing the dream of home ownership from thousands of first-time home buyers and, what's worse, is that the current government is now considering further changes.

Such changes would have negative implications for rural communities and underscores this government's one-size-fits-all approach is not working, raising concerns for Canadians across the country.

In October 2016, the current Liberal government introduced changes that were meant to reinforce the Canadian housing finance system, including changing eligibility criteria for high-and low-ratio insured mortgages, including a mortgage rate stress test.

The changes were designed to deal with rising housing prices in Toronto and Vancouver and were implemented without consultation. The results have not been successful. Sadly, these changes have made it much more difficult for first-time home buyers to obtain a mortgage. Moreover, they have hurt local mortgage brokers and credit unions in small towns and cities across Canada.

In early February, Parliament's Finance Committee heard testimonials from concerned groups across Canada. The message was clear: the mea-

sures introduced by the current government aren't working and should be rolled back. The measures were intended to address high prices in Toronto and Vancouver; however, this one-size-fits-all approach is instead hurting housing markets across the country.

It is regretful that Finance Canada is now considering further changes which will change the risk-sharing arrangements between lenders and the CMHC.

Such changes would make it more difficult for small financial institutions to compete and make it more difficult in rural communities to obtain a mortgage.

Canada's mortgage rules are already considered amongst the strongest in the world, a fact that helped our economy weather the 2008 Recession.

Throughout that time, the Conservative government, under the leadership of Prime Minister Stephen Harper, took steps to encourage, rather than discourage, home ownership.

It is interesting the current Liberal government, which professes to represent the interests of the middle-class, has placed considerable obstacles to this stratum of Canadian society in realizing the dream of home ownership and is now considering further obstacles.

The Conservative Party of Canada believes the current Liberal government should roll-back their October changes and abandon plans to change risk-sharing in the future.

Government is abandoning families in need: MPP

On February 27, I spoke in the Ontario Legislature and called on the Minister of Community and Social Services to address the tragic instances of "abandonment" in Ontario

According to the Select Committee on Developmental Services, "abandonment" refers to parents surrendering care of their child, "in a desperate, last-ditch attempt to enable their children to access services."

I was a member of the Select Committee in 2014, and heard stories from parents who were forced to make this excruciating decision because it was the only way to get service.

The unfortunate reality is that there are many families in Dufferin-Caledon waiting for service that they need. In some cases, the needs of a child are too much for a family, and even respite care or other in-home supports are not enough to ensure the safety of both the children and the family.

For many families going through such a difficult circumstance, the long term solution for their child is to place them in a group home. However, group home availability is limited and there are long waitlists.

So, while a family may have been striving for years to keep their child at home, some are left in extremely desperate situations where there is no alternative. A common instance in these scenarios is that the child will end up being put into hospital or another institution not meant to care for a person with

complex developmental needs.

This creates a tragic cycle of the child being in and out of hospital because both the home and the hospital are not the proper place for them to be.

In the end, the system in Ontario essentially encourages parents in the above situation to abandon their child, because the government will be forced to take care of the child.

Parents come to realize that the only way they can keep themselves and their child safe and get the care their child needs is to relinquish care of their child or "go into crisis"; giving up all parental rights for their child.

The government knows about this issue; it was in the 2016 Ombudsman report and the 2014 report from the Select Committee on Developmental Services, yet the government still fails to stop these tragic cases from occurring.

I am aware of nine cases of abandonment and seven cases of threatened abandonment in the Region of Peel in the last two years

It is unbelievable that in Ontario today, parents who are trying their best, have to give up their children just to get the service they need. I firmly believe that it is time for the Minister to address this issue and ensure that no parent has to make this heart-wrenching decision in order to receive the service they need.

As I said in my question to the Minister, "Abandonment is the last option for families who have been looking for help from your government. It's your government that is abandoning these families."

Lyme disease in Dufferin: MC2 sponsors April 1 presentation

In December 2014, the Lyme Disease Act came into force in Canada, committing the Minister of Health to develop a strategic plan to deal with the issue.

A conference to outline a framework took place last spring and public consultation on the draft closed last week.

According to the framework, Lyme disease is an illness caused by the bacterium Borrelia burgdorferi that is spread to humans and animals through the bite of certain types of ticks.

The disease can have serious consequences, including recurring attacks of arthritis and neurological problems. Risk of exposure to Lyme disease is highest in parts of southern and southeastern Quebec, southern and eastern Ontario, as well as in southeastern Manitoba, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and much of southern British Columbia.

The Lyme Disease Act requires the implementation of national medical surveillance to track rates and costs of the incidence of Lyme disease; best practice guidelines on prevention and treatment; and standardized education and awareness to enhance identification, prevention and treatment of Lyme disease.

On-street parking permits proposed for downtown core

Shelburne By-Law Enforcement Officer Vanessa Albonese made a presentation to Council on Monday night concerning proposed changes to parking facilities in the downtown core.

Presently, there are 257 available spaces in the core, including all municipal parking lots and many of those, especially along Main Street, are being occupied by various business owners, which prevents customers from being able to park close to shops and businesses.

Under the proposed changes this will be alleviated, to a large degree, by the addition of Permit Parking spaces in the Municipal

Since most of the Main Street, and many side street spaces, have a three hour maximum, business operators are forced to move their vehicles every three hours or risk a ticket. With the new plan, this would be eliminated by the use of the all-day permit spaces.

Under the new arrangement, the majority of the spaces in the Victoria and the William Street lots would become Permit Spaces while a significant number of others would become three hour spots.

In addition, there would be overnight parking allowed in the permit section of the Wellington lot.

The plan would not only result in a 15 per cent increase in the number of overall spaces due to the re-organization of the municipal parking lots, but permit fees would become an additional source of revenue for the town.

Council will now send the proposed plan to both the BIA and EDC committees for their input before coming to a final deci-

In other news, the Council approved a Committee of Adjustment recommendation to allow the new Blue Mountain Plastics/ Ice River Springs building to exceed current height restrictions, for a portion of the structure, in order to accommodate a state of the art piece of recycling machinery for plastic water bottles. Approval was also given for the severing of two lots currently considered as one at 428/430 Main Street

Plans are also going well for the upcoming Canada 150 Celebrations and the Heritage Music festival, according to Councillor Dan Sample.


Through regular outings, a relationship is developed between the



Wolves left wing Logan Leonardo said he thought the squad put a lot of sweat equity on the ice in the final game.



You might want to consider what James has to say about the source of such a quality of life. He writes in James 3:13-16, "Who is wise and understanding among you? Let him show it by his good life, by deeds done in the humility that comes from wisdom. {14} But if you harbor bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not boast about it or deny the truth. {15} Such "wisdom" does not come down from heaven but is earthly, unspiritual, of the devil. {16} For where you have envy and selfish ambition, there you find disorder and every evil practice."

How do you feel when someone you know succeeds or advances? Do you perceive their success as a diminishment of yours? Do you

allow negative feelings to rise up within you as a result? Remember you will reap what you

The expression of genuine gratitude, recognition and well wishes to others in their successes and achievements is a part of the process of eliminating envy. 





Distracted driving continues to be cause for alarm

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) are report- families safe starts and ends with each of us." ing that 2016 marked the fourth consecutive year that inattentive drivers were behind the highest number of lives lost on OPP-patrolled roads over the other main causal factors in road fatalities, known as the "Big Four."

In total, 65 people died in OPP-investigated collisions last year in which an inattentive driver was either a contributing factor or the primary cause of the death. In comparison to the other Big Four categories, 2016 ended with 55 speed-related, 53 seatbelt-related and 45 alcohol-related deaths.

As officers get set to conduct their annual province-wide Distracted Driving Campaign, the OPP is looking to Ontarians to help with the educational component of the campaign - a role that remains critical to helping keep Ontario roads safe.

"Road deaths linked to distracted drivers will not let up unless every road user says 'enough is enough' and shows a complete intolerance for what continues to be the most life-threatening driver behaviour on our roads," said OPP Commissioner Vince Hawkes. "Starting with this campaign, we want to see every Ontarian, especially passengers of all ages, take a firm stand against those who endanger their lives by using their cell phones or engaging in other forms of distractions behind the wheel."

ALWAYS CONFIRM WHO YOU'RE DEALING WITH: OPP

As part of the annual Fraud Prevention Month awareness campaign, the OPP want you to confirm who you're dealing with before sending any money anywhere for any reason.

The Emergency Scam - also known as the "Grandparent Scam" - the more recent Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), and other agency-related extortion threats have increased the financial losses sustained by unsuspecting victims. In 2016, the Emergency (or Grandparent) Scam claimed 474 victims in Canada from more than 1,100 complaints who lost nearly \$2.5 million. The CRA fraud drew 15,091 complaints, resulting in 751 identified victims who lost a combined \$2.49 million. Police admit 95 per cent of the crimes go

In the typical Emergency Scam, the victim will receive a frantic phone call from someone claiming to be a grandchild or loved one. The caller will explain that they are involved in some sort of mishap or are having trouble returning from a foreign country and need money "right away."

In the CRA scam, the criminals extort money Added Marie-France Lalonde, Minister of from their victims by telephone, mail, text mesclaims to be from the Canada Revenue Agency requesting personal information such as a social insurance number, credit card number, bank account number, or passport number. Fraudsters impersonate the real CRA by telephone or by email. Fraudsters are either phishing for your identification or asking that outstanding taxes be paid by a

money service business or by pre-paid debit/credit cards. They may insist that this personal information is needed so that the taxpayer can receive a refund or a benefit payment. Cases of fraudulent communication could also involve threatening or coercive language to scare individuals into paying

fictitious debt to the CRA. Other communications urge taxpayers to visit a fake CRA website where the taxpayer is then asked to verify their identity by entering personal information. These are scams and taxpayers should never respond to these fraudulent communications nor click on any of the links provided.

Here are some warning signs:

- Urgency The scammer always makes the request sound very urgent, which may cause the victim to not verify the story.
- Fear The scammer plays on the victim's emotions by generating a sense of fear. For instance they may say, "I am scared and I need help from you."
- Secrecy The scammer pleads with the

tion, such as, "Please don't tell Dad or Mom, they would be so mad."

Request for Money Transfer - Money is usually requested to be sent by a money transfer company such as Money Gram, Western Union or even through your own banking institution.

To avoid becoming a victim, police advise you to first check with another family member or trusted friend to verify the information BEFORE sending money or providing credit card information by phone, e-mail or online.

If you or someone you know suspect they've been a victim of the Emergency Scam or someone posing as a Canada Revenue Agency employee, hang up and contact your local police service. You can also file a complaint through the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477 (TIPS), or online at www.tipsubmit.com/ start.htm.


