## FTP celebrating International Women's Day in style

In a stunning new report released by the Global Economic Forum, it has been estimated that gender parity will not truly exist in our world for another 200 years. Yes, you read that right, two whole centuries. That's roughly six generations. So, with that being said, you can probably expect your grandkids' grandkids to have to fight the same issues we fight today regarding equality.

While it's unclear what type of progress could be made between then and now to speed things up, Norah Kennedy, along with the entire team at Dufferin-Caledon's Family Transition Place, are doing what they can to combat the issue of gender parity right here in the community. It is an arduous, at times frustrating fight, admits Ms. Kennedy, who serves as the organization's executive director. But it's one she's absolutely committed to seeing through to the end.

Since arriving in the community in 1984, FTP has provided critical services to thousands of women and children who have experienced abuse and unhealthy relationships. While there has been "great progress" made in many ways since then, the local facility still finds itself in a position where demand for its services is on the rise, rather than on the decline.

Over the past 18 months, FTP has reported an average 10 percent increase across the board in clients served per program. This is an issue that is getting worse in our area, Ms.

Kennedy states.

"Our emergency shelter in Orangeville is never empty. We almost never have a spare bed, as soon as one becomes available there's somebody else straight through the door," Ms. Kennedy told the Free Press. "We have extensive waiting lists for our counseling services. We're taking phone calls every day. It's a truly, truly concerning trend."

The facility provided emergency shelter for 103 women and 65 children between April 1, 2016 and April 1, 2017, while putting up 20 women and 23 children in second stage housing. 388 women signed up for woman abuse counselling, 151 women and 22 men enrolled in sexual abuse counselling, while 318 women and 5 men required transitional support services. In total, FTP received 3,742 calls on its crisis and information lines.

And so, with March 8 officially marking International Women's Day, Norah is keen to press home the fact that there are truly remarkable people in our community working to put an end to gender equality and all forms of abuse – against both men and women. The organization is hosting its seventh annual International Women's Day Luncheon Fundraiser at the Best Western in Orangeville today. Kicking off at 11:30 a.m. and running until 1:30 p.m., the event will feature comedian Judy Croon as keynote speaker.

Her "hilarious and inspirational" speech will explore seven stress-relieving ingredi-

ents, while also touching on how humour can help us all live a better life. There will also be several local businesses on hand to put on a special women's vendor marketplace.

"It really is a fabulous day, a really, really fun day that we here at FTP really look forward to and enjoy, because much of the work we do is really heavy and intense. On International Women's Day we're able to take a step back and celebrate," Ms. Kennedy said. "We're going to have around 300 people come together in the main ballroom, so the atmosphere will be really good."

The event serves as one of FTP's two main fundraisers and in recent years has raked in roughly \$30,000 for the local non-profit. Ms. Kennedy is optimistic this "incredibly generous" community will come together once again to raise at least \$30,000 for the centre.

Globally, the theme for this year's International Women's Day is 'Press for Progress' – a direct reference to the shocking Global Economic Forum report released late last year.

"I think what the organizers of the event are trying to get across with this theme is what kind of responsibility can we take to bring that 200-year mark forward, because it's completely ridiculous to think we will have to go that long without gender parity," Ms. Kennedy said.

# New Foundation to enrich Dufferin holds very first meeting

The Board of the Dufferin Community Foundation (DCF) recently held its inaugural meeting at the Lord Dufferin Centre. The long term goal of the Foundation is to enrich the community wellbeing of the County.

The new Foundation is an initiative of Headwaters Communities in Action (HCIA), established in 2004 to engage the public in vital community conversations and support the start-up of collaborative projects that enhance life in Dufferin, such as DCF.

The foundation is now officially a free-standing and incorporated entity - however, it still benefits from administrative support from HCIA, as well as some funding from the County. Project Lead for HCIA, Shirley Boxem says, "This demonstrates the County's commitment to building a strong community and speaks very highly of their vision."

Ms. Boxem says, "Foundations such as

the Dufferin Community Foundation "are a means to build support for community efforts and sustainability for not-for profit organizations."

In the works for two years, Ms. Boxem says the DCF effort has been a passion of, Gord Gallagher the newly elected Chair of the Foundation. He brought the directors team together to lay the ground work for incorporation and communications in order to build the Foundation.

The new Board of the Dufferin Community Foundation includes: Gord Gallagher, Chair; MaryAnn Lowry, Vice-Chair; Joan Waechter, Director; Steve Doney, Treasurer; Laura Ryan, Director; and Shirley Boxem, Secretary.

"Now the harder work of fund building and community engagement will really ramp up," says Ms. Boxem. Currently, a launch subcommittee is in the planning phase of an official fall launch event.

"A very key importance is building philanthropy by connecting donors, and

particularly new donors, with causes that matter to them," says Ms. Boxem. "While donations can always go directly to efforts, garnering requests and future donations going to a foundation means that a solid base can be built for long term impact."

In a press release, Gord Gallagher says, "When it gets down to measuring success over the next five years, we'll be judged by our ability to build great partnerships with existing foundations and charitable groups to expand philanthropy in Dufferin. We'll be working hard to establish and grow endowment funds, conduct and publish research on community needs, and start using the investment earnings to support worthy projects."

The DCF plans for community participation include:

- Founders Circle - a group of individuals or families invest in the Foundation with a \$2,500 donation and a role as ambassadors in the community
- Corporate Circle - representatives

from the Dufferin business community contribute \$5000 or more, provide sponsorships, and/or act as advisors to the Board

• Committees of the Board - in addition to Directors, community members will be welcomed to join the Finance (Funds & Grants) or the Community Outreach Committee.

"As we deepen our investment base," says Mr. Gallagher, "non-profit organizations can apply to the Foundation for grants to support projects in the areas of arts and culture, citizenship, connected communities, education, healthcare and healthy living, heritage, and innovations in natural resources and the environment."

According to Shirley Boxem, "more than 90% of Canadian communities - large and small - have a community foundation with more than \$5.2 billion in assets and have put hundreds of millions of dollars back into the community over almost 100 years." ## FTP celebrates International Women's Day in style with 7th annual luncheon

"Whether it be recognizing women achievements, committing to gender equality in the workplace... As a man, committing to respectful conversations and respecting women's rights. There's lots we can and should be doing to try and bridge this monumental gap."

While there are many days where Norah admits she comes close to banging her head against a wall, she looks positively back on what the past 100 years have brought for women. Until legislation was passed in 1929, women were not even officially recognized as a person in Canada, instead being referred to as property. Since that time, women have secured the right to vote, to work and to represent communities, provinces and, in Kim Campbell's brief tenure, to run the nation.

"When my mother was born in 1929, she wasn't a person. I remember the stories she used to tell me growing up... There has been lots of shift and lots of change since those days. This one day of the year is a chance for us to celebrate those advances. Not resting on our laurels though, we also know it's an opportunity to bring the types of issues we're seeing today - you only need to look towards the #MeToo movement - to the fore in the hopes of eradicating them forever."

She added, "There's still a long, long way to go if we're seriously going to chip away

at that 200-year projection. We're already working hard in this community on our educational programs for youth. While there are horrible issues prevalent in our community today, we're hoping, through our programming, through reaching kids at our local high schools, that they won't be as much of an issue 10 years from now."

"While it is discouraging seeing our numbers rise at such an alarming rate, all we can and should be thinking about, rather than getting discouraged, is thank goodness we're here. If there's someone in our community that needs support, needs that security and that safe place to lay their head at night, at least we're here to help them out. A lot of women from communities all across the world unfortunately don't have that opportunity. So, for that, we're thankful," Ms. Kennedy concluded.

In conjunction with its International Women's Day Luncheon, Family Transition Place will be releasing the sixth iteration of its Celebrating Women magazine. Featuring advertisements and articles focused on interesting women in our community, the magazine is available to the public as of today.

# Dance to raise funds for local family after fire ravages their home

Residents in and around Melancthon Township are coming together to hold a fundraising concert to help long time residents John and Doreen Sipple recover some of their losses due to a devastating fire that took their home and belongings on Feb. 11. "We feel thankful," says the couple, "What a wonderful community."

Although the Sipples escaped injury, the fire raged through their century old home, robbing them of everything they owned. Valiant efforts by the Mulmur-Melancthon fire department were hampered by various elements and they could not stop the fire which spread quickly causing close to \$500,000 in damage.

"The fire crews performed well under difficult circumstances due to cold weather," said Mayor Darren White, "keeping the fire from spreading to neighbouring structures, but the house was a full loss."

The community efforts have been many, including the evening concert which will be hosted by actress Mag Ruffman, with music provided by Dufferin County Line. Local auctioneer Bob Severn will be running a live auction at the event, which also includes a cash bar, food, and a 50/50 draw.

"Our Township is happy that the local community has rallied together around the

homeowners to support them in their time of need," says Darren White.

The event is sponsored by the Horning's Mills Hall, and the Pine River Institute is loaning their kitchen for food preparation. Residents are encouraged to come out and bring their "dancing boots."

"While a loss like this is certainly heart-breaking and tragic, no one was hurt in the fire and that is of course the most important thing," says Melancthon Mayor Darren White.

## Watching the detectives

I read a very interesting article recently that involved an interview with a former Central Intelligence Agency operative.

Television, he said, is the "greatest propaganda tool" ever invented.

It's in almost every home and pretty much everyone watches it daily for either news, entertainment, sports, or whatever other garbage the networks are producing during the daytime viewing hours for the terminally dull who think "The View" or "The Maury Show" contain entertaining programming.

This CIA agent wouldn't say exactly how the agency uses television to influence opinion, but he did imply that it works – and it works well.

People believe what they see on screen – either the big screen or the little screen. Companies don't spend millions of dollars on Super Bowl ads for no reason.

If Oprah Winfrey wore a donut pinned to her head as a hat during one of her shows you can be sure within a few days thousands of women would be sporting chocolate dips or Bavarian creams from Tim Hortons as headpieces.

A lot of people, most notably those

involved in producing television and movies, claim that these productions don't influence people to any degree.

However, speech patterns alone show the influence movies have on the public.

At one time, profanity was generally kept to certain places or cultures – hence the term 'swears like a sailor.' It wasn't used in common conversation and certainly not what was then considered 'polite society.'

You were judged on your speech in a way that defined your level of sophistication, upbringing, and education.

Starting in the 1970's, movies suddenly did a subtle shift with a few bad words that were tossed into movies for emphasis. By the '90's, some movies (see Goodfellas – count 321) were noted for how many times the 'f-bomb' was dropped in the space of two hours. Now, just about every movie with the exception of ones produced for pre-teens is filled with profanity for comedy, drama, and everything in between.

The result can be heard in shopping malls, arenas, any public place where the 'f-word' is now used as a verb, an adjective, noun, or just to fill in a sentence for no particular reason, and not just by a single

group of people – it's now very common.

If movies can influence an entire generation or two's way of speaking, what else can the big screen manipulate?

In a recent survey by a U.S. company trying to figure out how much we are influenced by media, they found that only 17 per cent of people could name just three justices of the U.S. Supreme Court, yet 59 per cent of those same people could name all of the Three Stooges.

It is estimated that by the time an average kid finishes elementary school they have seen around 8,000 murders on TV. By the time they are 18, it's 200,000.

While murder in television and movies may be entertainment for some, those killings are two-dimensional acts played out on a screen without finishing with the real-life consequences of taking a life.

Violence has always played a part in the movies; however, the level of violence has gone from being a part of a story line to that of a main feature of the film.

Humphrey Bogart plugged a few guys on screen with his snub-nosed .38, but it was always in self-defence and as a part of a story. Bang – the bad guy falls down

dead and the cops arrest someone – end credits.

That has changed to story lines where killing for the sake of killing is the main selling point and doing it in graphic detail has become the norm.

Director Quentin Tarantino orders fake blood for his movies by the 45 gallon drum. The more blood the better. The more killings packed into a 120-minute screenplay the more the audience cheers.

Is it any wonder mass shootings have increased along with the same pace as violence on television, movies and even video games?

While the Academy Awards on Sunday night pretended to be festival of congratulations, there was of course the underlying 'me too' movement that was a part of the event.

If Hollywood was really concerned about problems in society, they would do a lot more self-examination of what they are producing and the effects it has on society.

# Orangeville man among eight charged in alleged child exploitation cases

An Orangeville man is facing numerous child pornography and other sexual-related charges after a province-wide investigation turned up eight individuals accused of multiple offences against children.

In collaboration with its municipal law enforcement partners, the OPP's Child Sexual Exploitation Unit recently executed 10 search warrants across the province relating to cases of child sexual exploitation. These warrants led to the arrest of eight individuals, against whom a total of 36 charges were laid. Some of the accused have past convictions for child pornography and sexual offences against children.

Christopher Robinson, 40, of Orangeville faces two counts of agreeing to commit a sexual offence against a person under 16 years, two of invitation to sexual touching of a person under 16 years, and one count each of possession of child pornography, accessing child pornography and making available child pornography.

Police first identified Mr. Robinson as a

potential offender in January when, in the course of an online undercover investigation, the Sureté du Québec alleged he was seeking to engage in sexual relations with two girls, aged six and eight. Further investigation was carried out by the OPP on Feb. 7, with its Child Sexual Exploitation Unit, accompanied by Orangeville Police Service members, executing a search warrant at his residence. In addition to evidence of the original offence, police seized computers said to contain images of child sexual abuse.

Police confirmed there are no connections between the various cases, noting they are all independent investigations.

Also arrested and charged with sexual-related offences against children were Ernest Hesse, 35, of Stratford; David Banks, 49, of Fordwich; Bruce Davidson, 47 of Formosa; Justin Campbell, 31, of Walkerton; Jacob Baker, 29, of Owen Sound, and Lee Hughes, 36 of Kintore. As part of the investigation, Justin Horrigan, 23, of Fordwich was charged with possession of illegal drugs and possession of stolen property.

OPP Commissioner Vince Hawkes noted this

investigation was one of many the provincial force has carried out in recent times, noting it was of the utmost importance that police do what they can to protect children from potential predators.

"Our most fundamental responsibility as a society is to protect our children from those who would do them harm," Mr. Hawkes said. "The OPP will continue to aggressively identify and pursue individuals who use technology to exploit children. These investigations highlight to many OPP, municipal and First Nations officers who are working diligently to keep our children safe."

### Vehicle stop results in drug seizure

Just before midnight on Friday night (March 2) Shelburne Police stopped a vehicle after it displayed some suspicious driving patterns. What started out to be a check on the well-being and condition of the driver; resulted in all four occupants of the vehicle being arrested for drug possession.

Seized from the vehicle were quantities of what appeared to be three types of drugs: Mar-

ijuana, Cocaine, and MDA (a variant on MDMA commonly known as ecstasy). The total street value of the seized substances is approximately \$800.

The four occupants were not from Shelburne and were made up of a mix of youth and young adults.

Further investigation revealed that two of the occupants were on numerous probation and court recognizances.

As a result all four occupants were charged with varying offences. The 18 charges are broken down as follows: 4x Possession of Marijuana, 2x Possession of Schedule 1 Substance, 4x Fail to Comply with Recognizance, 2x Fail to Comply with Probation, 4x Fail to Comply with Sentence, 2x Document related charges

All four accused were provided a court date at the Orangeville Court House in late May to answer to the allegations.

As per provisions in the Youth Criminal Justice Act, police cannot release the identities of any of the youth involved. Therefore the names of the adults are also not being released as this could potentially identify the youth.

## Newell running for Trillium Party

The social conservative Trillium Party of Ontario is going to be represented in Dufferin-Caledon in this year's provincial election.

Melancthon resident Andrew Nowell has announced he will be carrying the party's colours in the coming campaign.

He said this will be his first venture into the political arena, but he has become involved with his local landowners' association, and began working on issues dealing with the local farming community.

"It kind of started from there," he said.

Mr. Nowell, 54, and his wife have three grown children and one grandson. They currently live on a horse farm with their extended family of rescued horses, ponies and llamas.

He also commented that he likes the direction Trillium seems to be taking.

"I really, truly thought they were going to be the party of the people," he remarked, "rather than for the leaders, which at times seem to have their own agendas."

He also stated there is growing unrest with both the Liberals and the Progressive Conservatives.

"People of Ontario are looking for something different," he said. "There is a chance the Trillium Party will grow during this election."

Mr. Nowell said he's been a member of the party for about a month. He commented that he heard about it through a neighbour, and was intrigued when he met Elizabeth Marshall, the Trillium candidate in Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound. That prompted him to look into the party in more detail.

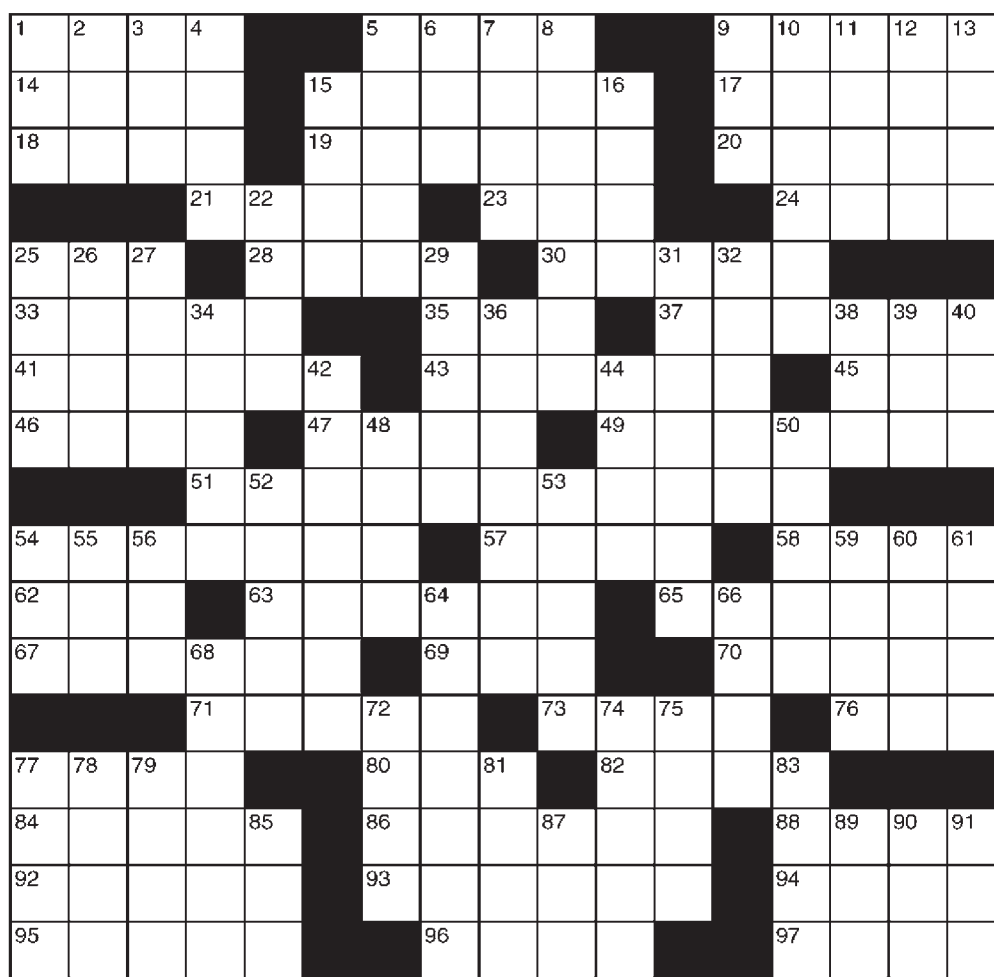
Wikipedia describes the Trillium Party as "a right-wing, social conservative political party" that ran two candidates in the 2014 provincial election and received 397 votes.

Since the Trillium Party lacks official party status, he is listed by the Legislature as an independent.

He said he's noticed more young families moving out of downtown Toronto because of high housing prices, which presents challenges to Dufferin-Caledon such as transportation and space.

However, he pointed to the province leading the country in economic growth and GDP. "We have an unemployment rate that's been lower than the national average for the last 33 months."

Mr. Gordanier discussed his platform, saying some of the changes he wishes to see are on infrastructure and transport, as so many must commute to Toronto and Brampton. "Dufferin-Caledon has not been able to fulfill some of the things that are needed, from Shelburne right down into Bolton."

He believes that Dufferin-Caledon isn't getting the support and relationships it needs, and must "make a big change to get that support."

Mr. Gordanier explained that he has family members living here, the youngest being four and the oldest 92, and so knows what the various demographics need. "Somebody's failing down here to get something down."

Mr. Del Duca explained he's been working on dealing with the challenges and negative impacts of the United States putting a tax on steel, and the continued NAFTA talks. "We think it's critically important to stand up for our workers and businesses."

He said the Liberal party stands on the side of fairness, and is expecting a heated

election. "A strong economy supports a strong quality of life."

When discussing the impending loss of Cando Rail, operator of the Orangeville-Brampton Railway, Mr. Gordanier said it's not a good thing, but "These things do come to an end, everything comes to an end."

Asked his thoughts on the election, he said it's going to be close and very heated.

"Are there issues? Absolutely, of course there's issues, there will always be issues. But we need to start solving some of these things instead of just telling people everything is wonderful."

## Christian Perspectives: What are you communicating to others

In his book, Zen In The Marital Arts, Joe Hyams tells the story about two martial artists who had been friends. One was an instructor and his friend, who chose to open his own dojo. In the process, the friend took several students with him from the instructor's dojo. These individuals became irrationally hostile and confrontational towards each other. Joe Hyams writes, "They displayed all the behaviour one might expect of misbehaved children, indicating to me that it is possible to be a martial arts master without mastering the spirit of Zen."

I would suggest the same is true within the church. There are many people who have mastered the intellectual aspects of God's Word, they have memorized the catechisms of their religion and can even spit out the appropriate lingo, but in the course of the living of their lives, they have not mastered the Spirit of Christ.

Too often it takes very little for there to be a squabble in the ranks of the "faithful," with hurt feelings and bitterness being expressed. Then the proclamation is expressed, "If that is what a "Christian" is like, I want nothing to do with it." Each person goes off in a huff and diminishes themselves in the process

The reality is, this is not an isolated event or practice. It happens in clubs and organizations of all types and sizes. It really has everything to do with the mindset and attitudes with which people live. It is an inner process which is in need of transformation. Only when that occurs will you find enhancement in the outer expressions of how life is lived in relationship to both God and others

The Apostle Paul wrote in Ephesians 4:2-3 these words, "With all humility and gentleness, with patience, bear with one another in love, [3] making every effort to keep the

unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

How we respond to others is a clear statement of our expression of love. 1 Corinthians 13-4-8 reminds us, "Love is patient, love is kind, it is not envious. Love does not brag, it is not puffed up. [5] It is not rude, it is not self-serving, it is not easily angered or resentful. [6] It is not glad about injustice, but rejoices in the truth. [7] It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends."

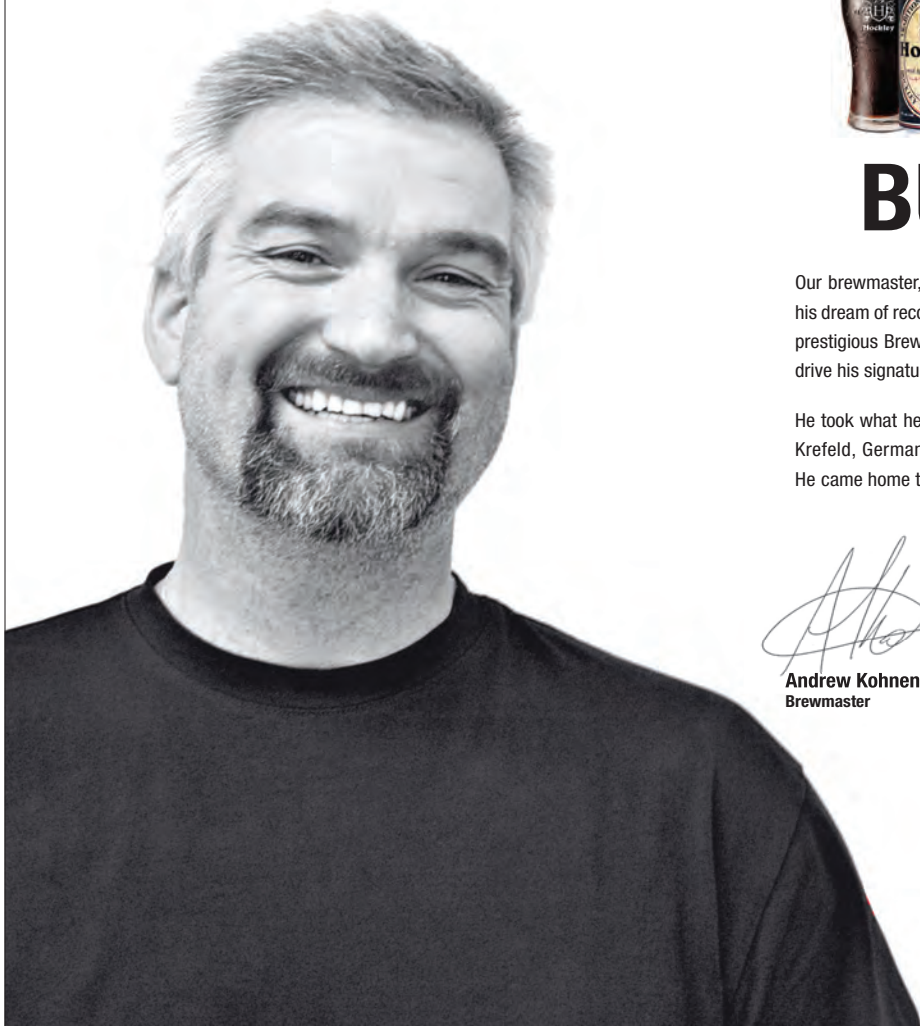
