Take notice that the Corporation of the Town of Shelburne has received complete applications for a Draft Plan of Subdivision and Zoning By-law Amendment and will hold a public meeting on:

MONDAY, APRIL 23, 2018

The public meeting is scheduled to start at 7:00 p.m., or as shortly thereafter as possible, and will be held in the Council Chambers at the Municipal Office, 203 Main Street East, Shelburne.


The purpose of the meeting is to consider a Draft Plan of Subdivision and Amendment to the Town of Shelburne Zoning By-law No. 38-2007. These applications (File Nos. DPS 18/01 and Z18/01) were deemed complete and circulated with Notice of Complete Applications given on January 5, 2018.

The land subject to the proposed Draft Plan of Subdivision and Zoning By-law Amendment is located in the north-east quadrant of the intersection of Highway 10/89 and County Road 124. The subject property has a municipal address of 900 Main Street East and is legally described as Part of the West Half of Lot 1, Concession 1, Old Survey, in the Town of Shelburne, County of Dufferin. The subject property is 38.4 hectares in area and is currently vacant. A map showing the location of the subject property is provided below

The purpose and effect of the Draft Plan of Subdivision application is to permit a proposed development consisting of lots and blocks for commercial and residential land uses, including 47 condominium townhouse dwelling units, 55 street townhouse dwelling units, 218 single detached dwelling units, as well as blocks for a park, open space, stormwater management facility, natural heritage system and buffer blocks, and a sanitary pump station. The development is proposed to be accessed via an internal road network with full movement accesses at two proposed new intersections, one on Highway 10/89 and one on County Road 124.

The purpose and effect of the related application for Zoning By-law Amendment is to re-zone the property from the Special Commercial Four Exception 3 Holding (C4-2(H)) Zone, Open Space Recreation Exception 1 Holding (OSR-1(H)) Zone, Natural Environment (NE) Zone, and the Development (D) Zone to Residential Three Exception (R3-#) Zones, Residential Five Exception # (R5-#) Zones, Mixed-Use Commercial (C2) Zone, Mixed-Use Commercial Exception # (C2-#) Zone, Open Space Recreation (OSR) Zone, and the Natural Environment (NE) Zone. The requested exceptions are requested to permit altered zone standards, including frontages, lot coverages, and building height, among others.

# It's a precious right

We have an election coming in June. That's right – it's your chance to exercise your democratic right to say who you want to form the next provincial government and who you want to represent you locally at Queens Park.

This is a right that was fought for on many levels.

At one time women didn't even have the right to cast a ballot until some of them banded together and made it clear that they are adults, members of society, intelligent, and deserved the same right to vote in a government as any man.

Others have defended the right to vote by taking up arms. Not just here, but in many places around the globe, and you can bet there are still a lot of countries on the planet were the right to choose the government is denied at the point of a rifle barrel.

Don't like the current government? You would like them a lot less if the right to vote were eliminated and you were subject to the powers of a tyrannical government that tells you that you will like them or else.

Do you think the people of North

Korea love the 'Dear Leader' as they call him, because he's a great man and runs the country well?

No, they 'love' him because if they even thought about trying to vote him out of office they would be arrested at gunpoint, probably disappear, and their families and anyone who associated with them would be extremely nervous for the next few years fearing they might be relocated to a mult-generational re-education camp.

Even with this constitutional right we have to elect our government, almost half the eligible voters in Ontario won't be bothered to put down the remote, turn off Jerry Springer, and take ten minutes to go to the polling station to make an X on a piece of paper.

It's a very simple process. Even if you are totally befuddled at the prospect of reading the names on a ballot and making a mark, there are volunteers there that will guide you through the entire process and won't charge you a dime for their services. They will even show you how to use a pencil to mark your choice on the ballot.

One of the biggest excuses I've always heard is "There's no one worth voting for."

Seriously? Most people elected to public office do have something to contribute. They are intelligent, well-spoken, and dedicated. Otherwise their political party wouldn't have selected them as a local candidate.

If they don't do the job as expected, you have the same option to vote them out the next time around.

Even if you really thought there was no one worth voting for, it still makes more sense to cast a ballot for the person or party you believe best represents your interest rather than to let everyone else decide for you.

It would be hard to believe that in all the elections we've had at three levels of government, and all the candidates that have thrown their hat in the ring, there was 'no one worth voting for.'

I suspect people that use this excuse not to vote are actually covering for the fact that either they are blindly ignorant of the political process and the agen-The reasons people don't vote are var- das and platforms of political parties,

or they are that part of the population that are easily led through life preferring to be told what to do rather than

take action and be part of a self-determination process.

I know people that have never cast a ballot, not once, in any election. Yet, when I ask why they would not take the time to drive to the polling station and vote, the answer has always been a shrug and a blank stare.

Complaining about the government is a long-standing Canadian tradition for some reason - no one is ever satisfied - but at least we have the option to com-

At one point, I asked to be disconnected so I could go to the washroom. When I opened the door, I saw that there was blood in the toilet and more on the walls and door handle. I turned around to let them know, at the same time meeting up with an orderly who was donning rubber gloves. He said "Yeah, we know". That's all I heard, and never found out how the blood got there.

In this miasma of humanity, there were more things added to the mix. The screaming of terrified children. The sound and smell of someone vomiting. More shouting and the sound of a scuffle as the aggressive guy returned and was hustled off the property. A woman crying as she wheeled her demented grandmother in.

My particular gurney was moved, because they needed the room, and I was parked to one side of a long hallway, then informed I had to stay for another four hours for more blood tests. The nurse apologized, put all of my belongings on the gurney with me, and said "Yeah, this is what we call health care today. At least you can say you were one of the Kids in

God bless these people. They are not all angels, of course, although I did meet some that fit that description. There were others that got a little desperate at times, but kept up a professional attitude as best they could.

I only hope that if I am ever brought in for something "self-inflicted" that they are as kind to me.
