



Directors serve terms of up to three years and are eligible to serve for a maximum of nine years. The names of Peel nominees will be submitted to the GTAA Board of Directors for final consideration and appointment.

The GTAA is responsible for managing and operating Toronto Pearson International Airport which is Canada's largest airport and a leading global hub. In 2017, Toronto Pearson served 47.1 million passengers and generated \$1.37 billion in revenue. The GTAA employs approximately 1,600 employees, 80 per cent of whom are members of two unions. The GTAA is a Canadian Airport Authority and a non-share capital corporation under the Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act. Fifteen Directors serve as the GTAA Board Members. Directors must possess the skills and experience to oversee the GTAA's complex commercial business and owe a fiduciary duty to the GTAA like those of any other corporate Director. Director remuneration is determined and paid by the GTAA.

The GTAA is a reporting issuer under Canadian securities legislation. - not be, or within two years immediately preceding the date of appointment not have been, a member of the Senate of Canada, the House of Commons or the legislature of a province, or an elected official of a municipality located within the South Central Ontario Region;
- not be, or within two years immediately preceding the date of appointment not have been, an employee of the Government of Canada, a province or a crown corporation, an officer or employee of a municipality located within the South Central Ontario Region, or an employee of the GTAA; and
- not be a director, officer or employee of any person who has, or within six months immediately preceding the date of appointment had, a financial or commercial agreement or arrangement with the GTAA, the Government of Canada or the Ontario Government, The Regional Municipalities of Peel, York, Halton or Durham or the City of Toronto that could reasonably be perceived to interfere with their ability to discharge their fiduciary duty to act honestly and in good faith in the best interests of the GTAA.



# Looking at the Liberal government's carbon tax cover-up

There is increasing concern about the cost of the current Liberal government's carbon tax, which Prime Minister Trudeau is trying to push through without providing Canadians an honest explanation about what it will cost them. This is not the transparent government the Prime Minister promised during the 2015 campaign. What's more concerning is a recent report from the Parliamentary Budget Officer (PBO) with a grim outlook on the impact of the carbon tax on the GDP and this year's deficit. Canadians are being asked to dig even deeper into their pockets to find money to pay for Prime Minister Trudeau's out-of-control spending and for a carbon tax without divulging what it will cost.

On April 23, 2018, the PBO tabled his Economic and Fiscal Outlook – April 2018. His report finds that the current Liberal government's carbon tax will reduce the GDP by \$10 billion per year by 2022 and that this year's deficit will be \$22 billion. This figure is almost four times what Prime Minister Justin Trudeau promised. Furthermore, interest on the national debt will rise to almost \$40 billion by 2022, which works out to be an increase of nearly two-thirds from last year and much higher than Finance Minister Morneau promised.

# What are the Proposed Changes?

The applicant has applied for a Plan of Subdivision, Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment to facilitate a mixed use development that includes residential, commercial and environmental protection components. The applicant is proposing 38 condominium townhouse
