## Giant Hogweed: Be Careful!

Giant Hogweed is an invasive plant that has been found in many parts of Ontario. If sap touches skin or eyes, it could have harmful health effects.

#### WHAT DOES IT LOOK LIKE?

Giant Hogweed looks similar to cow parsnip and can be about 4.5 to 6 meters tall. The plant has hollow stems with dark reddish-purple splotches and coarse white hair, leaves as wide as 1.5 meters with hairs on the underside, flattened oval shaped fruit, and small white flowers in the summer.

#### WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I COME IN **CONTACT WITH IT?**

If clear watery sap from the plant's stem or hair touches your skin or eyes:

- Wash the affected areas immediately
- Avoid touching your eyes
- Stay out of the sun for at least 48 hours
- Seek medical attention

#### WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF YOU FIND **HOGWEED ON YOUR PROPERTY?**

Property owners are responsible for the removal of giant hogweed on private property. It is recommended that you hire a lawn care professional to remove it. If you do decide to remove the plant yourself, contact the Region of Peel at 905.791.9499 or visit **peelregion.ca** to obtain information on the safe removal and disposal.

#### WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF YOU FIND **HOGWEED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY?**





## The nose knows: Scents of history

"Nothing is more memorable than a smell. One scent can be unexpected, momentary and fleeting, yet conjure up a childhood summer beside a lake in the mountains."

We all come into this world pretty much the same.

From our safe, warm, aquatic incubators, we were presented to the cold, open world. In a shocking transition, we entered this huge, loud, bright environment where we spend the rest of our days.

As infants, we're totally helpless creatures who depend entirely on our guardians to keep us warm, safe and fed

What's fascinating is that we're complete packages, even before entering the world. We have all of our fingers and toes, and a complete set of senses. Our sense of smell and taste are fully developed, and strongest, at birth, unlike others that develop over the first year of life.

Our sense of smell impacts our brains, memories, emotions and tastes.

"Olfaction" has many purposes, such as detecting hazards, pheromones, and food. It integrates with other senses to form the sense of flavor. Olfaction occurs when odorants bind to specific sites on olfactory receptors located in the nasal cavity. Signals from these receptors transmit them to the olfactory bulb, where the sensory input will start to interact with parts of the brain responsible for smell identification, memory, and emotion.

The process by which olfactory information is coded in the brain to allow for proper perception is still being researched, and is not completely understood.

THE SEASON MAY be young, but the Under-17/18 HEADS Hurricanes women's soccer team has already earned some hardware – and on home field no less. The Erin-based team brought an unbeaten tournament record to a championship victory in the annual HEADS Up Cup, bringing teams of all ages from across Southern Ontario together for a two-day festival. A defensive-minded system of play led to a 0 - 0 tie with Ancaster in the round robin's opening game, before a tight 1 - 0 win over Brantford granted the Hurricanes a spot in the quarterfinal. Sunday morning brought about a 3 - 1 win over Dunville to continue their advance, while a pair of 1 - 0 wins over both Ancaster and the finalist Cherry Beach gave the Hurricanes the hometown title. Despite mostly consisting of an amalgamation of players ranged 15 - 18 from across multiple regions, including Caledon, Erin, and Orangeville, the diverse Hurricanes team has played to an undefeated record through ten league, exhibition, and tournament games so far this season. "Most of these players have all been playing competitive (rep) level soccer for many, many years, but not all on the same team throughout their careers," said coach Chris Hannaford, who added that the team is largely a result of a merging of multiple local clubs.
