



Search for missing man ends in sadness after OPP confirm D.J. Ardis found dead

The community was saddened to learn that the urgent search for local man, 24-yearold Doug 'DJ' Ardis was called off last Thursday.

Police reported they had found the truck, trailer and body of a deceased man at around 9:30 p.m. on June 14.

While the OPP have not as yet confirmed the body recovered is that of Ardis, his brother Sean took to Facebook on Friday to break the news.

"It's with a heavy heart that I announce the passing of Douglas Joseph Ardis," the release read. Sean would later go on to thank the community for all of their help in trying to locate his brother.

His disappearance was first reported to police on June 8. DJ was last seen at an p.m. at the Dundalk arena.

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

Inclusiveness running wild

I attended a rather large outdoor concert this past weekend featuring some top Bluegrass performers.

It was a fun weekend if you like that style of toe-tapping, head-bobbing, down home fiddle, banjo, and mandolin that makes Bluegrass what it is.

The opening ceremonies featured the usual remarks by organizers followed by the singing of both the American and Canadian national anthems.

The Star Spangled Banner was sung to acknowledge the presence of several American bands who were taking part in the festival.

When it was time to sing O Canada, a local vocalist took the stage and sang a Bluegrass style of the anthem accompanied by a man on guitar. It was really well done.

Then she came to that dreaded line.

It has been a while since I've heard the anthem performed live since the hockey season is over but I deliberately focused on the wording of the anthem - and yes, she sang "in all thy sons command."

This is the single line that caused such grief to so many. Forget the veterans living in poverty, forget world tensions, forget the deficit, forget about the fact that are drowning under a heavy tax burden, they saw fit to gain national attention because of one word.

I turned to watch the crowd as this was happening and saw a lot of smile and nods of approval. I wasn't the only one to pick up on the fact that the vocalist chose not to sing the words 'officially' changed in the anthem to reflect the desire for inclusiveness – the politically correct word meaning "I don't like it so you have to change for me.



Fraudsters are either phishing for your identification or asking that outstanding taxes be paid by a money service business or by pre-paid debit/credit cards. They may insist that this personal information is needed so that the taxpayer can receive a refund or a

Cases of fraudulent communication could also involve threatening or coercive language to scare individuals into paying fictitious debt to the CRA. Other communications such as texting, urge taxpayers to visit a fake CRA website where the taxpayer is then asked to verify their identity by enter-

Here are some warning signs:

Urgency-- The scammer always makes the way to arrest you."



For the first few days I walked with Silas down to the mailbox. I showed him the route, which box was ours, and we talked about safety on the streets. He did very well. The second day I let him carry the key himself, and the third day I let him try opening the box alone. It was a proud moment for him when we had a stack of mail (very unusual) and I asked him to carry them back to the house himself. We turned onto my street, and started up the long hill towards my house. As I walked, I noticed Silas was starting to lag behind a bit. That's not unusual; he notices birds and flowers and sometimes will stop to watch a butterfly. I kept going, and as I got to the second block I turned around to see how he was doing. I was surprised to see he was quite far behind me, clutching the mail like it weighed 20 pounds and labouring to step as if he were climbing one of the Rockies (he's very melodramatic). I called to him to come on, and continued to watch him as he walked painfully slowly towards me. When he finally reached me he breathlessly asked, "Why do we always have to climb this big hill?" Without laughing I answered him, "Because Nana's house is at the top!". (I must confess, there are times when my legs hurt climbing that hill too; especially when I haven't been exercising very often) It wasn't until the next morning, when I was journaling about the current struggles in my spiritual journey, that I realized a parallel to my walk with the Lord. Many times Scripture talks about 'walking' with the Lord, and we are never promised that it's going to be a straight path. There are many times when it seems uphill, and I don't feel like I can keep going. There are obstacles that seem insurmountable to me at times, and at other times I feel like I'm in a dark tunnel with no light at the end. Can you relate to this? At these times, it's important to remember that God promised, "never will I leave you, never will I forsake you" (Hebrews 13:5) and that He's always with us even when we don't feel like it. It's also important to remember where this journey is headed: to our Father's house! We know that our ultimate destination will be heaven, where we will live with Him forever.
