Shelburne Mayor Ken Bennington won't seek re-election in October's municipal vote

On Monday afternoon, after 20 years in public service, Shelburne Mayor Ken Bennington announced he would not be seeking re-election in October's municipal election.

When asked by the Free Press following a Council meeting on July 9, as to why he withdrew his nomination papers, Mayor Bennington said he would simply stand by his public statement on Facebook.

"With my heart heavy, after having served my community for 20 years of elected office, it is time to turn the page in my career as a public servant," Mayor Bennington wrote. "A new and exciting chapter awaits, and like a good book that you can't put down, I look forward to it with anticipation."

He added, "To the good people of Shelburne, it has been my pleasure and my honour to serve you. May God bless the Town of Shelburne and the wonderful people that call it home."

In further discussion on Monday, the mayor opened up enough to admit that his decision was influenced, in part, by his family and by an announcement from two other councillors that they would be signing papers on Tuesday to run against him as a mayor and deputy mayor combination. Mayor Bennington, after considerable soul searching and contemplation, decided that he would sooner withdraw than fight that potentially disruptive battle.

In explaining his decision, the mayor noted several decisive factors. One was the fact

that over the past year, he has been seen as being a primary force, in two public battles, one over the Feral Cat Rescue situation and the other and more recent, the Fiddle Park sale. Regardless of his personal stance on both issues, Ken felt that perceptions were against him. As the mayor, he was seen as the ultimate power in both cases and neither one was publicly favourable to either him or Council, in general.

A second, was the issue of the OPP costing and the local policing dilemma. It was no secret that the Mayor was and is a strong supporter of the existing force, however he also recognized the huge cost of maintaining the force while trying to build it a new home.

The Becketts “thrilled to return” to Heritage Music Festival

International fiddle performer Linsey Beckett says, “The Becketts are thrilled to be returning” as the Thursday night entertainment for the Shelburne Heritage Music Festival (HMF). “Fiddle music is deeply rooted in our family’s heritage,” she says, “so having the opportunity to perform on the iconic Shelburne stage is a huge honour.”

The Becketts, who have incorporated three and even four generations of the family into the show over the years have opened for acts like the late Canadian entertainer, Gordie Tapp, and Grammy-winner Charlie McCoy. They have enjoyed entertaining at a variety of country and folk festivals, performing with their “all-star band, equipped with telecaster and acoustic guitar, piano and swingin’ steel guitar.”

Stars of the show, siblings Linsey and Tyler Beckett, are both past fiddle contest winners, and Linsey is an award winning step dancer. They are two time Canadian duet fiddle champions and three time Ontario duet champions.

“Tyler and I can confidently say that the Shelburne fiddle contest played a large role

in our development of becoming professional fiddle players,” says Linsey, “and we are grateful for the opportunities and memories we have from our years of competing.”

Linsey says she is “truly honoured” to be a judge at the contest this year, stating her hope is to encourage as many fiddle players of all ages and abilities to participate and experience this wonderful tradition. Other judges include Scott Woods, Tyler Beckett, Karen Reed, Devon Ballagh and Kendra Norris.

“We can’t wait to kick off the Heritage Music Festival in true fiddle-style,” says Linsey, “with lots of Canadian Old Time Fiddling, Traditional Country Music and Ottawa Valley Step Dancing. Over the past 68 years, many of our “fiddling heroes” have competed or performed at The Canadian Open Fiddle Championships, including our Grandpa, Stan, who competed at Shelburne for the first time in 1952.”

Tyler Beckett’s bio includes working with musical artists, including the award winning bluegrass group, The Chapmans. Tyler has also established himself as a valued multi-instrumentalist, playing with Jason McCoy on a Canadian Service Tour to Afghanistan, and performing with a number of CCMA winners. Tyler currently holds the 2017 Central Bluegrass Fiddle Player of the Year Award for the fifth time.

Linsey Beckett’s bio includes working as a full-time musician and touring regularly with a variety of musical artists, including Charlie Major and Kelly Prescott. She has performed with the international string production Bowfire which led to exciting opportunities, performing with symphonies, Sean Connery’s 80th Birthday celebration in the Bahamas, and on the runway of New York Fashion Week’s “Dressed to Kilt.” Linsey continues to

freelance, perform and record with a variety of traditional fiddle, country and contemporary acts.

Mayor Ken Bennington won’t seek re-election in October vote

A home that would cost upwards of over \$8 million when completed. \$8 million that the Town simply does not have and would have to borrow the bulk of, in order to build. Considering all of the other infrastructure that the Town requires and that, the residents expect, even if it was possible to borrow the funds, the costs would be severely detrimental to the rest. The mayor

felt strongly, that these and other factors would make his chances of winning re-election dubious at best and so decided to let the new blood, coming up, face the problems while he watched studiously from the sidelines and moved on with his own agenda

Ken was clear about his reasons for becoming involved in public service, in the first place. He was not driven by a need for power or

public recognition, but rather was just a guy who wanted to help his community. It started with him being a volunteer firefighter and that led to being Hydro Commissioner and then a councillor, the Deputy Mayor and culminated in him becoming the Mayor. Now he felt that it was time to step away from public office and move ahead with the rest of his life. Recently re-married and with his

family interests at heart, he wants to change his priorities and look to a new future. As for Shelburne, his parting thoughts were that as a growing community, in search of new opportunities and new horizons, with a growing population diversity, both ethnically and spiritually, his wish was that the people of Shelburne simply “accept and love each other”!

Local councillors want to lead Shelburne out of “political suffering”, signal intent to run for mayor, deputy mayor

Tuesday morning bright and early, Shelburne received two new nominations, one for Mayor and one for Deputy Mayor, at the hands of Councillors Wade Mills and Steve Anderson.

Both men seek to bring Shelburne strongly, into the future and rapidly out of its current “political suffering”. While both gave a nod to Shelburne’s WASP past and the actions of previous municipal councils, they were adamant as to the need for cultural diversity, acceptance and inclusion within this rapidly expanding community.

Both were equally insistent that the atmosphere and lifestyle in town was what drew people here and what was most important to maintain, while adapting to the increased population growth and diversity. Neither candidate wanted to see Shelburne become another Brampton or Mississauga, however, they acknowledged that change was inevita-

ble and careful planning and development would be key to retaining the look and flavour of the town core.

It is their belief that a strong, united community is a prerequisite to a healthy and vibrant one and that the role of the municipal government is to face the hard decisions, listen to the residents and build on the strengths of the Town. To this end, they plan to solicit opinion and input from Shelburnites during and following the election, with both door to door and social media campaigning, and at least one “Town Hall” gathering in which to engage the electorate.

Although they may not form a ticket, illegal under current laws, they plan to work and campaign together due to their mutual sharing of goals and visions. Steve added that they have no assumption of victory, however they strongly believe in their responsibility to listen to and engage the people of Shelburne.

Both candidates plan to work hard on

reaching the populace via social media, which has become the new reality of politics, as anyone following the American political scene can clearly see. Both have and maintain websites, Facebook pages, Twitter feeds and Instagram accounts and will use all to reach out to and answer to the electorate.

In their minds, both individually and collectively, Shelburne is in good hands. Change is good and not to be feared, it does bring some unease, but these are exciting times, filled with hopeful opportunities and dramatic improvements. It is a time of “put up or shut up” said Anderson and they intend to do a lot of putting up.

Wade Mills said that too frequently, politics in Shelburne has been a “they to us” discussion, where Council has waited for the residents to come to them, when the reality, in his mind, should be the complete opposite. Council should be reaching out to the public with ideas and proposals for the residents to

comment on and discuss. Steve Anderson added that it was important to think outside the box. He wants to see new things happen within Shelburne, such as a community garden, perhaps somewhere within Fiddle Park and that these things could be supported by the community. He would like to see local businesses become involved in helping such projects come to fruition.

One strong point that Wade brought up, was the development of a strong arts and culture community within the town, to showcase the many local talents that exist here. This is something that Steve has an equally strong commitment to as well and has shown with his initiatives this past year to have the Town signs and social media welcome and celebrate different cultural days and events.

Both men hope that their racial differences will help to promote the diversity that is Shelburne today.

Council refuses to cover costs to tap private properties into main sewer line

Council Monday evening finally came to a decision regarding the sewage issues with 501 and 503 Owen Sound Street, which have occupied them for almost a full year.

The property owners, father and son Bruce and Greg Lemcke have argued that the current sewage lines that run through private property, without any easement for town access, were a municipal responsibility and any financial burden related to the line should not fall on the homeowners.

The position of the Town has been that there is no proof that the running and connection of those lines was authorized by the municipality when they were installed in the sixties. Further, the Town feels that the existing sewage lines are adequate for the existing residences. Despite considerable efforts by both the Lemckes and the Town Staff, no conclusive evidence has been found to support the claims of the homeowners, in the Town’s eyes.

At the last June Council meeting, staff was instructed to review all the proposed options for connecting to the town sewer mains and to present their findings and the costs for each on Monday night. This was done and presented by the CAO for council to decide the issue.

The decision, was that due to the fact that

no conclusive evidence was found to obligate the Town and that the sewage lines were adequate for the two residences, that the costs to connect would be the sole responsibility of the homeowners.

It was also noted that an application for severance for 501 Owen Sound Street, had been filed by Greg Lemcke and that this was to allow the building of semi-detached homes in place of the existing dwelling. This constitutes a development under the law and as such, all utility costs were the responsibility of the developer and not the Town. It was also noted that the original purchase of 503 was for the same purpose. For all of these reasons, the Council unanimously voted to reject any shared costing at 501-503 Owen Sound Street.

Haul routes

The Town Planner next outlined the changes to the two haul routes for fill for both the Hyland Village and the Fieldgate developments. These changes were to allow, the transportation of several thousand cubic metres of fill, with the least disruption to the town streets and the prevention of more heavy trucks traversing the Main Street downtown.

The Hyland fill was now coming from KTH and would travel along 30 Sideroad to Victoria and then along Victoria approximately

480 metres where it would traverse private property, south of the Besley Drain, to the development.

The Fieldgate route has not been changed, however, they requested they be allowed to haul from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. as opposed to the existing restriction of 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. so as to shorten the time required to transport their fill requirements and to better space out the trucks to avoid congestion on County Road 124.

After some discussion concerning pedestrians along 124, Council approved both changes.

Other business

Council heard from three delegations and a report from the treasurer concerning the

loss of the tax free status on municipal politician’s wages and the issuing of raises to compensate. Mayor Bennington was the sole voice in Council to oppose the raises. In his mind, the raises were simply more mouths at the public trough and completely unnecessary. It was his opinion that since the tax free section was to compensate for work related expenses, that municipal politicians should simply claim all legitimate expenses against their annual income taxes. As it stands, in 2019, the Mayor will be paid \$26,000, the Deputy, \$17,004 and each councillor, \$13,884. This constitutes a 12 percent increase for the mayor, 2 percent for the deputy and 1 percent for a councillor, which effectively increases the total annual budget item by \$44,676.72, or 4.09 percent.

NOTICE OF DECISION WITH RESPECT TO THE ADOPTION OF OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT No. 2 (OPA 2) THE APPROVAL OF ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT 34-2018

Zoning By-Law Amendment 34-2018 – Explanatory Note

On July 5, 2018, Council of the Corporation of the Township of Melancthon passed By-law No. 34-2018 to amend Zoning By-law No. 12-79 by rezoning the lands located in the West Half of Lots 12 and 14, Concession 3 O.S. from the Agricultural (A1) Zone to the Extractive Industrial (M2) and Open Space Conservation (OS2) Zones. The lands subject to the Amendment are shown on the attached key map. In accordance with Section 34 (18.1) of the Planning Act, there were no comments or written submissions provided to Council that affected Council’s decision to approve By-law 34-2018

Any person or agency may appeal to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal in respect of the Zoning By-law Amendment by filing with the Clerk of the Township not later than the 31st day of July, 2018, a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the by-law and the reasons in support of the objection. The filing fee of \$300.00 must accompany the objection by cheque payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance.

Only individuals, corporations or public bodies may appeal a decision of the municipality to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. A notice of appeal may not be made by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be made in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to a hearing unless, before the By-law was approved, the person or public body made oral or written to the Council, unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

The primary purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment is to zone the subject lands to an Extractive Industrial (M2) Zone to permit the expansion of an existing mineral aggregate operation. The amendment is supported by a range of technical studies, all of which are available for review at the Township office together with the complete Zoning By-law Amendment. The Township Office is located at 157101 Highway 10 and a meeting can be scheduled to discuss the approved amendment by contacting Ms. Denise Holmes, CAO at (519) 925-5525.

Official Plan Amendment Two(OPA 2) - Explanatory Note

On July 5, 2018, Council of the Corporation of the Township of Melancthon passed By-law No. 33-2018 to adopt OPA 2. The purpose of OPA 2 is to redesignate lands located in Part of the West Half of Lots 12 and 14, Concession 3 O.S. from the Agricultural designation to the Extractive Industrial designation. It is noted that the lands subject to OPA 2 are the same lands that are the subject of ZBA 34-2018 described above.

OPA 2 was approved in consideration of Provincial, County and Township policies concerning aggregate extraction within prime agricultural areas.

The attached key map identifies the location of the lands that area subject to OPA 2. The adopted OPA is also available for review at the Township Office located at 157101 Highway 10 or by contacting the Clerk at (519) 925-5525.

OPA 2 requires the approval of the County of Dufferin and may not be appealed until County approval has been given. Any person wishing to receive a Notice of the Decision of the County of Dufferin with respect to the Official Plan Amendment may request notice by writing to the County at the following address:

At the office

Up until May of 1980, I had worked in a series of warehouses and factories, my duties consisting of gopher, grunt worker, shipper, machine operator, and clerk. The last couple of years in that stretch was with a large retailer, and, in their warehouse, I tried to advance my prospects by training myself to operate some of their motorized equipment such as forklifts and small electric tow trucks that pulled long lines of trailers laden with furniture.

I loved this work, and was thrilled that they let me do it, once they saw that I was a natural. In those days, training and licensing requirements weren't as they are now, and, if your boss saw that you were going to be an advantage, then you were "in". I made some good friends there, including an old Lithuanian gentleman whom I will never forget. Sadly, this particular wing of the company was eventually closed up, and we were all out of jobs.

We had had enough notice to allow us to look for work, pending the actual closure, and I happened to spot a newspaper ad that began with block letters "FORKLIFT OPERATORS WITH A DIFFERENCE!" It was touting the arrival of a new company (yes, another warehouse) and promising immediate hires to successful applicants. You had to reply to a post office box, so I sat myself down and wrote something of a cover letter in fountain pen, if you can believe it. No computers at that time, and I did not have a typewriter, so I thought this

would be a way to stand out amongst the mail I expected them to get. I got called for the interview, and the first thing my future boss said was "You know, I kind of pulled this one out of the pile because of the way it was written." His first question, which took me by surprise, was "We are looking for a foreman. What would you think of filling that role?" It made me a little uncomfortable, but I responded by saying "I'm sure I could do it, if given the opportunity to grow into the job. I am not one who could go around barking out orders to people."

And so, I was hired, to be the supervisor of two youngsters that had been there for a couple of months and thought they knew everything there was to know about the business. They certainly knew more than I did, at the outset, and were blatantly rebellious to have anyone disturbing their daily routine. I was still wet behind the ears at this kind of thing, and let it go on longer than it should have, but, eventually tried to lead by example, bringing in some new ideas and innovations, gaining a little grudging acceptance, if not respect. They still looked upon me, however, as a straw boss, and thought they could get away with murder.

The older of the two was particularly upset, because he had been passed over for the job for which I had been hired. With the strain of increasingly busy daily operations, and a Mutiny on the Bounty situation developing with my huge crew of two,

I thought I had better do something, and asked for a meeting with the regional manager, my boss Fred. I wanted to establish whether they were going to give me any actual authority over personnel, and of the way daily operations were to be run. Bear in mind that this was a new company, and many of us, including the bosses, were greenhorns in some respect.

The meeting with Fred was a vote of confidence I did not necessarily expect, and its success was due partly to two things, I think: Management was eager to get the day-to-day operations out of their hair, and, because of some of the improvements that had come about, even during an obvious increase in business, I was seen as being worth the risk of shouldering additional responsibilities. Within a couple of days, I was informed, through Fred, that the hiring, discipline, and termination of staff was now my responsibility, as well as the design and layout of warehouse operations. I left his office with a light step, having secured what I needed, along with a new title and a raise.

Self doubt was nagging at me nonetheless, and this unexpected event had left me overwhelmed.

Immediately, I was given the go ahead to hire more staff, and had to learn how to be the personnel officer, trainer-in-chief, and disciplinarian. The hats were beginning to multiply. Time went on, along with more of the hats...approval of accounts payable, directing transportation logistics, sourcing of equipment, business flights to other company locations and suppliers.

My first foray into a serious personnel matter came when the disgruntled co-worker, whom I have mentioned earlier, had an incident involving horseplay on company equipment, and disrespect of a fellow employee. I challenged him, brought him into my office, and said I was sending him home for the day. He said "Why don't you just fire me?", so I did. This is never pleasant, but, in this case, it was necessary, to show what would and would not be tolerated, and also that I would actually do the deed. There were other occasions where I needed to make these decisions, and I have had grown men cry in my office. Not the best feeling to take home with you.

Through the thirteen years that I was there, we moved our business to two successively larger locations, and our staff and equipment grew accordingly. It was necessary to go to two shifts, for which I had to appoint lead hands, both of which are still with the company 25 years later, and one of whom took over my job.

I had many people through my office, some hired from all different nationalities, including one who we found out was working under an assumed name, being an illegal immigrant who was waiting on papers. He came to me himself with this information, so we went to bat for him, and he eventually got his social insurance number, was able to use his real name, and stayed on with us. By this time, we had a staff of 40. Being so busy with paperwork, phone calls, and all else, I was moved to the front office and was now in a suit and tie.

This was a new world, although I knew each of the people. I got to know the relationships and dynamics of the place, and grew to have a special affection for some of those people. There was Dorothy (regional secretary), who became known, unkindly, as Dorothy from OZ, because of her quirky personality. I went along with the joke until she asked me for a private meeting, during

which she wept and told me she was Manic Depressive and didn't know what to do. She hugged me, and I learned to treat her with more respect after that. She liked my whistling, and secretly tape recorded it.

There was Jane, who, by all accounts, was a bona fide Witch, being of the Wiccan persuasion. She had a particular distaste for Bob, one of our salesmen, who would utter sarcastic barbs to her whenever he had the chance. One December, he said "So, what are you doing for Christmas, Jane? Having a Sacrifice?" The look in her eyes was frightening, and she made some sort of sign at him.

There was Janine, an older woman with whom I got along very well. I fixed her car one day in the parking lot, and found a note on my desk saying "thank you for doing this, and for your grace". I still have it.

There was Richard, one of our sales managers. Whenever I saw him in the office, he appeared to be alternately looking off into space, or gazing into a crystal paperweight that he rotated in front of his face. He was gone in due course.

There was my boss, Fred, who I think was having difficulties in his position of Regional Manager. Many times, he would come out in the warehouse and show people how to sweep the floors, for example, and pick away at some trivial thing one of the employees was doing. It had been his decision to move me to the office, and he was worried that he would have to answer for it.

There was Beatrice, the office clerk, a woman who was in her mid 40's, and was an alcoholic. I was a little afraid of her. Her eyes were like a shark's, the soul very far away.

There was a girl named Lee. She had the most beautiful and quirky handwriting I have ever seen. It looked like a foreign language until you paid attention. She was a fashion rebel, and, since those days, I swear she was a trendsetter.

Most of all, there was Joan, a capable and pleasant woman who was Head Office representative at our location. She technically worked for them, but still just had the title of secretary. She was sharply aware of the glass ceiling between the sexes, and felt she was unrecognized for her contributions. We heard, through our connected grapevine, that she had asked for, and was granted, an audience with the company President, during which she itemized all of her responsibilities, and had the guts to demand appropriate compensation and title. When he refused, she lifted up her skirt to expose a strapped-on item, obviously of the male variety, and said "Now will you hire me?" It was not long before she left the company "voluntarily".

My turn finally came after a period of serious inventory problems, for which I had not found a solution, and a spate of accidents involving property and equipment damage. A month after my 13th anniversary, I was let go.

This I will always think of as my "career", although afterwards I held two more jobs totaling 23 years. Proud that I started with a company at ground zero and helped to bring it forward. Not so proud of my failings. Blessed for meeting many of the people, some of whom I remember with love to this day.

True story.

Female, White, short brown hair (just under her ears) wearing a black low cut tank top, black capri pants, white running shoes with a dark coloured purse.

Police warn of paving scam

Dufferin OPP are warning residences to be aware of Paving Scam that is coming to public attention within Dufferin County.

A paving company identified as Q-Line Paving has been connected to numerous complaints to police about paving scams. Dufferin OPP had several calls about a paving company that goes by the name Q-line. They are offering low cost paving as they have a "surplus" of asphalt from roadwork. They are giving estimates and then completing the jobs without paperwork or providing written quotes. Q-line then paves more than the agreed area and charges substantially more than the quote.

While the work was done properly, the homeowner had agreed upon price was \$10,500 but was later charged \$16,000 after the job was done.

Police remind citizens that they should follow a few simple steps when getting home renovations

- Always read over thoroughly all written contracts before signing them. Get a family member to review them.
- Get references from other customers to ensure quality of the work
- Do some research before you pay for product or service
- Thoroughly understand what product or service you are purchasing, the process any guarantees and complaint process if you do not receive the product or service you paid for.

- Inspect all work prior to making payment and ensure work has been completed properly and that the service you received was what you had paid for in your business contract.

- Legitimate business people will be happy to provide you with information on their services

- Always be careful about providing confidential personal information especially banking and credit card details unless you are certain that the company is legitimate.

It also proved to be a tragic weekend off the road, with three people drowning and

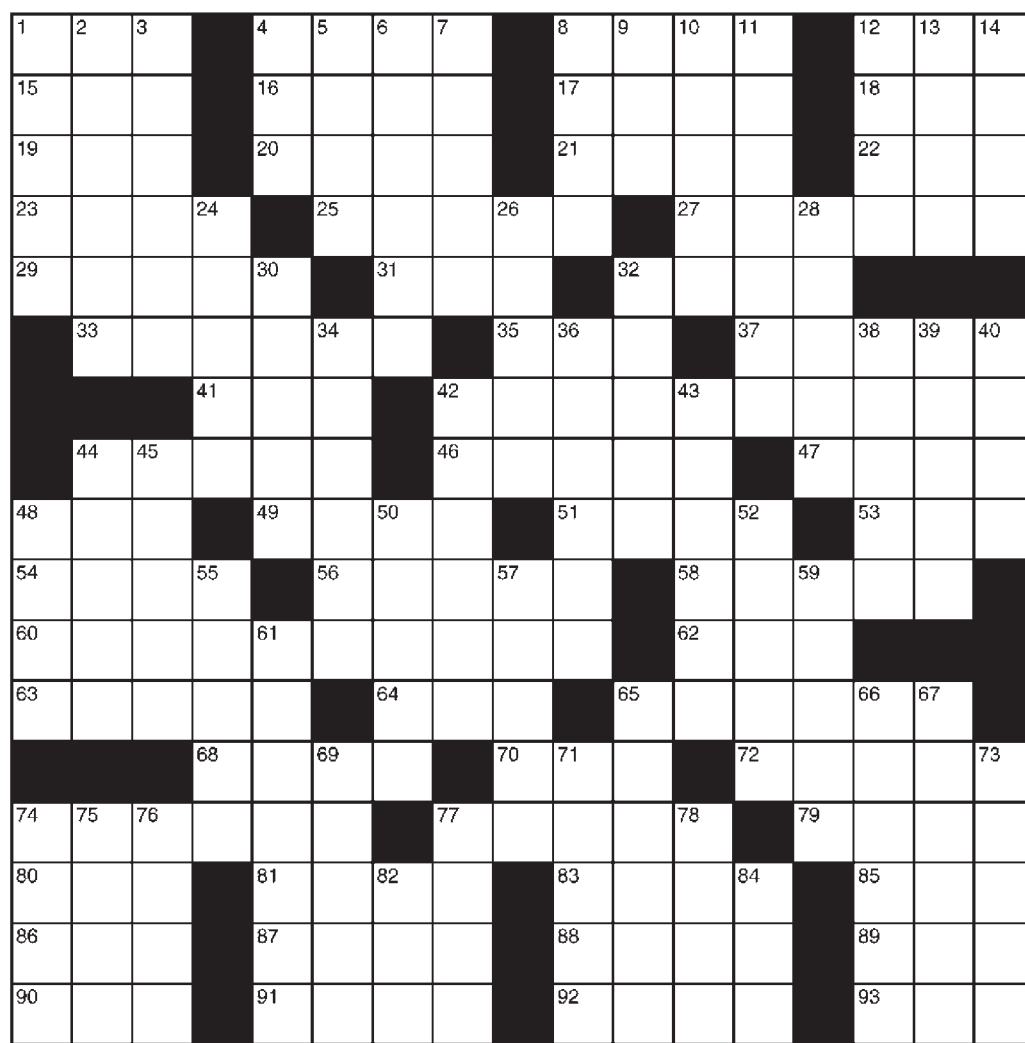
two people dying in marine incidents in OPP jurisdictions.

No Frills and Home Hardware expand Shelburne Food Bank capacity

Shelburne's Food Bank, The Shepherd's Cupboard was thrilled by the recent donation of new shelving that expands the facility's capacity. The design and donation of the shelving units materialized through the volunteer efforts of John van Teunenbroek owner of Shelburne No Frills and Bill Gilliam owner of Shelburne Home Hardware.

Volunteer Coordinator for The Shepherd's Cupboard, Ardith Dunlop says, during the highest donation periods, October through December, the Food Bank often must seek additional storage space to hold donations. Despite the Mel Lloyd Centre's best efforts, with space at a premium, it puts pressure on both organizations to try and get the food out of the additional room and into the Food Bank as quickly as possible. "This year, with so many donations," says Ms. Dunlop, "and such a huge amount from both Little's Halloween Haunt and the Christmas Shelburne Firefighters, we were left having to consider renting additional space from the County to hold it, as we didn't think we could move it into the Food Bank in a timely manner."

Ms. Dunlop says, "At one of our monthly board meetings, we decided to accept John van Teunenbroek's offer at No Frills to come and look at our setup and see if it could hold more. He met with us twice, outlined

a setup plan and then totally shocked us by arranging, between himself and Bill Gillam from Home Hardware, to supply all the new shelving."

The Coordinator told The Free Press, under Mr. van Teunenbroek's guidance, a group of volunteers met one morning "to change the set up in such a way that everything could be housed in the current Food Bank and it looks and works wonderfully."

The Shepherd's Cupboard Food Bank, run by approximately 40 dedicated volunteers, was established in the 1990's to help families in need of emergency or on-going support with food. It is led by a Steering Committee made up of church and community representatives with a Chair from the Shelburne Ministerial Association, currently Pastor Gord Horsley, and as of August of this year it will be Reverend Bob McLellan.

The Shepherd's Cupboard currently serves over 70 families a month out of the Mel Lloyd Centre (Door A) downstairs. The Food Bank is open Wednesday's 12-1:30 pm and Thursday's 6:30-8:00 pm, and can be reached at 519-925-2600 ext 350. Food and donations are supplied by many local farms, businesses, service clubs, churches and individuals.

Music, dance and picnic for Partera and Peace on July 15

The peace building organization, Partera International is holding a barn dance and picnic this Sunday, July 15th in Mono. Organizers say there will be a silent auction, games, food and drinks, as well as dancing to the music of Bruce Ley and The Campfire Poets.

The fundraiser is for Partera's project in North East India, working with women to make peace in a region where 600,000 people have been killed in recent decades. Trinity and Primrose Churches of the local United Church Pastoral Charge are supporting Partera International and founder Reverend LeeAnn McKenna in her work.

"The churches are promoting the event and several members are donating items for the silent auction," says Rev. McKenna. "The pastoral charge partnered with Partera for a number of reasons," says Reverend Candice

Bist, Minister for the Shelburne and Primrose Churches. "We see the way forward as a spiritual entity to be partnering with all people, projects and inclinations that further the way toward a more compassionate society."

Rev. Bist says Partera came to their attention because LeeAnn McKenna is an adherent at Primrose United Church, and as she and her husband Jeff Cottam became more involved in the church, the congregation came to understand the training and services that LeeAnn was offering in Canada and throughout the world.

"The churches no longer have the people or resources to be doing all this work themselves," says Rev. Bist. "By supporting Partera, we have an international voice for peace that we could not possibly have on our own."

Partera, which began as LeeAnn McKenna's vision, has evolved to incorporated

status governed by a volunteer board. "The organisation has many partners with whom we have worked for many years," says Rev. McKenna, "in places like the Mindanao, the Philippines, several states in North East India, Thailand; Kenya, Uganda, Sudan and South Sudan, Congo; Colombia, El Salvador, Mexico. The local footprint now provided by this partnership will enable a kind of 'echo' of the work in other countries - with trainings in conflict transformation, difficult conversations and diversity - using the same experiential tools we use in zones of conflict."

Rev. McKenna says, the North East region of India is ethnically distinct from the rest of India with a majority of Christian and tribal people. "In the last year or two, the women of the seven regions of the North East have begun to organise, requesting training in non-violence and conflict transformation, certification to undergird their determina-

tion to take leadership in building a culture of peace," she says. "They are the ones all too often left to pick up the pieces. They want to play a central role."

"I consider the work that Partera is doing - teaching the ways of proactive peace - to be imperative, both locally and internationally," says Rev. Bist. "Anyone paying attention to anything these days knows that the way forward is not through further contention. We have to learn another way, and Partera has the tools of teaching to offer."

Sohayla Smith, a local talent to be reckoned with

She is a musician, a singer, a song writer, a belly dancer, a painter, a chef, an amateur ornithologist, a mother, a teacher, a wife and a gifted humanitarian. She lives in big, yellow, house, with a red door and a garage, with two dogs, an 8 and a half year old, numerous parrots, a recording studio and her husband Adrian, also a musician.

She was born in Toronto, in 1979, of an Iranian father and an Azorian Portugues mother and grew up in North York and across the GTA. At 17, after fast tracking a high school diploma, she entered York University, left home, studied for a year and then left the university.

She worked in a bakery, she groomed dogs and also was a veterinary assistant for a small animal vet. She taught music, having studied at the Royal Conservatory as a child and she worked, for a time, in an office, for Buck-a-Day, before returning to York for another year of higher learning.

She is Sohayla Smith and apart from being multi talented, she is a wonderfully charming person whose "joie de vivre" knows no bounds.

After leaving York for the last time, she supported herself, in Toronto, as a music teacher, a performing artist and a groomer at Paws in the City. Sohayla had her first band at 15 and started writing songs as a way to cope, after the death of an uncle. She has written literally, hundreds since then. She got her first big break when she won 12 hours of studio time, with producer, Robert DiGioia, from a Q107 contest. She played in festivals and at open mics from 17 to 19 years old and eventually became the bassist for Aidan, an Indie rock band out of Toronto. About then, she met publicist Jane Harvey, who booked her into Hughes Room, where she played to a packed house that loved her music.

In 2008, she produced her first CD and met future husband Adrian and his guitarist brother Nathan Smith. The three formed a band and in 2009 she and Aidan were married and moved to Shelburne that March. The rest is history, as they say and Shelburne is the beneficiary. Rocky, her son, was born in "09" and the music began to evolve while Aidan drove truck and Sohayla worked in her own grooming business, Mom and Pop Grooming Shop. By 2015, the music was going well, but Sohayla started in a new direction, with the formation of Troupe Adore, a multi-faceted business involving chorale work, live theatre and the now famous SoupHaus, to name but a few endeavours. Troupe was registered as a business in 2016 and has never looked back.

SoupHaus came to be, after Sohayla read a post, on the internet regarding someone

wanting to give money to a family or individual living at, or below the poverty line. It struck a cord with her. This was not the way to give something. This had strings and that was not right in Sohayla's mind. In response, she started SoupHaus. It is a simple idea with far reaching implications.

Using some of her own grocery money and the Troupe Adore volunteers, she cooks a nourishing three course meal every Tuesday night and serves it to whoever wishes to come. Whether you are poor, homeless, well off or just want to have a nice meal and enjoy some company, SoupHaus doesn't care, the gift of the meal, is unconditional and open to all. Since it's conception, the food bank has gotten involved and Trinity United Church became the home base. The food is good, nutritious and believe it or not, not costly to present.

Yet another Troupe Adore undertaking, is the Shelburne Farmers Market, where they contribute Henna Tattoos, Face Painting and Music to the passing shoppers. The group also presents, at various functions, in and around Shelburne and in a separate

undertaking, provide Therapy Music to seniors in Shelburne and Orangeville facilities. Josh Oatman and Sohayla perform Celtic and Classical pieces on Celtic Harp and Guitar. In addition, Morningside Music, their band name, have opened for Travelorn and N.U.A. two well known Celtic bands.

In 2017, The Sohayla Smith Band, added a

drummer, Nick Ointon and a bassist, Devon Eichhoin to their existing trio of Sohayla, Adrian and Nathan and have been playing steadily of late. They unfortunately have spent most of their time abroad, in places such as Collingwood, since Shelburne currently has no Arts and Culture department in Town Hall, something Sohayla hopes will change after the municipal elections, in the fall. That said, they hope to release a CD in the near future and expect to play more, locally, to promote it. The band is currently well received in the UK, where they have won a place in the charts.

Sohayla hopes to expand musically and culturally from here. She plans to tour the Maritimes, in the next two years and to be able to effect and affect change, at home, in regards live music venues and support for culture and the arts.
