Michelle Hanson to be tried in death of three-year-old son Kaden Young

Michelle Hanson, mother of Kaden Young, will stand trial on charges of impaired driving causing death and criminal negligence causing death, a judge ruled on Tuesday (July 30).

"The accused, Michelle Hanson, will be committed to stand trial by a judge and jury on counts one (impaired driving causing death) and three (criminal negligence causing death)," said Justice Richard Humphrey.

The decision comes after eight days of a preliminary inquiry and discovery determining whether there was enough evidence for Ms. Hanson to be tried with the two criminal charges she faces.

Faced with the evidence and the numerous witness accounts over the eight days, Justice Humphrey told the courtroom that, "At this stage the court must accept the Crown's evidence taken at its highest, even in circumstance where evidence could suggest an alternate explanation favourable to the accused."

"This evidence constitutes some wanton or reckless disregard for the life of the child, Kaden Young," said Justice Humphrey.

Outside of the courtroom Marco Forte, Ms. Hanson's lawyer representing her in the case, spoke with the Free Press following the reading of the decision.

"I'm not going to say we were completely taken by surprise in terms of the committal," Marco Forte. Mr. Forte later said that they were satisfied with how the evidence came out in the preliminary inquiry.

When asked by the Free Press whether there were any doubts about a committal Assistant Crown Attorney Danielle Garbaty said, "One never knows what the judge will do, so you never know what's going to happen until it happens."

Mr. Forte and Ms. Garbaty previously agreed that the count of impaired driving causing death would be tried, with the focus of the preliminary hearing centering on whether there was sufficient evidence to warrant the count of criminal negligence causing death.

A publication ban is still in affect preventing media from publishing or broadcasting any information relating to evidence brought up in the preliminary inquiry.

Now that the decision for Ms. Hanson to face trial on both counts one and three, with a previous charge of dangerous driv-

ing causing death withdrawn by the Crown in May, has been heard, Mr. Forte said that he is planning to take a look at whether an application for a venue change will need to be submitted.

"I plan to take a much closer look at the impact, the potential impact of some of those social media sites and mainstream media coverage and we'll make a determination about change of venue then," said Mr. Forte.

Ms. Hanson, on the early morning hours of Feb. 21 2018, failed to stop at a road-closed sign at the 10th Line of Amaranth, proceeding onto the flooded road. Her minivan was subsequently pulled into the Grand River. Both Ms. Hanson and Kaden Young, who was in the vehicle with his mother, managed to escape the vehicle but Kaden was pulled from his mother's arms. On April 21, two months to the day that Kaden went missing, two fishermen found his body under a bridge in Belwood Lake.

Ms. Hanson will appear again in an Orangeville courtroom on Sept. 30 for court assignment, which Ms. Garbaty says is a first appearance and will act as if the process is starting over in a higher court.

Ms. Hanson intends to enter a plea of not guilty on all charges.

Long-time bank employee retires after more than three decades on the job

You can tell by the number of customers who greet Traci Sinclair by name when they enter the RBC in Shelburne that she has established her place in the community.

A lifelong Shelburne resident, Ms. Sinclair is retiring from the RBC after 33 years of service at the bank's Owen Sound Street location.

Her final day was Wednesday, July 31.

Ms. Sinclair got her start in the banking world right out of high school.

"My high school teacher's wife was the manager at Canada Trust and I used to babysit for them," she explained of how she got her start. "As soon as I graduated Cathy, that was her name, asked me if I wanted a job. I worked there for six years."

She was on maternity leave when she received a call from RBC asking her if she would like to work for them at their Shelburne branch. Her job at the time was in Orangeville, so the move to Shelburne made sense.

Ms. Sinclair has always worked the 'front line' as a person in the bank who deals directly with customers.

"I've always enjoyed meeting the clients," she said of why she enjoyed her job. "One

nice thing about working at a small branch is you pretty much know everybody."

Over the three decades she has seen a lot change in the banking industry. The main change is the switch to computers rather than filling out a bank book like they used to.

Banking machines means tellers no long see clients every week like they used to. Even the bank's name has changed from The Royal Bank to simply RBC.

Now that she will have more free time on her hands, Ms. Sinclair said she plans to work with seniors in the community.

"There's a need in town and I know a lot of the older people in town. They know me and they trust me. I'm going out on my own. I'd like to do chores for them, do their groceries for them, get their mail, bring to the bank, just whatever they need," adding "I bought myself some new golf clubs as well," so she plans to hit the links when she can.

The bank held a meet and greet on Friday, July 26, so Ms. Sinclair could say goodbye to the many people who dropped by and wished her well.

The goodbye, however, is just a formality as she will certainly still be active in the community.



A map showing the location of the subject property is provided below.





Sohayla Smith continues success with 'Burn It to the Ground'

Shelburne's Sohayla Smith and her band continue to make steady progress in popularity in the professional music scene.

Her song 'Burn It To The Ground' has been selected for BWH's 'Keepin' It Country, Vol. One, by Various Artists' a "Country compilation album comprised of an eclectic mix of 17 songs by today's best independent Country artists and songwriters," says Ms. Smith.

Performers for the re-release include: Sohayla Smith, Adrian Smith, Nathan Smith, Nick Ovington, and Tyler Reed.

"The inclusion of 'Burn it to the Ground' in the 'Keepin' it Country' compilation is exciting from an exposure perspective," says Sohayla Smith. "The song was released last year as a single, and won an award for Best Country Recording in the Clouzine International Music Awards, so this news reaffirms our confidence in the song."

She added, "With a new album in the works, including an alternate version of 'Burn it to the Ground,' expected to be released this fall, and numerous singles already out there," Sohayla says. "I'm hoping to see more successes like this in the near future to help expand our fan reach and opportunities, especially with a few east coast tour dates set. I'm making the most of all of it, and I'm also very grateful to see signs of a bigger picture coming together bit by bit."

Sohayla and her band was nominated for a 2017 TIMA for Best Country, and her single "Bridges" was a Roots Grand Prize Winner, awarded First Place place in the Americana category. "The Breakdown" was also the November 2017 Pop Winner on OurStage, where she is currently at the top of Best Country Artists charts.

Sohayla Smith and her band were headliners at the Rockwood Music Hall in Manhattan, New York, the 2018 Peak to Shore Music Festival, the Singhampton Small Hall, and Simcoe Street Theatre's 'Music for a Sunday Evening Concert Series'.

Sohayla is featured in the Museum of Dufferin's True Grit exhibit and was a featured performer in the Collingwood Arts 7 Culture Awards in 2016. Her songs have been on radio rotation at stations throughout the country including: Erin Radio (NY), Salford City Radio (UK), Amazing Radio, KB Radio, and PopCanRebel.

Sylvie Marie of Indie-Spoonful calls Sohayla Smith's music, "A delightful find in

the Americana arena offering memorable, poetic folk songs that deeply resonate with beautiful and lovely vocals, tight musicianship and an overall inviting sound that is down-to-earth and moving."

Currently, Sohayla says she is looking forward to festival performances this summer.

"I'll be headlining the Georgian Triangle Music Festival at Barcelos on Friday, August 23 with fellow talented locals Adrian Smith (guitar/vocals), Tyler Reed (bass), and Josh Oatman (percussion.) Anyone coming up to support us while enjoying some original music, and great food and drinks will be in for a treat," she says.

The band will be performing a full set starting at 10 p.m. on the patio.

Sohayla is also holding an original music lab in Collingwood on Monday, August 19 at the Simcoe Street Theatre.

"I'm planning to share some insight from a DIY artist perspective, tips, tricks, and cold hard facts," says Sohayla. "Bursting the bubble of the rock star dream, and replacing it with understanding of the bigger picture, the value of persistence, ongoing education and personal development as an artist, seizing opportunities, knowing when to turn them down, branding, and having the patience to build a career the hands-on way."

Up next, Sohayla says, "As Adrian Smith (the mix/master engineer for the album) works to complete the big fall full length release, I've already embarked on the first single of a solo Americana/Roots album with a collection of songs written on my banjo with a bluegrass feel." She says, "Anyone who loves traditional roots music will surely enjoy this collection. The second album is set to be released in 2020, followed by a blues-jazz record, and a few more albums following that."

She added, "With 25 years of songs to produce in the studio," she adds, "to say I've got a lot of work ahead of me is a vast understatement. Various local accompanists will be involved in the process for each record."

"I'm making great sacrifices to present my catalogue of music professionally and more importantly, authentically. It's my life's work. The end goal is to develop a career that can supplement, sustain, and hopefully lead into licensing, tours, and mainstream radio play in North America or beyond. To be able to tour across Canada and fill small halls, that'd be my oasis in the music industry," she concluded.

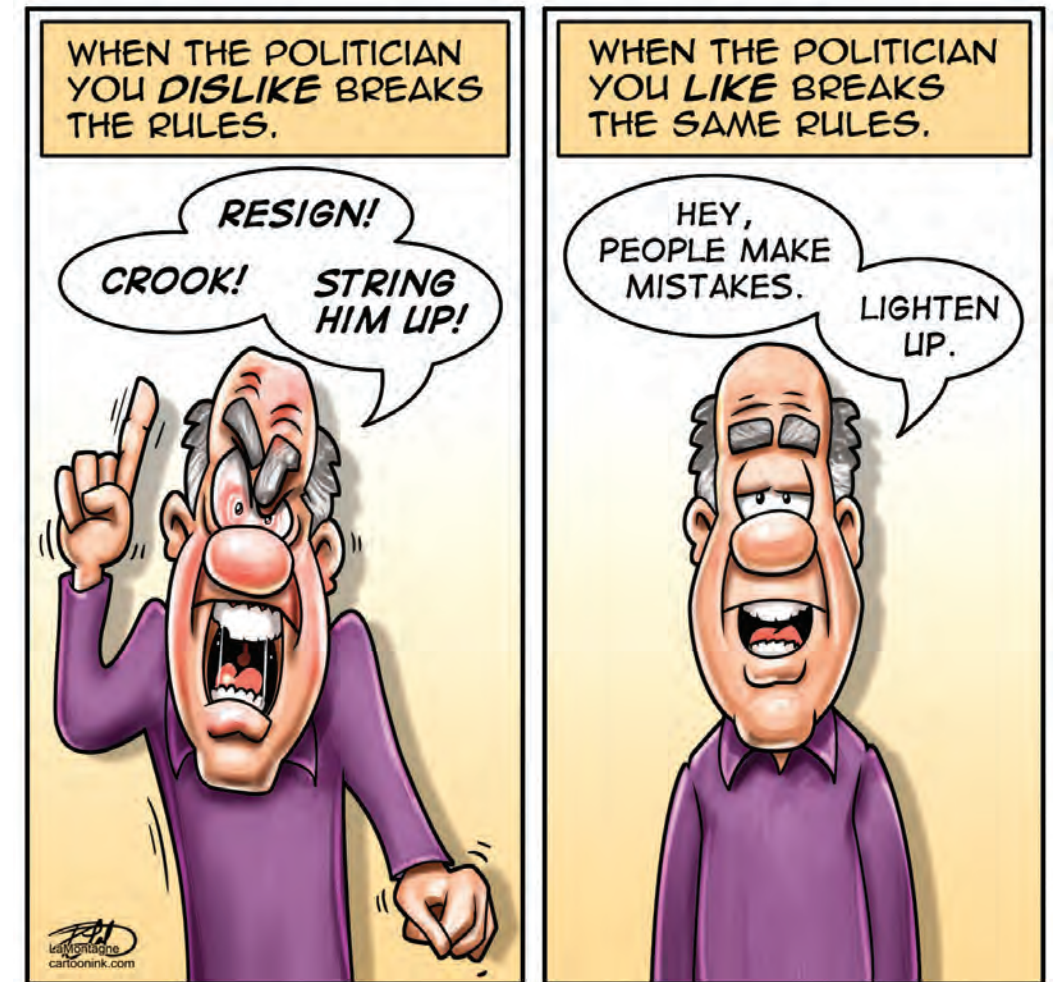

Shelburne police lay charges on local men following prank

Shelburne Police are advising all residents to take pre-cautions when attending local parks in Shelburne.

A small package of drugs was located in a public parking lot early this morning (Thursday July 25). A couple hours later several additional small packages were located in the playground area of Greenwood Park.

Field testing of the contents of these packages indicates that the substance is an amphetamine based drug which can be very dangerous.

The packages are small Looney sized clear saran wrapped bundles with a white, somewhat crystalized substance inside.

"If any similar packages are located by anyone they should not touch them. Please stay by the package keeping people and pets away from them and call police immediately", states Sergeant Paul Neumann. "If anyone incidentally touches one of these packages or the contents, they are to call 911 immediately for potential medical assistance and to notify police. We are encouraging adults to monitor their children when in public areas, and speak with their children not to touch anything that is found on the ground or on park play equipment. Please check all areas before your children are allowed to play freely".

Shelburne Police and the Shelburne Town Works Department have been and are continuing to check all parks, schools and public areas.

After a very intense and resource demanding investigation all day on July 25, Shelburne Police have made significant strides in the investigation, including arresting and charging two adult suspects. One was arrested late in the afternoon ON July 29, and the other this morning. There are no outstanding suspects.

The investigation took several turns. The first package of apparent illicit drugs was located by Shelburne Police in the police parking lot, giving a first appearance of someone playing a possible prank. How-

ever when several packages were located in Greenwood Park (two on play equipment), and another package in a town parking lot, and further it was revealed that the packages potentially contained dangerous drugs, and the contents appeared to be drugs and packaged as typical street drugs are, the situation quickly became much more concerning. Later in the day it was learned that there was indeed a pre-planned "prank" component to this incident, and that the main goal of the two males involved was to target the Shelburne Police Service and purposely mislead them in an investigation.

Public Mischief is a serious offence under the Criminal Code of Canada which includes putting police into a misleading or false investigation. It is a serious offence because it can cause a significant amount of resources to be used up on a false investigation, taking resources away from other matters (like this situation did), and can also lead to innocent people being wrongful accused and arrested by police.

Both accused are from Shelburne and were arrested and charged as follows:

- 44 year old Jason Flear is charged with Mischief, Public Mischief, and Breach of Probation
- 25 year old Cory Stoneham is charged with Mischief and Public Mischief.

"The safety concern for our citizens, especially the youth enjoying our parks is over", states Sgt Neumann. "Thank you to all media outlets and the public for their assistance in this concerning matter". "I also want to thank Shelburne Town Works for putting some of their other duties aside and assisting the Shelburne Police to ensure our parks and public areas were safe until this got

resolved".

The investigation is still ongoing, and charges could be added pending the final results from Health Canada which will verify what the contents of the 5 packages.

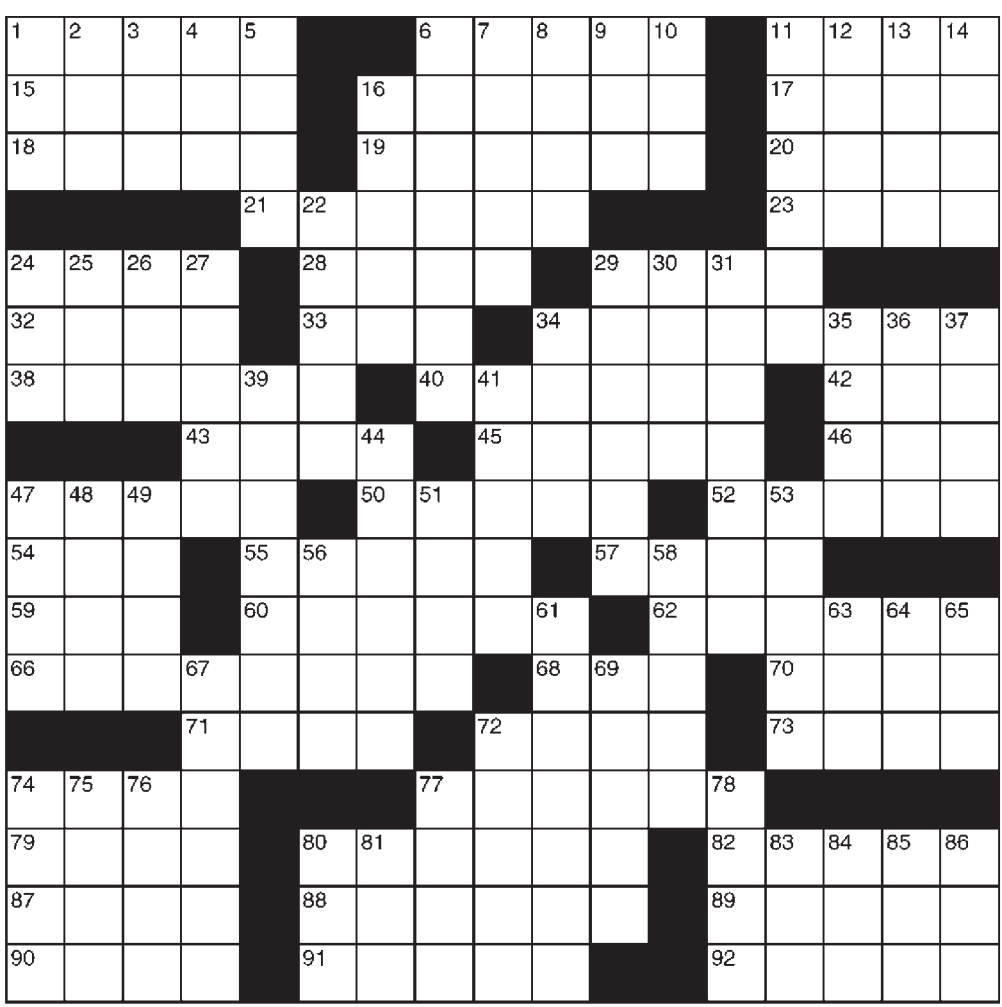

The Sixth annual Flame of Hope Tournament got underway at the Shelburne Golf and Country Club with around 160 golfers hitting the links for the day.

That includes 18 celebrity hockey players who rotate among groups on the course.

The event is a fund raiser for Diabetes Canada which uses the funds to send kids to Diabetes camps in Ontario.

"This raises funds for Camp Huronda near Huntsville," explained Viktorija Dukoski of Diabetes Canada. "We raise funds for kids who can't pay their full camping fee to send them to camp. We let anyone in, even if they can't pay."

The camps are specifically designed for kids who have diabetes so they can enjoy all the experiences of summer camp while being under the care of trained staff.

"It helps them learn how to manage Type 1 diabetes. It empowers them, and they make friends there," Ms. Dukoski said. "There is a lot of medical staff there and most of them are volunteers. Most of the camp councilors and leaders have Type 1 diabetes themselves and they used to go to camp. They say at camp, you run on diabetes time. It's like you're doing all the normal things do at

camp but because you're monitored all the time you don't remember you have diabetes."

Sam Young, head golf pro and coach at the Shelburne Golf Club hosts the tournament.

"We have 18 hockey players here as celebrities and 144 golfers," Sam explained. "The golfers all play with a celebrity hockey player. We've got lots of prizes here and a big live auction. We've got a Maple Leafs sweater signed by all the team. We have signed Kyle Lowry Raptors sweater, and a signed Max Domi jersey."

The tournament benefits from local sponsorship from businesses who take part in the event.

"I had a girl who worked for me who had diabetes. She went to the camp and I thought it was a worthwhile cause to support, considering it was for the kids," explained Shelburne Giant Tiger owner, Andrew Lewis, of how he became involved in the tournament.

"We also have some Giant Tiger owners from other cities who have come to participate."

The tournament has raised a lot of money over the past several years.

The event raised \$48,000 this year, bringing the overall six year total to more than \$300,000.

“Come see fiddlers compete for the largest prize purse in our contest history,” says Bobbi Ferguson, the Shelburne Heritage Music Festival Co-Chair (HMF).

A one-day only event, the Fiddle Championship will bring fiddlers from far and wide to compete for thousands of dollars in prizes. The 69th Canadian Open Old Time Fiddle Championship, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Shelburne, will take place August 10 at the Centre Dufferin Recreation Complex.

“Come hear the best old time fiddling Canada has to offer,” says Rotarian Caroline Mache. Playdowns for the Fiddle Competition begin at 10 a.m., with the Championship kicking off at 6:30 p.m. Ms. Mache says competitors range in age from under 10 to over 80. Scott Woods and his band will provide the Saturday evening entertainment. Anyone who has ever attended one of Scott Woods’ concerts will tell you it is a veritable fiddle feast, featuring not only the violin, but also singing and step dancing.

The 2019 Heritage Music Festival committee includes: Bobbi Ferguson and Sandra Gallagher as Co-Chairs, Kerstin Stinson in charge of Sponsorship, Caroline Mach in Promotion,

and Bill Waite as Fiddle Championship Lead.

“Shelburne is very fortunate to be able to secure an incredible line up of talent for this year’s Heritage Music Festival,” says Bobbi Ferguson, “and I hope that everyone will come out and enjoy it with us.” All profits of the festival go to local charities and \$1 from each ticket sold will be going towards a splash pad for Shelburne families.

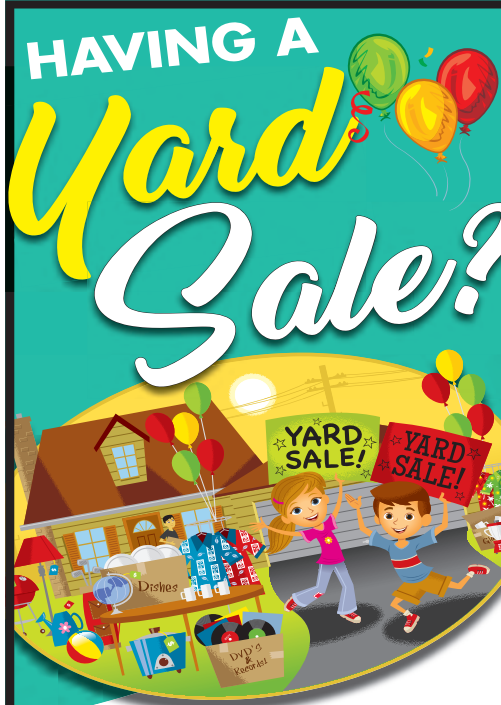

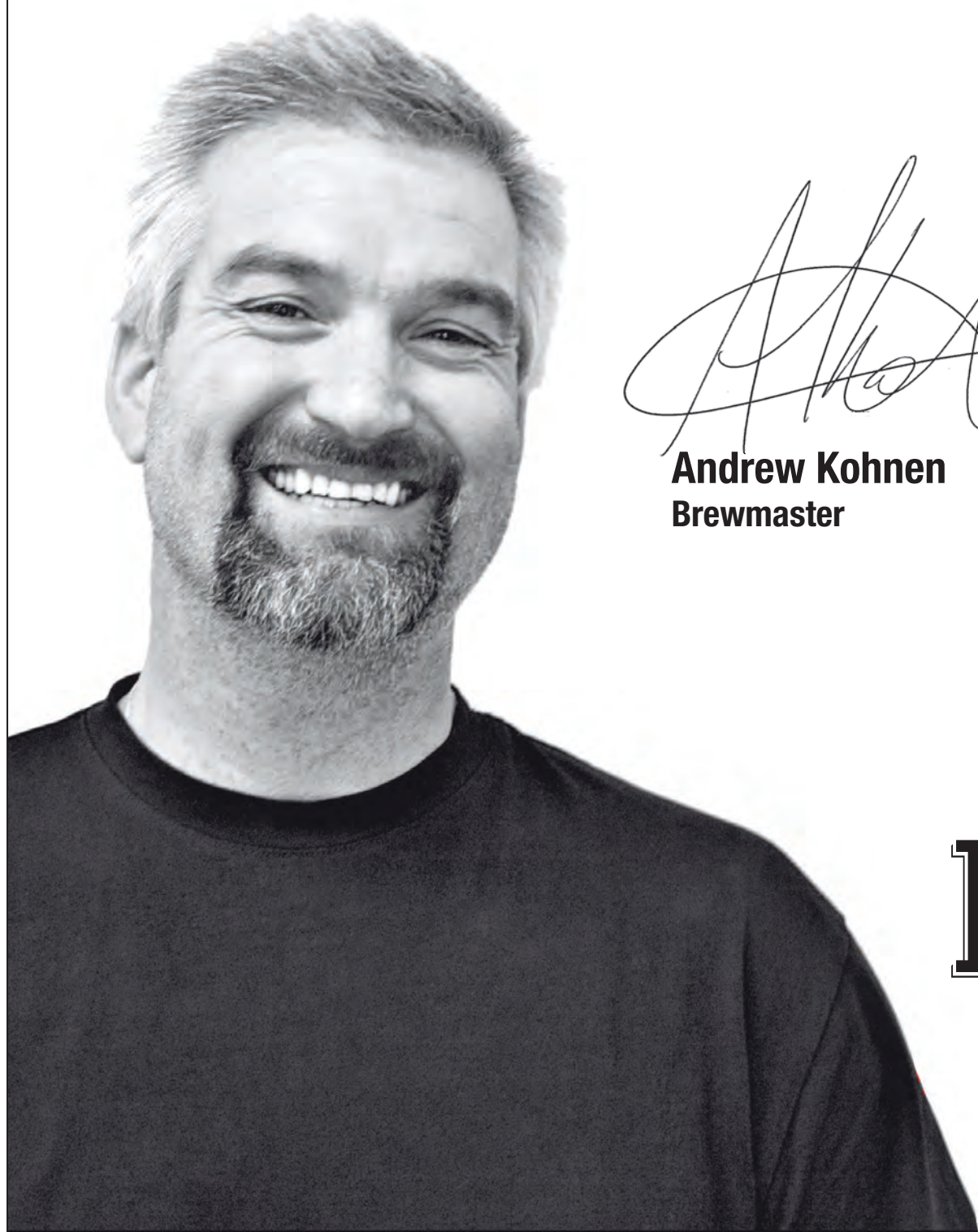


BUT HE DOES!
