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Impacts of Orangeville transitioning to OPP could burden Shelburne Police

The spectre of rising policing costs in Shelburne was once more placed before Council this past Monday evening.

Following an in-camera discussion with Shelburne's police chief Kent Moore, at their Dec. 17 Police Services Board meeting, the Board Chair, Mike Fazackerley moved a motion asking Council to outline how several time sensitive matters, affecting adequate policing in Shelburne, following the imminent disbanding of the Orangeville Police Service, are to be resolved.

With the cessation of OPS services, Shelburne is now faced with several new costs and responsibilities going forward. In the motion from the SPSB, Council was asked to respond to concerns surrounding the following issues - existing police station deficiencies, supervision, provision for court duties, WASH court, prisoner guarding and transportation and dispatch services. All of these are currently handled by OPS to either some degree, or in total.

Council was, of course, aware of the police station issue and of the matter of dispatch services, however the rest were new

concerns. Since the OPP are not mandated to supply dispatch services to other first responders, this service, which was supplied to both Shelburne Fire and Police by OPS, must now be resourced elsewhere. Preliminary review of possible suppliers have indicated that this service will increase in cost, potentially, by more than double. In 2019, Shelburne paid \$65,184 for its dispatching services through OPS.

However, there is more to this change than just suppliers. It is possible that all the equipment in Shelburne will also have to be replaced to keep up with new technologies. This would include radios, the repeater station and possibly more. Currently all researched sources are using digital equipment over analog. The closest source to Shelburne, appears to be Owen Sound, though Fire Chief Brad Lemaich has indicated that Tillsonburg could supply dispatch for the Fire Department.

The matter of court duties and responsibilities also presents some difficult problems for Council. Presently, Shelburne has one officer on duty in POA and other cases in Orangeville Court, weekly. The rest of the week, these matters were being handled by

an Orangeville officer. It will now require that a Shelburne officer be in attendance, possibly five days a week during court sessions, to handle Shelburne cases.

It is also mandated that anyone arrested, must face a Justice within 24 hours for a bail hearing, or request. To facilitate this, over weekends and holidays, the WASH court system was put in place. WASH stands for Weekend And Statutory Holidays and is operated in selected areas of the province, to accommodate the mandate. Currently, there is a WASH court in Brampton, which Shelburne uses.

The problem is that it is held on weekends and a minimum of two officers are required to transport a prisoner to and potentially from, court. In the past, Shelburne could double up with Orangeville to meet this requirement, but with OPS disbanding, the total responsibility now will fall to SPS to accommodate. To do so raises the issues of man power and overtime pay.

More officers or special constables would need to be hired for court duties in order to avoid at least some overtime.

Dufferin Warden, Darren White says he was "honoured to make the declaration of Black History Month" at County Council last week.

Alethia O'Hara-Stephenson of Shelburne, Guidance Councillor Geer Harvey and Centre Dufferin District High School (CDDHS) students Janine Beckford, Ashana Smith and Soha Soliman attended council to accept the proclamation.

"County Council unanimously supported the declaration," says Warden White. "We look forward to a number of events planned by community members for February."

Alethia O'Hara-Stephenson says the Warden's proclamation is significant as it is "the first time we are formally recognizing the contributions of Black Canadians in Dufferin County. On January 9th, the students presented Council with the contributions and achievements of Black Canadians throughout the history of the County.

"Events like Black History Month promote understanding and acceptance of other cultures, and without that knowledge, we, as humans, won't achieve true equity," says Warden White. "As the demographics of our county, our province and our country continue to change, it important to know your neighbour."

As members of the CDDHS Social Equity Committee and Town of Shelburne Youth Advisory Committee, Soha Soliman, Ashana Smith, Janine Beckford say they were honoured "with such a wonderful opportunity to present at Dufferin County Council."

"This proclamation shows our passion for change to develop our community as well as establish a culture of diversity," the students told the Free Press.

Ms. O'Hara Stephenson says the proclamation at the County level was something that she "pondered for some time." Inspired by the leadership of students at CDDHS early last year, she researched Black Canadians who settled in Dufferin County as well as "notable current leaders in Dufferin County" such as Phil Dewar from Soulyve Catering, Deputy Mayor Steve Anderson, Geer Harvey, Andrew Charles James and Juli-Anne James of Streams Hub, Nevin Anderson, Alton Stephenson, and future leaders in the students of Center Dufferin "who kicked off the first Black History event at their High School."

Once the proclamation was written, a delegation request was submitted to Dufferin County Council and Shelburne Town Council, and Ms. O'Hara Stephenson invited the students to participate. "They were excited by the opportunity to present, she says. "They recognized the impact their voice would have."

"The proclamation is a celebration of diversity, a celebration of our Dufferin County, collectively and united, a testament to what makes our community great by recognizing our diversity," she says. "There is strength and power when we recognize and celebrate our diversity. This is what builds a strong community and country."

Ms. O'Hara Stephenson expresses thanks to County Council and to the teachers at CDDHS, who were instrumental in helping get the students ready to present.

"A special thanks to the students, Ashana, Janine and Soha," she added, "for stepping up and demonstrating what true leadership is by delivering a powerful presentation and standing up for what they believe in," Alethia said.

A flag raising ceremony will take place at Dufferin County office in February, with the date and time yet to be confirmed. The Pan-African Flag, a symbol of pride and unity for the Black Community and the many individuals who stand as allies, will also be raised.

The students who attended the proclamation told the Free Press, "We are thankful to Dufferin County Council for recognizing our efforts and promoting the voices of youth and empowering Black experiences. This was needed. This is history."

Centre Dufferin District High School graduate, Valerie Leigh Brown, was recently sworn in as a judge in the Ontario Court of Justice. Raised in Mansfield with her two siblings, Valerie is the daughter of Gary (deceased) and Ruth Brown.

Valerie attended Mulmur Mono Public School and graduated from CDDHS with Honours in 1993. She was the recipient of the Debbie Matthews Memorial Award for Music and received the School Letter for Activities.

Valerie's mother, Ruth Brown says, "Valerie's aspirations for a legal career were known early on, and she remembers when her English teacher, Mr. Dryburgh gave her a 'word of the day' calendar excerpt with the legal phrase 'prima facie', which she kept for several years."

Ruth Brown told the Free Press that Val-

erie attended McMaster University from 1993 to 1997, graduating with an Honours Bachelor of Arts Degree in Psychology. She then attended the Faculty of Law at the University of Western, Ontario from 1998 to 2001 and was called to the bar in 2002.

"Valerie then established her own Law Firm focusing on Family Law and appeared in court on family matters in York and Simcoe County and in all levels of Ontario Courts," says Mrs. Brown. Subsequently, Valerie served as a panel lawyer with the office of Children's Lawyer and as a dispute resolution officer in Newmarket and Barrie. She also served on numerous committees and as President of the York Region Law Association, Family Law Chair for the Federation of Ontario Law Associations.

Mrs. Brown says, "Valerie credits being raised in the small community of Man-

sfield, with an emphasis on community involvement as the foundation for her career choice." She says her daughter put an emphasis on the more vulnerable in society as a children's lawyer and assisted others through Legal Aid Certificates.

The Honourable Justice Valerie Leigh Brown will preside over Criminal and Family Court matters in Owen Sound, Walkerton and Goderich with Chambers in Owen Sound.

"Valerie continues to make her family very proud," says her mother. "I'm proud of her, her work ethics and her achievements." Mrs. Brown says, "Valerie realizes that hard work and perseverance definitely do pay off. She continues to try to serve, but in a different role, and is happy to have been welcomed to her new position by a very friendly and supportive group of colleagues."

It would also require some staff redundancy in order to accommodate vacation time and possible sick days for the new officer(s).

Supervision is also a matter of the law. A senior officer must be available 24/7 to support frontline officers in the performance of their duties. Shelburne does not have the available manpower to do this without placing either the Chief, or one of its sergeants, on call. In the past the problem was handled by using the OPS duty sergeant, when Shelburne officers were not available. This service will no longer be available, which will result in a manpower shortage of senior supervisory officers.

As for the police station renovations, although already planned by Council, the time frame for completion has now become an issue, as has the possible size of the new space with the potential increase in manpower and resources suggested by the request from the Police services Board.

The Board requested that Council provide it with the answers before its next scheduled meeting, which predates the next Council meeting, so Mayor Wade Mills, presented a motion to request Staff to research answers to the questions presented and to report back to Council at a special meeting this coming Monday, Jan. 20, with their findings and recommendations.

CLD interested in Shelburne land

Council heard a presentation from Robert Bingham of Community Living Dufferin, concerning the old Public Works Yard at 420 Victoria Street.

CLD is an organization, established in 1954, that provides support for children with intellectual disabilities, within their local communities. It has been serving the area for over 65 years. CLD has 170 full-time, part-time and relief workers on payroll and operates its own housing corporation, which currently owns 9 of its 13 group homes.

They operate the food concessions at Tony Rose and Alder Street arenas, as well

as concessions in the Dufferin County Building and at Georgian College.

In the 13 group homes, located in Mono, East Garafraxa and Orangeville, there are currently 55 residents living in and participating in their communities. CLD also supports 23 people living independently in their home community and off a Family Home Program to support families open to welcoming a person with an intellectual disability into their home. They also run a day program from their East Garafraxa location and will soon expand it to include weekends. Upwards of 80 people a week participate in community activities through this program.

What the CLD wants in Shelburne, is to build a new group home and to further expand their programs and services to the area. Robert was adamant that they were not looking for special favours or services and intended to pay fair market value for the property. To this end, a local real estate broker has been retained to assist in establishing that value.

As part of the community, CLD brings a host of benefits with it. They hire locally, they support local tradesmen and businesses and they support and work in the community for the betterment of all concerned.

The first phase would be to build a semi-detached bungalow to support 10 people with intellectual disabilities. Each side of the semi would support 4 individuals on the main floor and one person with more independent skills in a self contained walk out basement apartment.

Money permitting, a second story of offices could be added to be rented to NFP's such as Family Transition Place or DCAFS. The home will provide approximately 32 full time positions with wages between \$19 and \$32 per hour. Total annual payroll will average about \$2.2 million annually. There would also be summer job opportunities as well.

In all, this would be an incredible opportunity for Shelburne, it's residents and businesses and, of course, those who would be able to make use of the services provided.

This year, his opening monologue made the news big time, and caused more than a few people to squirm in their seats at the awards show.

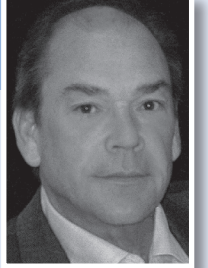

A rather unusual challenge

IT WAS PROBABLY no coincidence that last Monday (Jan. 13) we received an emailed news release from group known as We Need a Law calling for all the candidates to succeed Andrew Scheer as leader of the Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) to declare whether they are "pro-life" or "pro-choice."

After all, Monday was the opening day of the 2020 CPC leadership race, when the Leadership Election Organizing Committee (LEOC) also set the rules governing the election, including candidate requirements and fees.

"With this announcement, the Conservative Party's leadership race is officially ready to open, and it's a process designed to test the organizational abilities of our next leader," said Dan Nowlan, Co-Chair of LEOC. "It's not only your ability to fundraise, but more importantly your ability to inspire Canadians to join our party, and to do so under tight time lines similar to the pressures of an election."

As you might suspect, the We Need a Law release authors want Canada to have legislation limiting pregnant women's right to have an abortion.

As matters stand, Canada is one of the few countries in the world which lack such legislation, and the issue is being raised at a time when many U.S. states have passed legislation which bans abortions if there is any sign of a fetus's heartbeat, and some expect the Republican-dominated U.S. Supreme Court to overturn Roe v. Wade, the 1973 decision which declared abortion bans illegal.

In last October's federal election, the leaders of Canada's two major parties happened to both be Roman Catholics, but Liberal Leader Justin Trudeau and Mr. Scheer clearly had opposing views on this highly controversial subject, Mr. Trudeau's stated view being that all Liberal candidates should respect the right of women to choose to end a pregnancy. While he and Mr. Scheer appeared to agree that Parliament need not return to the issue, Mr. Scheer had been on record as personally anti-abortion.

And while most observers saw the Conservatives' lack of a serious commitment to deal with climate change as the real reason the party failed to win as many seats as the Liberals, some critics of Mr. Scheer have suggested that his failure to come out as "pro choice" was

just as important. In the press release, We Need a Law said Canadians "are watching with a keen eye as candidates for leader of the Conservative Party declare their intentions. This includes pro-life Canadians who want to know what a future leader is willing to do about Canada's complete lack of abortion restrictions."

"Generally, it is assumed that this means pro-life individuals and organizations are scrutinizing each leadership hopeful for whether they are 'pro-life' or 'pro-choice', but some in the pro-life movement see it differently.

It quotes Mike Schouten, Director of We Need a Law, as saying Pro-life Conservatives "should be less concerned about whether a future leader thinks like them and more concerned about whether he or she realizes that pro-life conservatives make up an integral part of the party's base."

Noting that the pro-life movement was instrumental in Mr. Scheer's successful leadership bid, and has the potential to play a large part in the upcoming race, the release said a successful candidate "needs support from the pro-life movement. Pulling out tired lines like 'not re-opening the debate' or claiming that abortion is a 'settled issue' in Canada could be detrimental to a leadership campaign."

Would it be? We wonder. As matters stand, we suspect that while few Canadians are "pro-abortion", ever fewer would like to see a return to criminalization of the procedure.

However, the issue continues to be clouded by several factors that could and should be dealt with by legislation.

One is a dearth of information on the extent to which lack of any laws has led to an increase in the number of abortions, given the countering effect of medicines that effectively terminate a pregnancy.

Another is the uneven access to both abortions and anti-pregnancy meds, with some provinces having few hospitals or doctors willing to perform abortions or prescribe the medications.

Perhaps in the circumstances what we really need is more active promotion of child-bearing, rather than restriction of women's choices.

There's going to be a lot of bodies being tossed, but in a good way, as Impact Martial Arts opens its doors on Main Street in Shelburne.

The Martial Arts centre teaches Judo to both kids and adults in a bright and spacious new dojo.

Sensei, Kyle Fegan, is an experienced teacher who holds a black belt in Judo, Karate, and Taekwondo.

ponent's weight and use it against them. If someone is coming to attack you, you take that attack and turn it against them. Judo isn't just about throwing your opponent, it's about controlling them as well. We also do groundwork."

Sensei Fegan demonstrated with the help of one of his students how you can take control of a situation and turn the tables on an aggressor.

Impact Martial Arts will be holding classes on Tuesday's and Thursday's at their downtown location with kids classes from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m, and adult classes from 8:00 to 9:00 p.m.
