## Olympic gold medalist receives honours at Council

The Town of Shelburne has found itself the new home of an Olympic gold medalist, and council members gave them a warm welcome to the community.

During their meeting on Monday (Aug. 23) Shelburne Town Council presented Kadeisha Buchanan, who helped the Canadian women's soccer team win gold on Aug. 6 at the Tokyo Olympics, with a key to the town and Shelburne's Community Excellence Award.

Mayor Wade Mills proclaimed Aug. 24, Kadeisha Buchanan Day in the Town of Shelburne, while the Dufferin County Canadian Black Association also awarded her their Black Excellence Award.

The accolades were in recognition of her outstanding athletic achievements.

"I wish I was home to receive these accolades and thank you very much," said Buchanan, who accepted the recognition from France via Zoom. "My first goal was to buy a house in Shelburne, live there for a couple years, and maybe sell and go someplace else, but I think this town is amazing and I don't want to sell the house; I want to stay there and make it my hometown."

"I'm looking forward to spending more time there and getting to know the community, and the people," she concluded.

Originally from Brampton, Buchanan graduated from Cardinal Leger Secondary School before attending the University of West Virginia, where she became the most decorated player in the school's soccer history. As a senior, Buchanan became a Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year at the University of West Virginia and finished her NCAA career by

winning the MAC Hermann Trophy, awarded to the top U.S college soccer player.

Buchanan helped Canada win their second consecutive bronze medal, in 2016 at the Rio Olympics, and went on to sign with the Olympique Lyonnais in 2017. Since going to France, Buchanan has won four French league titles with Lyons and four in the UEFA Women's Champions League.

During the meeting, Buchanan shared her gold medal with council, jokingly noting how heavy it is.

"It's an honour to see you here and what you represent for the Town, albeit briefly, but yet the impact is significant not only for adults but certainly for the young children who are going to pick up the sport and have already picked up the sport," said Deputy Mayor Steve Anderson. "Thank you for being the role model that you are."

Buchanan told councillors when she returns to Canada on a more permanent basis, she hopes to help host a soccer camp for local youth.

"It is my sincere hope to see you on the field one day with those young people, inspiring them to realize that they can reach the high goals that you have reached and that Canada can be a premier soccer country," said Coun. Walter Benotto.

Buchanan has returned to France, to continue her season with the Lyons.

# Local overdose awareness committee launches new campaign

The Dufferin Overdose Awareness Committee is launching a new anti-stigma campaign, in honour of International Overdose Awareness Day (Aug. 31).

The local group, made up of a number of Dufferin and Caledon based organizations, announced the launch of the anti-stigma campaign called "People who use drugs are real people: Stop the blame. Stop the shame. Stop the stigma", on Aug. 19.

The campaign focuses on the drug-related stigma that individuals who use drugs may experience as well as educates the community on the impact of drug use stereotypes.

"This isn't a big city problem, it happens here in our small community and we're trying to bring more awareness to the community around overdose and addiction resources here," said Kristy Fearon, addiction outreach counsellor at Family Transition Place. "Also providing some supports to families that it's

not a taboo subject that we're willing to talk about it, willing to honour those people and try and bring that awareness."

The Dufferin Overdose Awareness Committee was launched in 2017 as an attempt to bring attention to the addiction services available in Dufferin County and Caledon. After losing two clients to overdose in 2017, Fearon said herself and another co-worker sat down with Family Transition Place to come up with a way to honour August 31, International Overdose Awareness Day, in the community.

For the last five years, the Dufferin Overdose Awareness Committee has honoured August 31 with an awareness event. In March of this year the committee received roughly \$10,000 in funding from the Hills of Headwaters Ontario Health Team (OHT), which Fearon said was used to purchase the rights of the new campaign.

As part of the anti-stigma campaign, the committee will be releasing six videos featuring individuals lived experiences with

substance use, addiction, and stigma they've experienced in the community or ways they were trying to get help.

"Their stories help bring a face to addictions, trying to break down that stigma and those stereotypes. Everyone that uses, they're not the stereotypical drug users that we see in movies or T.V. shows, they're real people and addiction is not picky of who it takes hold of," said Fearon.

From January 1 to August 24 of this year, Dufferin EMS has recorded 68 drug/alcohol overdoses, 37 suspected opioid overdoses, 79 alcohol intoxications, and 30 non-opioid overdoses.

According to data from the Government of Canada, in 2020 there were 6,214 apparent opioid toxicity deaths (approximately 17 deaths per day), of which 96% were accidental. The data also shows that from January 2016 to December 2020 there were 21,174 apparent opioid toxicity deaths.

Fearon noted that getting statistics on overdoses is tricky because there a number

of factors including how a coroner deems death, how an individual presents in hospital or to paramedics, friends/family administering Naloxone, or not seeking medical help.

Despite the difficulty, Fearon said the Dufferin Overdose Awareness Committee is working on creating and launching a system with Public Health for more localized data, but it was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The anti-stigma campaign will also provide a number of accessible resources or information on addiction in the community.

International Overdose Awareness Day will be recognized on August 31, with details shared on the Dufferin Overdose Awareness Committee's Facebook page.

"Hopefully, we can start more conversation around addictions, maybe it [can] become not such a scary topic for people to talk about, and maybe we can lessen some of the stigmas that people experience with certain medical fields, agencies, or policing," said Fearon.

# First men's shelter in Dufferin County celebrates grand opening

Choices Youth Shelter celebrated the grand opening of the first men's emergency shelter in Dufferin County.

Staff and board members of Choices Youth Shelter alongside local politicians, and emergency service workers gathered outside of the local youth shelter, located at 59 Townline, last Friday (Aug. 20) to mark the monumental day.

"A men's shelter has been discussed here at Choices for many years and unfortunately we did not have the resources to support additional time to open one. Recently, the opportunity presented itself through the back of a private donor, and we're proud to announce the opening of Dufferin Men's Shelter," said Randy Narine, chair of Choice Youth Shelter.

"Choices has taken the first steps, but without the help from our community, and long term funding from our leaders, we'll be unable to sustain the shelter. We've taken the first steps and now it's our community's job to take the rest of the steps with us."

Dufferin County's men's emergency shelter has been a two year project for Randy Narine, who previously told the Citizen that he wanted to bring a men's shelter to the community after noticing a gap in existing local services, which are predominately focused on women and youth.

The Dufferin men's shelter has six beds set up between two facilities, but only three of the beds are available, with the others needed to allow for quarantine if there is an outbreak of COVID-19.

A study conducted in Dufferin County in 2018 counted 44 homeless individuals living in the region. In 2019, Dufferin County implemented the By Name List (BNL), which identifies vulnerable community members experiencing homelessness and connects them to a number of services. Numbers from July of 2020 showed there were 16 members on the BNL in Dufferin County with 69 percent male and 31 percent female.

Althea Alli, director of Choices Youth Shelter, said since opening they're already facing a long waitlist for individuals looking to access the men's shelter.

"Everybody here understands how we have been missing a piece in our social services safety in Dufferin County," said Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones. "It is almost impossible to assist people, if they don't have a safe place. Having the men's shelter is going to make a huge difference because it means that we can offer all of those services that we often have in our community, which you can't access if you don't have a safe place."

Choices Youth Shelter typically operates as transitional housing for at risk youth up to the age of 24. According to the BNL data from July 2020, 63 per cent of the individuals facing homelessness were in the age group of 25 to 59.

Alli said the need for transitional housing for those aged out of Choices youth programs is an increasing need.

"COVID has made situations a lot worse, especially affordable housing, there is essentially very limited affordable housing," said Alli. "These individuals need to be further supported until they're able to get affordable housing and hopefully this

service can support them when they leave Choices to at least something transitional in order to get to a more stable ground."

Dufferin County's first men's emergency shelter was able to open as a result of a \$20,000 donation from a private donor, which covers the shelter's operation cost up to the expiration of the lease next month. They are now looking for the county's help to fund a permanent shelter, which costs between \$200,000 and \$300,000 each year.

One main aspect of the men's shelter is the removal of a drug and alcohol policy, which Narine said he had found a hindrance at other shelters.

"You can show up and we will still take you in if you are intoxicated or on something, we just have a no drug or alcohol policy on site," said Narine.

The location of the men's shelter is remaining private at this time but those looking to access it can stop in to Choices' main office at 59 Townline.

# Blood donation clinic schedule for Sept. 17 in Shelburne

Canadian Blood Services is holding a mobile blood drive clinic in Shelburne next month in support of Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

"September is really special for us because it is childhood cancer awareness month and we really encourage donors across the country to help raise awareness for the lifesaving impacts that blood, plasma, stem cells have on childhood cancer patients," said Elaine St. Pierre, territory manager for Canadian Blood Services.

The clinic will be held at the Centre Dufferin Recreation Complex in Shelburne on Sept. 17, by appointment only, between 2:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Pierre said their goal is to

collect 58 units of blood through the upcoming clinic.

While not commonly known, blood donations play an important role in cancer treatment.

"With many different cancers, blood and platelet transfusions are a common treatment and something that really helps to get them through as part of their treatment in a compliment to some of the chemotherapy that they receive," said St. Pierre. "You donating blood could potentially save someone's life."

A leukemia patient, St. Pierre says, can go through up to eight blood donations during

the course of their treatment.

According to the Canadian Cancer Society, childhood cancer is the most common disease-related cause of death in children.

"Cancer is one of those things that doesn't discriminate, and is still going on despite the pandemic," said St. Pierre. "Imagine having a child in your family that is fighting a cancer and in the middle of what's going on with COVID-19. We really want to show our support for those patients and let them know that we're behind them."

At the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, following a call to action for donations, St. Pierre says that Canadian Blood Services saw a surge of people going to clinics to donate blood. With hospitals halting elective procedures and treatments that tend to have high use for blood, she notes

they also experienced a dip in the demand.

Demand for blood donations has now returned to pre-pandemic levels, which St. Pierre said is about 17,000 units of blood at hospitals across the country every single week.

"Because of the short shelf life of blood, we have to make sure that we collect that and a little bit more every single week to make sure that we always have enough blood on hand for patients."

St. Pierre also notes that only 1 in 2 Canadians are eligible to donate.

"If that's you, we need you," she said.

At the time of print, Canadian Blood Services has over a dozen appointment spaces left for the Shelburne clinic.

# People centred approach being taken by local Liberal candidate

Putting people first is a top priority for federal Liberal Party candidate Lisa Post, who's vying for the Dufferin-Caledon seat in the Sept. 20 election.

Some key elements of her campaign and the Liberal Party's platform that are designed to help Canadians include developing a strong action plan on climate change and looking at affordability with respect to housing, child care, and the cost of living for young families.

Post, who's served as an Orangeville Town Councillor since 2018, said the road to recovery from COVID-19 is one of the most important issues heading into the election.

"People want to see us finish the pandemic and then move on from there, so we need to have a really good strategic plan as we come out of the pandemic and a plan to... recover the area that we're in," said Post.

She noted that in addition to developing a plan for the economy, a focus on recovery for the pandemic's social impact is crucial as well.

"There's a very big social component, a very big community component, our community was ripped wide open, and we need to be able to put that back together," said Post.

"I'm confident in people's humanity, I'm confident in the fact that people understand that they now have a duty to take care of one another, and the Liberal Party's platform is completely around taking care of people and putting people first."

Meanwhile, moving work forward that pertains to diversity, inclusion, and equity is another priority for Post, heading into the

"From the 2SLGBTQ community, all the way through to making sure that reconciliation is top of mind, continuing to move forward all of the Truth and Reconciliation commission's calls to action," she said.

"I think the Liberal Party really acknowledges that there is still a long way to go, but it's moving forward, it's forward action, and making sure that everybody's moving forward together."

While the Dufferin-Caledon riding has only ever elected a Conservative MP since its formation in 2004, Post said she's optimistic that there's room for change this time around.

"We've been pigeon holed as being a conservative riding for such a long time and really, this riding is about people, and community is not partisan," Post remarked. "As much as a lot of the people in this area have historically voted Conservative, the demographics are growing, they're changing, they're shifting."

Post said with Dufferin-Caledon being one of the fastest growing ridings in

Ontario, the region needs proper representation to ensure it can meet population growth demands.

"There's some very aggressive growth targets from the provincial level and I think we need to have a strong voice in Ottawa to advocate to make sure that we have the infrastructure dollars coming into this riding to make sure that we can take care of the people that we're going to be moving here," Post explained.

"I think that we need strong leadership at the helm to make sure that we're going the right way and that we're taking the right approach to making sure that our communities well taken care of."

An important part of future development is to ensure Dufferin-Caledon's pristine natural areas, such as the Greenbelt, Whitebelt, and Niagara Escarpment, have strong environmental protections, Post noted.

She said she's glad to see there's a federal assessment taking place for the proposed GTA West Corridor, otherwise known as Highway 413, which is poised to cut through sections of the Greenbelt.

"It's really important that we make sure that if we're moving ahead with a high super-highway of any kind, that we're taking the environment into consideration, and that needs to be done," said Post. "As a councillor with the Town of Orangeville, we opposed the 413 on record and I'll be interested to see what the federal impact assessment is, that's going to be done."

When looking at affordable housing, Post

made note of the nearly \$4 billion that the federal government budgeted for this year for housing affordability initiatives across Canada. Post told the Citizen, a strong voice in Ottawa that can advocate for that money to be spent locally is needed.

"The money's there, it's to be had, we just have to make the right arguments, and we need the right people in the right place to make those arguments," she said. "That's what I'm ready to do. I want to advocate for our people to make sure that some of those initiatives and some of that money is filtering into Dufferin-Caledon, where it needs to be."

Going forward, Post said she's going to continue knocking on doors, getting familiar with the residents across Dufferin and Caledon, and hearing their concerns.

"This election is for people. It's not about Lisa Post, it's not about any of the other candidates. This is about the people in this community, and the best thing that I can do is talk to them," she noted. "We're trying to hit every corner of this riding."

Regardless of people's political preferences, Post said she's been encouraging everyone to get out and vote on Sept. 20.

"We're so fortunate to live in a country where a democracy exists, and we need people to take on that responsibility and that right and vote," she stressed.

# WDGPH providing third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine to eligible individuals

Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph (WDG) Public Health has started providing a third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine to individuals most at risk of serious illness.

The third doses of the COVID-19 vaccines was made available at the local health unit as of Monday (Aug. 23), and will be provided to those in eligible populations, including transplant recipients, patients with hematological cancers, recipients of an anti-CD20 agent, and residents living in high risk congregate settings.

The timing of receiving a third dose is dependent on when the person received their second dose of the COVID-19 vaccines. The interval of time between doses spans from a minimum of eight weeks following the second dose to five months following the second dose.

Transplant recipients, patients with

hematological cancers and recipients of an anti-CD20 agent are able to access a third dose as early as eight-weeks following their second dose, and can do so by contacting their healthcare provider.

Residents of high-risk congregate settings, which include long-term care homes, higher-risk licensed retirement homes and First Nations elder care lodges, will be able to receive a third dose a minimum of five months following their second dose.

The third dose will be offered to these individuals in their residence.

WDG Public Health said the third dose is being offer to these groups only at this time and will not be extended for any other reason.

Public Health also said on their website that two doses of the COVID-19 vaccine provides strong protection against the virus including the Delta variant, but for some vulnerable groups a third dose may be required to boost protection and increase immune response.

Islamist dead-end

Violent Islamist movements, as current events in Afghanistan demonstrate, have had some success in Muslim countries that have been invaded by the United States. But they have failed everywhere else, and the whole Islamist ideology is getting long in the tooth.

There is much media chatter at the moment about how the Taliban's victory will inspire like-minded groups elsewhere and lead to a steep rise in terrorist attacks. Some of this is just journalistic panic-mongering, but various military and political interest groups will also promote this notion for their own purposes.

We will therefore soon find ourselves being urged to engage in a new 'war on terror'. It wouldn't be as big, long, and counter-productive as the first one, but much time and money and many lives would be wasted if it got off the ground.

The Taliban are Afghans, of course, but Islamist terrorism is primarily a phenomenon

of the Arab world. That is the part of the Muslim world where the rulers are most brazenly cruel and corrupt. Many Arabs have been attracted to Islamism as a possible way to replace those rotten regimes - and some of them have concluded that only violence can bring Islamists to power.

A minority of Arabs therefore buys the Islamist argument that the deplorable state of the Arab world is due to the fact that Muslims are failing to live their lives as God intends - in the radical version of Islamic observance that Islamists believe is the only correct interpretation of God's will.

The solution to the Muslim world's current plight, therefore, is to install revolutionary Islamist regimes that will enforce that version of God's will on the population, whereupon with God's help they will start to win. A united Muslim world will arise that breaks its current shackles, achieves great power and prosperity - and in some versions, converts the entire world to Islam.

An attractive vision for many Arabs who were near despair, and the 1970s, '80s and '90s were filled with attempted Islamist rev-

olutions from Algeria to Saudi Arabia - all of which failed. The Islamists never managed to convince enough people that this pipe dream was worth dying for. So around 1999 an Islamist leader called Osama bin Laden came up with a new strategy.

The only way to mobilise enough Muslims behind the Islamist dream, he believed, was to provoke a direct assault on Islam by the infidels. And the only way to motivate the lazy infidels to play their allotted role in this strategy was to attack them directly - not to conquer them, which was impossible, but to trick them into invading Muslim countries.

That was the strategy behind the 9/11 attacks, and it succeeded even beyond bin Laden's expectations. The outraged United States declared the 'War on Terror' and invaded not one but two Muslim countries, Afghanistan and Iraq. The former had little to do with 9/11 and the latter nothing at all, but the invasions had the effect that bin Laden was seeking.

Twenty years later, however, the benefits for the Islamist cause have been quite limited. The Taliban are finally back in power

in Afghanistan, and there was an interval when the 'Islamic State' (ISIS) controlled a lot of Iraq and even expanded into Syria, but there is still not a single revolutionary Islamist regime in the Arab world.

The obvious conclusion is that this strategy has definitively failed. Even with the help of Western invasions and the 'War on Terror', the Islamists have been unable to convince enough Arabs think that they are the right solution to the Arab world's problems.

There will continue to be scattered Islamist terrorist attacks both within and beyond the Arab world for many years, although probably none as dramatic as the 9/11 events. But the notion that the Taliban take-over in Afghanistan will lead to a huge new wave of Islamist terrorism is absurd.

The Taliban's victory was discounted in advance years ago, and the idea of provoking US invasions as recruiting tools for Islamist revolutions is now very old hat. Even Washington can see through it.

An affront to liberty

The federal government's announcement on August 11, 2021, that it will implement a national Covid vaccine passport for international travel in the early fall of 2021 appears to have set off a cascade of vaccine mandates and public pressure for provinces, universities, and private businesses to follow suit.

Prime Minister Trudeau's announcement marks a significant reversal of his previous statements that a vaccine passport would "have divisive impacts on community and country." As with lockdowns in the spring of 2020, once one province or institution succumbs to public pressure, a domino effect occurs.

We are seeing that play out once again with vaccine passports and mandates. And as with lockdowns, anyone seeking to rationally balance the harms is disparaged as an "anti-vaxxer," no matter how many vaccines they or their children have previously accepted.

Calls are growing to make life as difficult as possible for those who won't get with the program. A Hamilton City councillor even argued that people should not even be permitted to access grocery stores and hospitals without showing that they have been vaccinated.

It has been said that those who ignore history are doomed to repeat it. The full implications of widespread vaccine man-

dates are not yet known, but this much is certain: it will divide society. And the overreach being proposed by authorities like the Hamilton City councillor is staggering.

If we continue down this path, those persons who cannot or choose not to be vaccinated for Covid-19, as is their right, will be segregated and denied a normal existence. They will be vilified in the media and by government, ostracized by society and ultimately persecuted. They may even be denied food and medical care. Those who defend them will be censored, silenced, and punished.

The Justice Centre For Constitutional Freedoms has received hundreds of emails from Canadians about this issue in the last weeks and months, and it is clear that individuals' reasons for choosing not to take the Covid vaccine shots to date are as diverse and nuanced as the pluralistic society in which we live. There are also those who are vaccinated yet have privacy concerns about being forced to show their medical status before being allowed by government to move freely about society. Many point to the hasty roll-out of the shots.

Unlike other vaccines which take 5-10 years to undergo clinical trials and where long-term safety data can be studied, the Covid vaccines were rushed to market in mere months, even before clinical trials were finished. Those trials won't be completed until 2023. Section 7 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms should protect the rights of Canadians to choose not to take a medical treatment

that is still in the experimental phase. Other Canadians have doubts about the efficacy of the shots.

The right to have an opinion and to express it is protected in section 2(b) of the Charter, yet each new day brings more censorship and punishment for those Canadians, including medical professionals, who voice concerns about efficacy and safety. In a free and democratic society, the ability to have a conversation, including hearing various viewpoints, is not only a benefit, it is a right.

Canadians have a right to see and hear the data and consider it for themselves. Some Canadians point to countries such as Iceland, where approximately 75 percent of the population has been fully vaccinated, and over 90 percent of people over the age of 16 have had at least one shot.

That country's Chief Epidemiologist recently conceded that herd immunity from vaccination has not and cannot be achieved, as the Delta variant can be contracted easily even by those who are vaccinated and spread it to others. This reality echoes a CDC report from a July 2021 outbreak in Cape Cod, MA, where 469 Covid-19 cases were identified among residents who had travelled there and 74 percent occurred in fully vaccinated persons. Of the 5 hospitalized cases, 4 were fully vaccinated.

Others are concerned that a vaccine passport system ignores the fact that thousands of Canadians are naturally immune from Covid, having recovered from the disease. Natural immunity has been proven to be very robust. In Israel, where approximately 60 percent of the population is fully immunized against Covid, data presented to the Israeli Health Ministry revealed that coronavirus patients who recovered from the virus were far less likely to become infected during the latest wave of the pandemic than people who were vaccinated against Covid.

Many Canadians are concerned about government coercion to take experimental vaccines, and potential side effects of the vaccines, all of which have Health Canada warning labels for various conditions including myocarditis, pericarditis, Bell's Palsy, and thrombosis. Further, according to the US Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System (VAERS), there have been 6,631 recorded deaths among people who have received a Covid vaccine.

And, as the Justice Centre has repeatedly reported over the last 17 months with statistical information from our governments' own websites, the risk of suffering a severe outcome or death from Covid is vanishingly small for children and young adults—even for most adults under 60, unless they suffer from multiple, serious co-morbidities. It would be perfectly reasonable for young adults to decline to accept these known risks, given their low risk of harm from Covid, and it is unethical for universities and colleges to demand this of them as a cost of getting an education. This is medical coercion.

The ferocity with which authorities and the general public are calling for their fellow citizens to either capitulate or be cast out of functioning society is shocking and irrational. Too many people have forgotten how to live in a free society and expect everything and everyone to be tightly controlled. The ability to move about freely, travel, congregate and socialize, are not privileges to be bestowed at the whim of bureaucrats and politicians, but are rather fundamental rights and freedoms that are enshrined in our Constitution. The Justice Centre exists to protect and preserve these rights and is determined to do so.

# Dufferin OPP investigating vehicle rollover in Mulmur

Dufferin OPP officers are investigating a single vehicle rollover that occurred in Mulmur last Thursday evening.

Members of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) Dufferin Detachment, along with Simcoe County EMS and the Honeywood Fire Department responded to the serious single vehicle collision at approximately 8 p.m. last Thursday (Aug. 19) on County Road 21 between Airport Road and Third Line in Mulmur.

Dufferin OPP in a press release said the collision involved a sport utility vehicle (SUV) towing a small trailer with a sea-doo. Police said the vehicle left the roadway,

rolled into a ditch colliding with a tree.

The lone driver of the vehicle sustained life-threatening injuries as a result of the incident and was airlifted by Air Ornge to a trauma centre.

County Road 21 in Mulmur was closed for about six hours for an investigation into the rollover.

The Traffic Collision Investigation (TCI) team of the OPP was brought in to investigate.

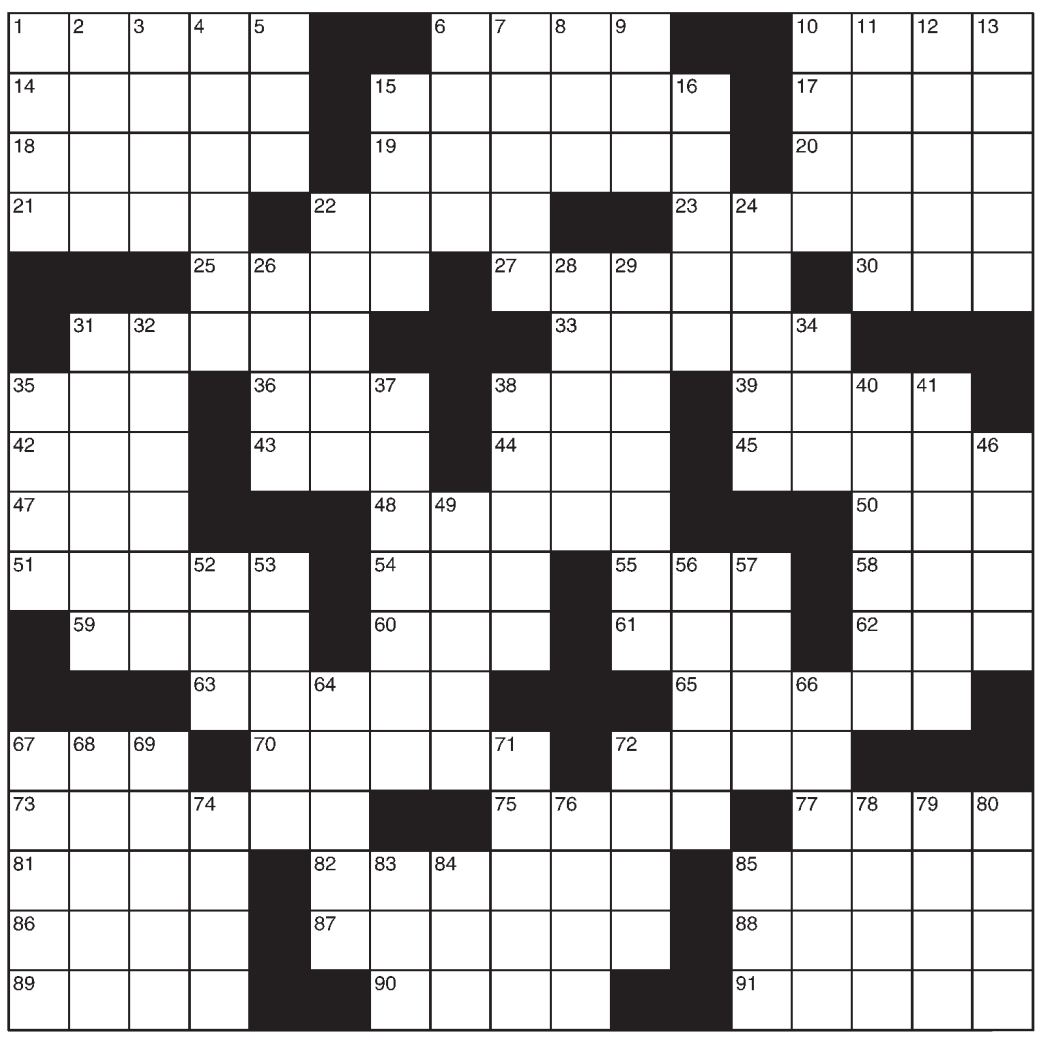

## Headwaters–Orangeville Ram Rodeo coming to town this weekend

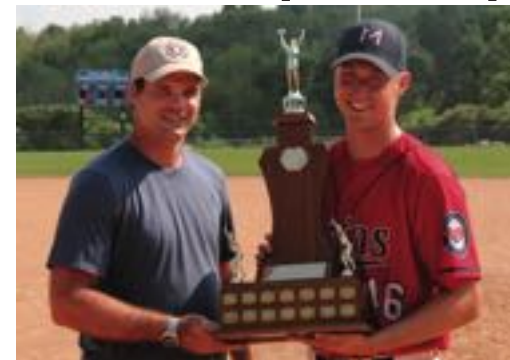
Chris Zanchetta was the starting pitcher for Caledon pitching one inning, giving up seven hits and six runs, and had one strike out.

# People's Party of Canada putting focus on freedom this election

People's Party of Canada leader Maxime Bernier is back in the political arena after first forming his party in September of 2018.

Compared to the established political parties in Canada, Bernier is taking a much different approach, with a strong emphasis on personal responsibility and freedom, as well as an unwavering commitment to reducing the government's size.

Bernier, who was a cabinet minister under the Stephen Harper government, was recently in the area for a rally and sat down for an interview to discuss his campaign as the Sept. 20 federal election draws closer.

In speaking with Bernier, he said balancing the federal budget and eliminating the deficit, which was nearly \$22 billion in 2019 and jumped to \$314 billion in 2020, are two key priorities.

"We will balance the budget in four years," he said. "We would be able to do that because we'll cut the CBC dollars, we will cut foreign aid, we will cut corporate welfare, we will look at all the money that we're giving to the U.N [United Nations] and international organizations, because we are fighting for our sovereignty – Canada first."

Bernier said he opposes socialism, globalism, and what he calls "government overreach" with respect to the provincial and federal government's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

He said a focus on protecting the elderly and people with comorbidities, while allowing those who are young, healthy, and willing to work maintain their employment, would have been a better approach than using lockdowns.

"The virus is there, we will have to live with the virus, like other viruses, so that's why we must end all that," Bernier remarked. "The COVID-19 hysteria must end."

When asked what issue he was most concerned about heading into the election, Bernier said it's the federal government's latest move to mandate vaccines for federal employees, as well as air and train passengers, travelling within Canada.

"If you want to travel, you need to have a vaccine passport, and that's immoral, unconstitutional, illegal – and I believe that a lot of Canadians understand that," he remarked.

"The main question for this election is do we want more and more of what we had the last 17 months or live in a real free society,

not in a communist society, where with everything that you want to do, you have to show your papers."

Bernier added that the People's Party of Canada isn't against vaccinations, but is for freedom of choice, where all citizens are able to decide if they want to be vaccinated, with informed consent.

"They are pushing and pushing the vaccine, and they want to divide our society into two groups of citizens, and we are against that," he said.

The Peoples Party of Canada is based on upon four core principles: individual freedom, personal responsibility, respect, and fairness.

Bernier said all of his party's decisions are made with these four principles in mind.

"We are doing politics differently because we are doing politics based on these principles. We are doing politics based on conviction and not on surveys and polling to know what you want to hear," he noted.

Bernier said he isn't making any big election promises like the mainstream parties to gain votes, but instead, recognizes that Canada's running a high deficit and will work towards eliminating it over the next four years, if elected.

Meanwhile, eliminating inflation, which is currently the highest it's been since 2011, is another one of the party's priorities, he noted.

"There's 3.7 per cent inflation and if you do your groceries, that's about four or five per cent. That must stop. Everybody is poorer," Bernier said. "Our policy's to have a zero inflation target with the Bank of Canada, so that Canadians will keep their purchasing power and the standard of living."

August 15 of this year marked the 50th anniversary of the United States ending the gold standard, under the Bretton Woods Agreement, which the rest of the world followed in, creating the fiat money system that exists today.

Fiat currency, which is money made legal tender by a government decree rather than something of actual value backing it, is largely responsible for inflation increasing more rapidly in the last 50 years. Since 1971 when the gold standard was created, the cost of living has increased 700 per cent.

Bernier is the only Canadian politician publicly in favour of reviving the gold standard or pegging the dollar to something of value again as a way of eliminating inflation, however, he said it isn't possible unless other countries do the same.

Alternative currencies such as Bitcoin, which will officially become legal tender in El Salvador on Sept. 7, are also of interest to Bernier, who says he wouldn't regulate the digital asset and welcomes competition in the space.

Although, the first step for the People's Party of Canada is bringing the Bank of Canada inflation target down to zero and achieving it through cutting spending and money printing.

With respect to the climate, Bernier says "There should be no climate hysteria" as the climate has always been changing throughout history.

"We're the only party that won't sign the Paris Accord, we won't impose a carbon tax," he said. "We'll do something for the environment, we'll have a concrete policy to be sure that all lakes are clear – our waters and rivers. So, we need to

do more concrete action for the environment, but climate change, I leave that to provinces, if they want to do something."

Going forward, Bernier said he's hopeful his party will gain more support than in the 2019 election, where he saw 1.4 per cent of the national vote. However, he did note that 1.4 per cent of the total vote isn't the worst place to start as a newly formed party, considering it took the Green Party of Canada 20 years to achieve the same popularity at the voting booth.

Bernier said he encourages everyone to learn more about the People's Party of Canada ahead of the federal election on Sept. 20.

"Please go and see our platform and if you like what you are seeing, that we are doing politics different, support us," he said.

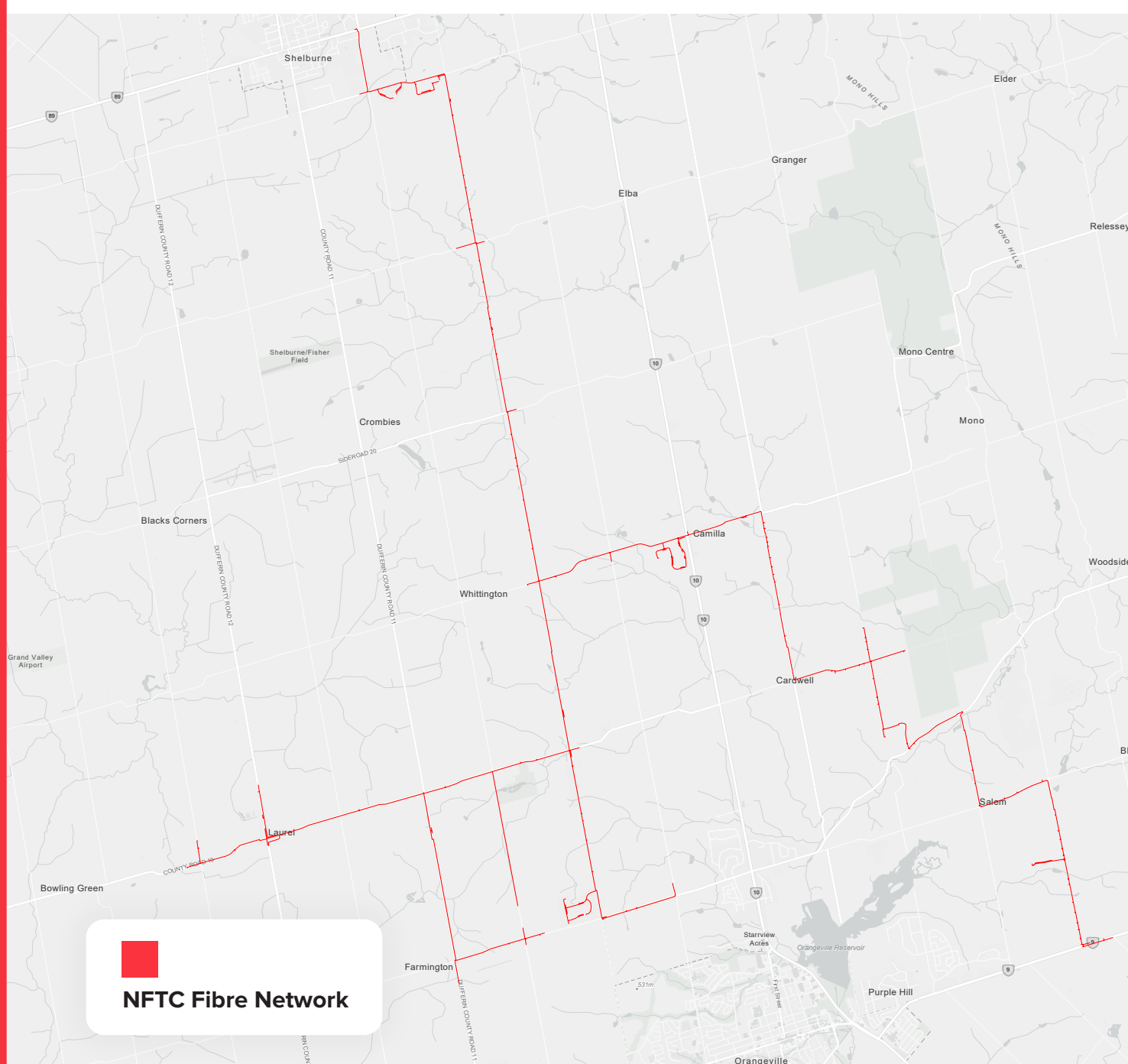
