## Shelburne's Deputy Mayor and Mayor running for re-election

Shelburne voters will see two familiar names on the ballot for mayor and deputy mayor come this fall's election.

It was a scene recreated from almost four years ago, as Shelburne Mayor Wade Mills and Deputy Mayor Steve Anderson gathered at Town Hall on May 17 to file their nomination papers for re-election in the upcoming municipal election scheduled for Oct. 24.

"It's exciting to be back here putting our names in for re-election," said Mills. "It's been an interesting term to say the least and coming into office there was certainly some major challenges that we anticipated, but despite that we worked together as a group and accomplished some big things."

"Wade and I started this journey almost four years ago. We stood up there on the steps really sending a clear signal and message to the Town of Shelburne that it's a new time and new direction," said Anderson. "We certainly had a lot of enthusiasm and I think the community did as well, and that enthusiasm continues today."

In July of 2018, when Mills and Anderson first submitted nominations papers for the two town council leadership roles, the duo were focused on bringing change to the existing council landscape. It's a sentiment both say they feel has begun to take place over their four-year term.

"I've said to many folks that once upon a time Shelburne may have been in the shadows of Orangeville and some of the other municipalities, but not anymore," said Anderson. "We're on equal footing. We've demonstrated leadership when we need to show leadership."

Focused on adapting the community to its growing population while also maintaining Shelburne's community identity, Council has ticked off significant changes in four years including; infrastructure improvements; commercial developments; transit options; and diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives.

But, both members of Council say there's

more to be done.

"We've accomplished a lot over the last three and a half years, but there's still a lot more work to be done and that's why we're here today," said Mills.

"We're back here again, filing our papers once again to really take on that leadership role because the work is unfinished, but we believe that we're heading in the right direction," said Anderson.

With the election still months away, neither candidate gave specifics on their platforms during the campaign period, but said they will be turning to the community for input.

"It's very early days into this process and as the campaign period unfolds and we get a change to get out and talk to resident more, we'll be able to put a finer point on specific politics," said Mills. "In terms of big picture, we've put this community on a fairly strong trajectory and what I want to make sure happens is that we don't lose the ground we've made up over the past four years."

Mills has served on Shelburne Council since 2014. A council member in his first term, Mills ran for and was elected Mayor of Shelburne in 2018. In December 2021, he was elected as the 145 Warden of Dufferin County.

Anderson's political career in Shelburne began in 2017, when he was appointed to council following the passing of council member Tom Egan. Anderson ran for and was elected as Deputy Mayor in 2018.

# Family Transition Place launches Lotus Centre program

Family Transition Place is expanding their sexual violence services with the launch of a new program.

The new program, known as the Lotus Centre, aims to provide a larger continuum of support for victims and survivors of sexual violence with increased counselling opportunities.

“The biggest piece for us is we really want a message that people can access us and get the support they need, when they need it – we don’t want waitlists,” said Lynette Pole-Langdon, director of counselling, education and community mental health initiatives. “With the new expanded services, we’re able to provide services whenever a client needs it, whether it’s grief counselling support, support in the evening, or on site at a high school with our mobile crisis counselor.”

With new annualized provincial funding, Family Transition Place has been able to hire a number of employees to facilitate the

expansion of services including more clinical counsellors to avoid waitlists, a community engagement facilitator to build awareness, and a mobile crisis counselor.

Supports that the Lotus Centre offers includes; 24/7 crisis counselling; sexual violence counselling services; support for partners, family and friends of survivors; therapeutic group counselling; sexual violence peer support groups; and sexual violence education and community engagement.

The name of the new program – Lotus Centre – holds significant meaning for Family Transition Place and the goals of the expanded services.

“A lotus flower represents new beginnings and symbolizes strength, resilience and

rebirth,” explained Kelly Lee, manager of fund development and communication strategies. “Those are all things that a lot of our clients will be going through, through the experiences that they’ve gone through.”

As part of expanding their sexual violence support services, Family Transition Place is also bringing awareness to the language used surrounding sexual violence, specifically to incorporate the spectrum of sexual violence that exists against all genders.

“Instead of talking about sexual assault, we’re talking about sexual violence because what we’re seeing and recognizing now is that often when people think of sexual assault they think of the physical assault, but we know people are impacted through sexual violence on a continuum,” said Pole-Langdon. “People’s experiences around sexual violence has changed, look at social media nowadays when you look at non consensual sharing of pictures.”

Sexual violence can include, but is not limited to: sexual assault, trafficking, stalking, rape, sharing nude photos without consent, catcalling, harassment, sexist media and advertising, and online harassment.

Statistically, one in three women and one in six men will experience sexual violence in their lives and in many cases, they will know the person who attacked them and not report the crime to police.

The month of May is recognized as Sexual Violence Prevention Month.

“The messaging that we’ve been putting out throughout the month is that we’re here for the community. A lot of people are hesitant and reluctant to make that call and it is very stigmatizing to be in that situation, but our counselors and our partner counselors are here to listen, support and to take that next step. There really is no wrong number to call, they’re going to get the support that they need,” said Lee.

Family Transition Place partners with Dufferin Children and Family Services (DCAF’s) and Headwaters Hospital and has sexual violence counselling services available in Orangeville, Shelburne and Bolton.

## Upper Grand offering free PSW program

The Upper Grand District School Board (UGDSB) is offering enrollment of its 2022 Personal Support Worker (PSW) Program for free.

The school board announced in a news release on May 24 that the program, which is run through the Continuing Education department, would be offered tuition-free. Enrollees of the PSW program will also have opportunities for paid work placements.

“This pandemic has touched everyone in profound ways and the need for this kind-hearted, caring profession is great,” said Julie Bodiam, principal of UGDSB Continuing Education. “Personal Support Workers make a significant difference in the lives of the people they work with. If the field of healthcare is something you are interested in, then I encourage you to come to an information session and see if becoming a PSW is right for you.”

Led by instructors holding Ontario teaching and professional nursing qualification the PSW program covers a number of subjects including anatomy, physiolo-

gy, mobility, safety, hygiene, abuse identification and reporting, household management, care planning, cognition, mental health, managing ongoing conditions, assisting with medications, palliative care, interpersonal skills, and career education.

Students will also gain numerous certifications including CPR and First Aid, as well as earn credits toward their Ontario Secondary School Diploma while completing the program.

“Personal Support Workers are vital to our communities and healthcare system. The UGDSB’s PSW Program provides training that responds to a labour market skills shortage need, provides students with a robust program, and allows participants to engage in meaningful and paid work while making connections to support organization in our communities,” said UGDSB chair, Linda Busuttill.

A one-hour information session is schedule for May 27 from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. and May 30 from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Tytler Centre for Continuing Education in Guelph.

## Safe online trading

The Orangeville Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police have set up a space in their parking lot that is to be used for a Safe Trade project.

This a place right in front of the detachment where you can meet a stranger to conduct business that originated online.

I'm not sure how many police services are doing this but I have heard it is being done at other detachments and police stations around the province.

Online trading and selling has become quite the enterprise. If you have something that you want to get rid of but is still valuable, you can post it for free on sites like Craigslist.com or Kijiji.com, and probably other numerous sites I'm not aware of.

If you have something that people are interested in, you will no doubt get a reply.

The first time I placed an ad online was for my car which had served me well but finally developed enough problems that it was time to get rid of it. No person in their right mind would buy this car, it just had too many things wrong with it, so it was time to send it to the scrap yard.

I placed an ad with a photo of the car and a description of its condition stating it was

basically done but was good for scrap. At the time, the price of scrap was pretty high.

To my amazement, almost immediately I received offers from around 15 scrap dealers that were interested. Apparently they have people who monitor these sites as part of their business.

That car was gone the next morning when a guy arrived with a six-car carrier and an envelope with \$300 cash.

The transaction was easy and completed with a legitimate business owner, who no doubt took the salvageable parts from the car and turned the rest into scrap metal to be melted down and recycled into the fender of a new car at some later date.

The next time I placed an ad, it was a very different experience.

I had ordered a pair of 'Doc Martin' boots from a company in China. Actually, they were Doc Martin-like, and coming from China were a total rip off of the real thing. Yes, they were cheap, but looked good, and the price was right.

Unfortunately, the Chinese version of shoe sizes doesn't really match the North American version.

My size 10 1/2 boots were more like a

size 9. I tried them on and walked around for a while to see if I could break them in. Nope - when your boots are a good half-inch shorter than you need, no amount of walking is going to make them comfortable.

What to do with a pair of brand new boots you'll never be able to wear? I took a photo and placed an ad online selling for the same price I paid for them.

Almost immediately I started getting responses, and not from local people. I was getting inquiries from around the province, which seemed a little crazy - they were only a pair of boots.

Late that night I got a message from a guy in Barrie asking if they were still available.

When I said they were, he stated he would buy them and could I please hold them for him. I replied in the affirmative. I would keep them for him.

He then offered to drive down immediately from Barrie to pick up the boots. That meant he would have arrived at my place around 1:30 or 2:00 a.m.

I declined his offer, but said if he arrived the next morning I would be there.

He said he could be there at 9:00 a.m. Sure enough, 9:00 a.m. on the dot, my

doorbell rang.

This guy was super stoked about getting these boots, and was worried that I had already sold them before he arrived - like I had a 3:00 a.m. appointment that had beat him to it.

Yes, he was a bit if a kook. They were only a pair of boots.

The problem with selling things online is that you will be meeting someone you do not know. Not everyone has the best intentions when showing up to take a look at the phone you advertised for sale.

The police initiative that allows you to meet right in the police station parking lot for a sale, at least provides some security knowing that most people won't try to commit a criminal act while being recorded under surveillance cameras with police officers just steps away.

This is a good initiative that can provide a level of comfort when you have to meet a total stranger, and when money is involved.

It is better to be safe, than sorry.

## Overreaction to pandemic

and called four witnesses with impressive credentials, all of whom said masking the asymptomatic was counterproductive. An attempt by the college to keep the testimony under wraps wasn't upheld, allowing us to see almost all of it.

One expert whose name was redacted is an infectious disease specialist and medical microbiologist who testified he prepared nine expert reports in five provinces regarding COVID-19 and SARS-CoV-2. He submitted a report to the tribunal and testified in January that this was the fifth seasonal coronavirus and it acted just like the previous four.

What does this mean?

First, the infection fatality ratio has decreased. Part of the reason is that the most 'susceptible' and 'frail' succumb to the first wave.

Second, viruses tend to become more easily spread but less deadly over time. Otherwise, they die out, much like the more deadly but short-lived SARS-CoV-1 that broke out in 2002.

"We just know, and we've seen this all over the world now for two years, that you have waves that go up and waves that come down, in many cases no matter what you do," the expert said. He added that the spread of the virus and its resultant mortality increased the more densely the city was populated. And the older a patient was, the more likely their immune system could not overcome the disease.

Because none of these three main mortality factors - the season, age of the person and population density - could be changed, so efforts to stop the virus could only go so far.

Besides this, epidemiological studies suggest that, in general, "80 per cent of all transmission occurs within the household," and symptomatic transmission was 25 times more responsible than asymptomatic transmission. Although this evidence base was prior to SARS-CoV-2, what had emerged since has not refuted it, he said.

"Once you have community transmission on every continent," a disease becomes endemic, he explained. By April 2020, he already knew SARS-CoV-2 in one mutation or another was with us for good.

"It's dangerous, I think, societally, to be treating everybody who otherwise looks healthy as a potential germ carrier for an infection that's widely prevalent and going to be around forever," he said. "What we've clearly seen is that the interventions put in place have not had a significant effect."

If the effects were minimal against the disease, what about the impact on society?

His report said that, in Alberta, there were 1,010 COVID-related deaths in people under 60 years of age as of April 16, 2021, and that

there were 1,191 motor vehicle fatalities in 2018 in people under 55 years of age.

Should we ban motor vehicles to bring motor vehicle deaths to zero, or would the price be too great?

For COVID-19, instead of focused protection for the elderly and vulnerable, we masked everyone, hindered businesses, taped up children's playgrounds, kept people from seeing their loved ones, and on and on. But at what cost?

According to an analysis by economics professor Douglas Allen at Simon Fraser University, for every 3.6 to 282 years taken by the collateral damage of COVID-19 interventions, one year was saved.

"It is possible that lockdown will go down as one of the greatest peacetime policy failures in Canada's history," Allen concluded. His study (sfu.ca/~allen/LockdownReport.pdf), which combined the analyses of 80 studies on COVID-19 and was released in April 2021, hasn't been effectively refuted. But it has been largely ignored.

Governments, most medical authorities, mainstream media, and social media have discredited and silenced opinions that were against the direction they took on the pandemic response. None of these parties want to be embarrassed now by allegations they did more harm than good.

That ought to change. The only thing worse than the adage that those who forget the lessons of history are doomed to repeat it is when people never learn those lessons at all.

## ATV accident hospitalizes two children

Dufferin OPP are investigating a single ATV collision in Shelburne.

## Impaired driver nabbed in Dufferin

Dufferin OPP charged a person with impaired operation after an early morning traffic complaint.

On May 20, 2022, at approximately 7:00 a.m., Dufferin OPP received a traffic complaint of a possible impaired driver in the area of Riddell Road and Highway 10.

A Dufferin OPP officer was able to locate the suspected vehicle in a parking lot on C-Line in Orangeville. The officer commenced an investigation into the traffic complaint, which led into an impaired

operation investigation.

As a result of the investigation, Navjot SINGH, 21-year-old, from Brampton has been charged with:

- Operation while impaired - alcohol and drugs

The accused is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Orangeville, in July of 2022, to answer to the charge. The accused's driver's licence was suspended for 90 days and their vehicle impounded for seven days. The charge hasn't been proven in court.

## Over 270 driving related provincial offence notices laid last week

May 17 to May 24, 2022, marked Canada Road Safety Week. Members of the Dufferin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) participated in this awareness campaign that is designed to save lives and reduce injuries on Canada's roads.

Dufferin OPP officers laid 273, driving related Provincial Offence Notices during the campaign, with the following breakdown:

- Speeding - 235
- Fail to Stop- Stop sign - 8
- Distracted Driving - 2
- Stunt - 5
- Careless Driving- 8

In this one-week period, Dufferin OPP responded to one all-terrain vehicle collision and 22 motor vehicle collisions, with zero fatalities, which is the statistic that

Dufferin OPP is most grateful for. Dufferin OPP was proud to participate in this year's Canada Road Safety Campaign. While this public safety initiative was part of a national effort, our local efforts are always to make the roads in Dufferin County among the safest in the world.



## Public Health launches annual mosquito larvicide program

With warmer weather comes the return of mosquito season, and work has begun to reduce mosquito populations in the Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph region.

Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph (WDG) Public Health announced on May 19 the launch of their annual mosquito larvicide program, which aims to reduce mosquito populations known to carry West Nile virus. The program will run until early October.

"Mosquitos are more than just a spring and summer time annoyance," said Dr. Nicola Mercer, Medical Officer of Health and CEO of WDG Public Health. "Some species may carry the West Nile virus which, if transmitted to humans, may cause flu-like symptoms and in rare cases, inflammation of the brain or spinal column can occur which may result in permanent disability or death."

Through the program, trained technicians apply larvicide by hand in areas of standing water in and around communities in Wellington and Dufferin County helping to reduce or eliminate mosquito populations.

According to WDG Public Health, in 2021 there was one confirmed human case of the West Nile virus, and two cases in birds identified in the Wellington-Dufferin-Guelph region.

"By proactively treating areas of standing water on municipal property, we're helping to prevent these areas from becoming sites

for mosquitoes to breed," said Mercer.

Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water so eliminating the breeding areas is the first line of defense. Larvicide is used in potential larvae breeding sites where standing water cannot be eliminated or is more difficult to control.

These areas include roadside ditches, temporary pools, sewage lagoons, storm-water retention ponds, areas of standing water, and municipal catch basins.

Public Health is encouraging property owners to remove standing water anywhere it tends to collect including flower pots, bird baths, wheelbarrows, eaves troughs, rain barrel and tires.

Public Health said residents can reduce the risk of mosquito bites and potential exposure to West Nile virus by wearing light-coloured pants and long-sleeved shirts, avoiding being

outside at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes tend to feed, and using mosquito repellent with DEET or Icaridin for adults and children over 6 months of age.

# Helping voters decide: DBOT hosts candidates' forum

Five candidates vying for the Dufferin-Caledon seat in the upcoming provincial election recently squared off at a candidates' forum.

The two-hour long debate, held by the Dufferin Board of Trade (DBOT) last Wednesday, saw Sylvia Jones (Progressive Conservative), Bob Gordanier (Liberal), Tess Prendergast (NDP), Andrea Banyai (New Blue), and Laura Campbell (Green) answer questions on a variety of topics.

None of the questions were provided to candidates in advance of the candidates' forum.

### Local housing crisis

Doug Harkness of DBOT moderated the event and first asked, "if elected, what would you do to address the housing crisis in the community?"

Campbell responded that Dufferin-Caledon needs more "missing middle" housing and to stop paving over farmland with urban sprawl.

The way to do this is by making key investment and supporting municipalities to put in gentle density development, such as duplexes, triplexes, nanny suites, garden suites, and other forms of housing people can afford.

She noted that the starting house prices in Dufferin-Caledon of \$800,000 or \$900,000 is out of reach for too many people.

"We need to make sure that we're getting homes that are actually affordable, and Greens have prioritized that," said Campbell.

Banyai said she's very familiar with the housing crisis, having been searching for a new home in the region for the past few months with no luck.

She noted that larger developments design infrastructure plans that aren't always the best fit for innovation in the housing sector.

"We do believe in development, we do want to encourage development, but we need to remove the red tape for smaller developers to come into the picture to be able to build new, innovative, creative ways for people to live," said Banyai, who highlighted modern trailer park communities as an example.

Prendergast said the NDP believes housing is a human right that every Ontarian is entitled to.

"I was listening to a Dufferin County regional meeting, and they said that over 700 families had requested supports for affordable housing. To me that says there are 700 families on the brink of homeless-

ness. It's a very precarious situation where we live in a rural setting where access to rental homes and supply just doesn't exist," Prendergast remarked.

She added that the NDP plans to build 1.5 million homes in 10 years, end exclusionary zoning, and build more gentle density in the "missing middle" as Campbell highlighted.

"We're also planning on creating a new public agency, Housing Ontario to build over 250,000 new affordable and nonmarket homes, which people can rent," said Prendergast. "We will bring back rent control so you will pay what the last tenant paid. That's really important to keep people in their affordable homes."

Gordanier's answer was that on the campaign trail, it's the same complaint at the door, rents have gone up and people are paying as much as \$600 more than they were prior. He said this is due to there being no rent control, which the Ford government removed in November of 2018.

He said the Liberals would bring back rent control and build 1.5 million homes over the next 10 years, same as the NDP.

"Young people, and newcomers and families need to get into the housing market," he noted.

Jones said whether it's a young person trying to get their foot in the door or a senior citizen who wants to downsize but not leave their faith, family, and friends - affordable housing is needed.

"We have already started making changes as a provincial government, working with our municipal partners, working with home-builders, working with organizations like

Habitat for Humanity," Jones noted. "We have, in fact, already put in some policy changes that have made a true difference."

Last year 100,000 new homes were built in Ontario, the highest in 30 years, Jones lauded.

"The policies that we are putting in place are making a difference right here in Orangeville. We are seeing rental properties being built, I can't remember the last time we had rental properties being built in our community," she added.

### Internet service grants

Harkness asked candidates what they would do to expedite grant applications for Internet Service Providers (ISPs), as many municipalities have actively supported ISPs in their provincial and federal grant applications. He noted that apart from SWIFT rollouts and announcements there's been radio silence on the fate of these applications.

Banyai said she understands the lack of internet connection issues in Dufferin-Caledon personally, having two megabits per second of speed at her rural home.

"I have been trying since I moved into my house in Mono to get faster internet and it is impossible," she noted. "We contacted every single service provider there and tried to build a tower. I am well aware of how difficult it is to get high speed internet."

With her house being 400 feet off the road, even if optic fibre lines were built up to the end of the driveway, she'd need to pay for them to get to the house.

"Realistically, the only option is Starlink, and I've also been waiting on that waitlist for a year and a half now," said Banyai. "There's no way to contact them. So, if I was elected as MPP, I think that would be one of the first things I would do, is find a contact information from Starlink and figure out what is the

problem with getting it to our communities."

Prendergast said with Ontario mandating online learning for secondary school students, high speed broadband internet is critical.

As a sixth-grade teacher, she said she saw some of her students from Grand Valley struggle firsthand with online learning during COVID lockdowns, due to their unreliable internet service.

Prendergast noted that the NDP government is guaranteeing that on or by 2025, they will deliver high speed broadband internet to all of Ontario.

"I spoke to a farmer who had to drive 25 minutes to Tim Hortons to download essential software updates for his farming equipment. So that's taking 40-50 minutes out of his day to do that, and how often does that have to happen?" Prendergast asked.

Gordanier said internet service is undoubtedly a problem in the riding and anyone who runs a business needs a stable connection.

"I don't know actually, who is in control of this as far as getting it done. But you cannot run a farm anywhere without feed rations, communications, sales - we can go on forever," he said. "I believe we need to put somebody on this and get it done."

Jones said reliable broadband is a priority for her government and by 2025 every region across Ontario will have reliable broadband.

She commented on Mansfield and Mulmur recently getting an expansion of internet services from Bell and how Pikangikum, a fly-in community in northern Ontario, was able to get internet through low earth orbit satellites.

Jones said the slow turnaround of proposals the province submits to the federal government is part of the reason why there hasn't been much money granted locally.

Campbell said as Ontarians increasingly work from home, reliable internet service is critical and high-speed internet needs to be rolled out across the province.

"Ontario Greens have made that a priority," she noted. "It's part of our platform to make broadband internet an essential service for the people of Ontario."

The way this is achieved is by working with municipalities and making sure they're not burdened with waiting long amounts of time for grants.

The Greens would also incentivize the market, according to Campbell.

"We don't want another situation where we have two major corporations [Rogers and Bell] that essentially have a monopoly on the services. We need to level the playing field for smaller providers so that folks have more choices for internet for their homes," she explained.

The provincial election is June 2.

# Green Party candidate hoping to rebuild province, work across party lines

Laura Campbell is running again as the Dufferin-Caledon candidate for the Green Party of Ontario in the upcoming June 2 election.

Campbell first ran in 2018 and said her campaign has grown to be much bigger this year.

"I think people are really excited that they have a strong green here and that we can build the movement for collaborative politics, just thinking about prevention of some of the problems that we're seeing in society," said Campbell.

"The foundations of the province are really cracked and broken, and instead of just papering over them, putting in plugs, band aid solutions, we want to make sure that we are actually fixing the foundation. We can do this through new types of solutions to these old problems."

Some prompt actions the Green Party would take, if elected, is addressing the "immediate crisis" in healthcare by bringing more nurses into the system and repealing Bill 124 which caps wages for nurses at one per cent per year.

The Greens would also make sure Personal Support Workers (PSWs) have a permanent wage increase, starting at \$25 an hour for new hires, said Campbell.

Making all of long-term care not-for-profit is another platform item for the Greens, she noted.

"In conversation with other experts from the sector, it's very clear, the fact that it's not standardized causes a lot of chaos in the system. Some of the homes, in particular, the ones that are run publicly or through the County are great places to work," she explained.

"Then some of the private long term care homes, they can't retain staff, and these people are paid minimum wage - it's just not right."

## New climate economy

She told the Citizen the Green Party of Ontario sees capitalizing on the "new climate economy" as the best way forward to start reducing carbon emissions and be ahead of the curve.

"It's a multi trillion-dollar global opportunity, and we have this skilled labor, we have the resources. I think we need to revitalize types of manufacturing in Ontario, because that'll create the prosperity to fund the important public services that we need," said Campbell.

Manufacturing in Ontario helps reduce climate emissions as goods don't have to travel overseas and there are stronger environmental regulations compared to some developing countries where goods are sourced.

With the rapidly rising cost of fuel increasing the price of everything that is transported into or across the province, Campbell said "Big Oil" isn't very economical and dependency on oil depresses the economy.

"It's great profits for the oil companies but it doesn't really trickle down to the rest of us. It makes life a lot harder," Campbell said.

The transition to a green economy will be gradual, she noted, and the Green Party of Ontario has a clearly laid out a plan and path forward to achieve net zero by 2045, with most reductions taking place before 2030.

"That's a really intense timeline, but if you set those targets, then what happens is government can sort of step in and create the investments needed to actually make those reductions happen," Campbell reasoned.

She said energy retrofits for houses and buildings is critical for making progress towards net zero and the Greens would offer up to \$25,000 in grants for homeowners to make these changes.

Reducing carbon emissions from transportation is essential for the new climate economy and not as daunting now with the inven-

tion of electric vehicles and electrified transit, according to Campbell. She added that electric bikes, scooters, and forms of active transportation would fit into the transportation grid as well.

With the right incentives, there could be a boom in the electric transportation and retrofit industries, Campbell noted.

She said an important part of moving to electric vehicles is ensuring that the rare minerals needed to manufacture the batteries are being sourced from Ontario where possible and responsibly extracted.

With respect to extraction, Ontario is rich in lithium and boron, two key minerals for making electric vehicle batteries, however much of it is located near First Nation reserves.

"We need to be working in consultation with the Indigenous communities and making sure that they essentially profit from this and that they have a hand in this work," said Campbell.

"I think that the consultation piece is always front and centre with what Ontario Greens are doing, because we are really driven by an indigenous worldview, which is that were planning for the next seven generations."

She added, "I just personally don't trust the Ford government to do this in an ethical way."

Living up to commitments made in the United Nations Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) and meeting the recommendations in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission are a priority for the Greens as well.

## Creating good jobs

Another key component of restructuring the economy around clean energy and reducing emissions is creating good paying, long term jobs.

"We're creating a future where people aren't going to get consistently laid off. Knowing folks who have worked in the oil sands or other types of industries, we know that the boom-and-bust cycles are really disruptive for communities and hard on people who work in that industry," Campbell remarked.

In Ontario, 50 years from now, Campbell said she anticipates there will still be some fossil fuel energy used in the province's energy infrastructure in some capacity but it needs to be scaled back dramatically.

She told the Citizen she's critical of other provincial parties claiming to take climate change seriously when they have no clear climate plan.

"Without actually saying how you're going to get to net zero, what it's going to cost, and how you're going to pay for it, it's not a climate plan... it's a fairy tale," she remarked.

## Rethinking politics

Campbell said a problem with the current Queens Park system is it encourages election promise gimmicks and politicians doing whatever it takes to be re-elected instead of really thinking about solving issues, which her party is doing.

"We have a culture within the Greens that

emphasizes working across party lines to get things done. We emphasize community and community needs, and making sure that we take what we're hearing from our community and are advocating for those things at Queen's Park," she noted.

Green Party of Ontario Leader Mike Schreiner was instrumental in working across party lines to ban commercial evictions so all of the small businesses impacted by COVID-19 measures couldn't be kicked out of their communities, Campbell lauded.

## Voting percentages

When Campbell first ran under the Green Party banner for the provincial election in 2018, she came in third place with 12.53 per cent of the vote last year, just ahead of the local Liberal candidate who received 12.46 per cent.

The NDP candidate received 20.34 per cent of the vote, while Progressive Conservative incumbent Sylvia Jones received 53 per cent.

Campbell said she'd encourage everyone to get out and vote Green on June 2 in the provincial election.

"The reason you vote Green is because we're going to be honest with people about how we're going to pay for things, we're always going to be honest with people about what is needed to get things done," she said.

"The only way you're going to get what you want is to vote for what you want. I just don't think strategic voting works - it's never been successful anywhere. You just got to vote for what you want to vote for."

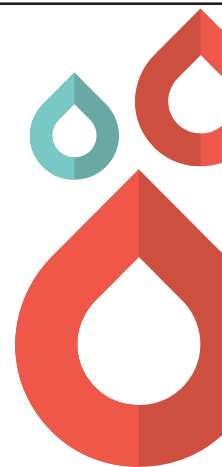
