Haunt in the Park to feature fresh scares at Fiddle Park

It's that creepy-crawly time of year again when Fiddle Park in Shelburne transforms to host spooky guests and creatures at the annual Haunt in the Park.

Hosted by the Little family, the Halloween-themed attraction will return to the community for three nights to give screams and scares on Oct. 25 and Oct. 26 from 7 p.m. to 1 p.m. and Halloween night (Oct. 31) from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

"At a time when people are struggling to keep traditions alive, we love the fact that the community gives us such a great response each year so we can continue with the same enthusiasm," said Carola Little, one of the event's organizers. "We love the fact that everyone is so supportive in what has become a really big tradition for us."

The Haunt in the Park event originally began in 1993 when Bob and Sue Little and their three then-teenage children set up a haunted house on the porch of their First Avenue home. As the family moved homes over the years, the event moved with them until they found its current home at Fiddle Park in 2015.

Last year, the Little family celebrated the 30th anniversary of the Halloween attraction, which saw a historic number of attendees at the event with over 3,000 visitors.

As they enter a new decade for Haunt in the Park, the Little family is continuing to look for new ways to refresh it by changing the layout and adding new sections. The latest addition to the attraction was the Little Luck Mining Company in 2023, which joined the existing areas that included the butcher shop, swamp, Old English Street, and corn maze.

This year, the goal of the Haunt in the Park layout is to meld the different sections in a way that creates a "fully immersive experience".

"You will very much feel like you are being transported into another town," said Little.

Building the Halloween-themed attraction takes around four weeks and roughly 1,000 hours of labour from the family members and volunteers. On the nights of the haunts, more than 60 volunteers, consisting of family, neighbours, students and community members, dress up in characters to bring out screams and laughter for the community.

New exhibit at Town Hall features portraits of influential women

Shelburne residents can see an array of portraits of influential women and share the influential women they'd like to see drawn in a new exhibit at the Shelburne Town Hall Art Gallery.

Local artist Alicia Janssen-Thayer is sharing her works of art in a new exhibit, titled "In Our Eyes," at the Shelburne Town Hall Art Gallery until Oct. 25.

The exhibit features more than 40 pieces of work from Janssen-Thayer's collection including portraits of influential women, her perspective on nature, and beauty standards. The portraits of influential women include Cher, Avril Lavigne, Britney Spears, Janis Joplin, and Marilyn Monroe.

The inspiration behind the exhibit comes from Women's History Month, which celebrates women and girls from past and present, who are contributing to a better more inclusive Canada.

October is marked as Women's History Month in Canada.

"There's a lot of standards that society puts on women and I don't always agree with them, so this is where [the exhibit] stemmed from," explained Janssen-Thayer. "It's a mixture of influential women in my eyes and other people's eyes as well as sort of how I see the world."

At a young age, Janssen-Thayer developed a passion for drawing and painting, but recalled naysayers telling her she was 'no good'.

In an effort to prove them wrong, Jans-

sen-Thayer attended the Haliburton School of Art and Design at Fleming College where she studied visual and creative arts with a specialization in moving image design. In her paintings and drawings, she works mostly with acrylics, graphite and charcoal, and has recently expanded to adding ink to create more depth in her portraits.

"Now I do portraits for my own sake, not to prove it to anybody," said Janssen-Thayer.

Her favourite piece in the collection is a portrait of iconic country singer Dolly Parton, which is on display on the lower level of Town Hall.

"It's the one I'm most proud of, it has the most depth and my most accomplished piece of realism," said Janssen-Thayer.

As part of the exhibit and her hopes to expand it with more pieces, Janssen-Thayer is

looking to involve the community in her artwork by encouraging visitors of the exhibit to share influential women they think she should draw next. Visitors are able to share their input by submitting a name in a mason jar located at the exhibit.

"It's about attracting more people to see that they can be a part of other people's artwork and for those who might feel less creative or artsy that they can have a contribution; it feels like we're all doing it together," said Janssen-Thayer. "I don't want it to just be women who I think are influential, but from all walk of life."

The "In Our Eyes" exhibit will be on display at the Shelburne Town Hall Art Gallery until Oct. 25 and is open to the public Monday to Friday between 8:30 a.m. and 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

"When you see it on the event night, where people are lined up, they're looking forward to the Haunt, they're laughing or reminiscing about a scare on the way back to their car; it makes it all worthwhile," said Little. "That feeling is what we strive for. You made it a moment for everyone to remember until the next year."

With three decades of creating scares and three generations of volunteers, Haunt in the Park has grown into the festival-fabric of the community.

"Volunteering isn't just how you give back to a community, it's how you create one. We all live here in Shelburne because we're looking for that community and small-town feel. Taking part in events like this is how we establish and keep that feeling; where we recognize each other, support each other, and can enjoy some good memories together," said Little.

As they do each year, the Haunt in the Park will be collecting donations for the Shelburne Food Bank, Shepherd's Cupboard. The event accepts non-perishable food items, cash donations and electronic donations for those who don't carry physical money.

Last year, the Little family was able to raise 2,200 pounds of food and \$2,500 to donate to the Shelburne Food Bank.

"We sincerely hope to break that record this year, especially with the food banks struggling everywhere, we want to make sure we can do as much as we possibly can," said Little.

The Haunt in the Park will also be hosting two events for local youth: a Mini-Boo from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Oct. 26 and a dance party at Centre Dufferin Recreation Complex (CDRC) on Oct. 25 from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. for ages 7 to 13. Tickets for the dance cost \$15 and can be purchased at www.party-rockers.ca.

Nearly 15,000 unmarked cigarettes seized at RIDE spot check in Shelburne

As a result of a Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere RIDE program conducted in Shelburne, Dufferin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers charged a Mississauga man with being in possession of a large quantity of unmarked cigarettes.

Death to who?

"Death to America!"

The first time I heard this catchy slogan was probably during the days before and after the Iranian Revolution.

I'm not sure what this is really supposed to mean. In a region where killing is a national pastime, calling for the death of an entire nation is rather meaningless.

I guess it means they don't like the U.S. for being a successful country.

After all, the Iranian revolution achieved its goal – they had a revolution and turned a modern, advanced country, into a backward nation full of fear and oppression, and a way of thinking that should have ended in the Middle Ages.

So, I guess 'death to America' means they don't like success, freedom, an elected government, and the ability to determine one's own future.

I have a neighbour who arrived in Canada several years ago with his wife, from a South American country. The country he comes from is one that has never achieved much economic success. Corruption is everywhere.

He has fully embraced Canadian life. He works hard, appreciates the freedom, and appreciates the fact that he doesn't have to bribe the police after being pulled over for a

non-existent infraction. He's very proud to be living here and offering his family better opportunities.

He told me that one thing he can't stand is the fact that some of his fellow ex-patriots have arrived in Canada, and for some reason, want to bring their same style of living here.

Why, he asks, would you come here, and try to bring the same corrupt practices you left your country for in the first place? It makes no sense.

But this happens all the time.

There was a rally in Vancouver recently, where the leader yelled cries of 'death to Canada, death to the United States, and death to Israel.'

This bunch of creeps were dressed in the garb of a terrorist organization – an organization that uses murder, intimidation and sexual assault to terrorize the public.

This bunch also burned a Canadian flag. What a disrespectful thing to do – to burn the symbol of the nation you live in that has offered you a good life and security.

What bunch of creeps would do this?

Police are 'investigating' the incident, which means they are doing nothing to stop this type of behaviour.

People have been arrested on 'hate

speech' charges, for using racial slurs, or telling a joke, but calling for the murder of Canadians requires an 'investigation.'

If the people leading this rally were actual Canadians, they should be ashamed of themselves. They should be charged with making threats and hate crimes.

If they are not Canadian citizens, they should be arrested and deported to the backwards country they came from where they can enjoy their daily dose of murder and terror.

This type of behaviour doesn't make people take note of your cause – it makes people think you're a danger to society, their neighbourhoods, and their families.

In the past several weeks, a father and son duo have been arrested on terror charges for planning an attack on the public with an axe and a machete. One of those idiots was actually a Canadian citizen.

Just this past week, it was revealed that two men, who are brothers, who had been convicted in the U.S. of illegally helping Iran evade sanctions, moved to Ontario and legally changed their names. This was done for the purpose of creating a false identity and living here. This was also done while they were still serving out part of their sentences. This alone needs more explaining,

and the names were changed while the government was trying to deport one of the men.

The federal government is unwilling or unable to protect our country from threats by people who come here with bad intentions.

The federal government has to tighten the process by which people are allowed to be here. It also needs to re-examine the path to citizenship for people who arrive on our shores.

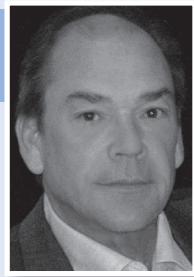
Once again, they are thinking about another airlift of Canadian citizens in Lebanon – of which there are thousands.

Remigration

'Remigration': the word had a harmless origin, as a term academics used to describe the phenomenon of migrants who failed to thrive in their new home and decided to go back to their birth country.

Then, about 10 years ago, French nationalists and racists started using it to mean forcible repatriation of legal immigrants. However, it didn't catch on beyond the narrow circle of conspiracy theorists who subscribed to the 'great replacement' myth (the paranoid belief that there is a systematic plot to replace white people with non-white immigrants).

This year the term achieved lift-off, especially in the German-speaking parts of Europe. First the far-right 'Alternative for Germany' party (AfD) openly debated the policy of 'remigration' at a conference in Potsdam last winter. And last month the Freedom Party, which bluntly calls for the expulsion of immigrants, won the Austrian election.

The AfD ranks second in popularity in German opinion polls, but if there were an election today none of the many other parties in the fragmented German political scene would make a coalition with it.

Moreover, its support comes mainly from former east Germans who effectively lived under Russian rule for 45 years after the Second World War and have no tradition of living with immigrants. Before that they voted for Adolf Hitler in the fateful 1933 election – but western Germany has more than three times as many people, and very few of them vote AfD.

Austria has only a tenth of Germany's population, but it was Hitler's birthplace and what eventually became the Freedom Party was founded in 1956 by ex-Nazis including former SS officers. It is Austria's biggest party after this election, but with only 29 per cent of the seats in Parliament it needs to find coalition partners.

That may not be easy, especially if the

Freedom Party insists that its leader, Herbert Kickl, becomes the prime minister. (Party members call him 'Volkskanzler,' Hitler's old title.)

Under Kickl, the Freedom Party wants to add a clause to the constitution saying that Austria must protect itself against the European Union, the World Health Organization and the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Freedom's key offer is to withdraw citizenship from refugees who fail to integrate and simply to abolish the right to asylum. This may be extreme enough to force the other parties into a clumsy anti-Kickl coalition, but even if he becomes prime minister the heavens will not fall.

The Freedom Party has already served in two previous coalition governments, and no drastic changes ensued. Most Austrians still think EU membership is too valuable to give up, and EU rules forbid the anti-democratic measures Kickl seeks. For the moment, at least, Austria remains a law-abiding country.

Indeed, this equation still restrains all the hard-right parties in the EU. Even Viktor Orbán's explicitly anti-EU regime in post-democratic Hungary does not quit the EU, although it regularly condemns it. The notion of enforced 'remigration' has become common currency in right-wing discourse in Europe, but it is still just talk.

The real threat to this status quo is global warming. The far right may not believe in climate change, but it may deliver them to power nevertheless. As the floods, landslides, heatwaves and droughts get more

extreme in Africa and the Middle East, a human wave of climate refugees will start moving towards the EU's southern and eastern borders.

At least one billion people live within reach of those borders by road or by sea. That's twice as many as live within the EU, and almost all of them will be experiencing more brutal weather than the relatively fortunate Europeans. If only one in a 100 of those people decide to seek refuge in the European Union, that's 10 million people banging on the door.

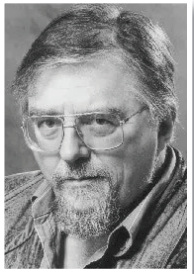
But it's not a door. Even now, long tracts of the EU's external borders are fenced and guarded, while the sea frontiers are patrolled by ships whose unwritten task is to stop would-be migrants in boats even if some of them die as a result.

It is not widely understood that Europe's borders with North Africa and Western Asia are already policed much more ruthlessly than the southern borders of the United States or the even the northern sea frontiers of Australia. This will only get more severe as the climate gets more extreme.

'Remigration' is just a symptom. One day, probably within a decade or so, Herbert Kickl's loose talk about 'Festung Europa' (Fortress Europe) will become a reality.

The only way to avert that is by huge and rapid cuts in emissions plus geoengineering measures to hold the heat down. And how likely is that?



The Small Town Big Ideas event series is set to welcome its first guest in a new season of speakers.

Author and journalist Elizabeth Renzetti will be a featured guest speaker at the Museum of Dufferin (MoD) on Oct. 30 at 7 p.m., discussing the launch of her latest book, *What She Said: Conversation About Equality*.

What She Said: Conversation About Equality. The book looks at how the fight for women's rights was supposed to be settled but continues to be an ongoing issue for women, non-binary and transgender individuals. Through her writing, Renzetti draws from her own life story and years of working as a journalist at the *Globe and Mail*, where her columns followed the women's rights movement.

"[What She Said] is about the idea that we are nowhere near parity or equality between the genders and, in fact, in many parts of the world, women's rights are being rolled back," explained Renzetti.

In *What She Said*, Renzetti explores women's rights from a wide range of areas including; the use of non-disclosure agreements to silence victims of sexual harassment and assault; the disparity of pay, wealth, and savings; imbalanced burden of care; intimate partner and domestic violence, and inadequate access to health care and reproductive justice.

"I wanted to highlight certain areas that women and men could recognize because they touch on people's daily lives and were relevant to the lives of Canadians," said Renzetti.

Renzetti is a former columnist for the *Globe and Mail*, where she wrote a popular opinion column and feature stories. In 2020 and 2023 she won the Landsberg Award for reporting on gender issues.

Renzetti has released two books in 2024: *Bury the Lead*, a mystery novel co-written with Kate Hilton, and her work of non-fiction about gender equality called, *What She Said: Conversation About Equality*.

Coming off the recent publication of her new book, Renzetti will be the first guest in the second season of the Small Town Big

Ideas speaker series hosted by local organization, CanHist.

Speaking with the Free Press, Renzetti noted the importance of holding conversations about gender equality, particularly in rural communities.

"The issues facing women in terms of equality, affect them no matter where they live. We can look at the pay gap or the disparity in political leadership or the amount of violence women face," said Renzetti. "These issues are important to women, no matter where they live."

While the book focuses closely on women's issues from different perspectives and scenarios, Renzetti said the conversation at her event is for everyone – including men.

"It's for your granny, your daughter, your husband and friends; I really think it's for everybody," said Renzetti. "We've kind of been talking at each other in an echo chamber, so I really hope that this event will be a conversation. When we have civil, open-minded conversations with each other, that's where we come to understand each other and kind of recognize each other."

Person shot during armed robbery at gas station dies from injuries

Dufferin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers has elevated an armed robbery that occurred at a gas station in Amaranth to a homicide investigation.

Officers from the Dufferin OPP Detachment responded to a report of an armed robbery at a gas station on County Road 109 on Oct. 7, at approximately 11:40 p.m. A masked individual discharged a firearm during the robbery and a victim sustained a life-threatening injury. The victim was transported by Air Ornge to a Toronto area trauma centre.

The victim has been identified as Mehak-

deep Singh, a 25-year-old from Amaranth and on Oct. 10, Mehakdeep succumbed to his injuries and was pronounced deceased.

The individual responsible for the homicide was wearing a dark-coloured, three-quarter length winter jacket with a fur hood, black pants, black shoes, and a blue medical mask.

The investigation is ongoing by the Dufferin OPP Crime Unit under the direction of the Criminal Investigation Branch, with assistance from the OPP Emergency Response Unit, OPP Canine Unit, in conjunction with the Office of the Chief Coroner and the Ont-

tario Forensic Pathology Service.

The OPP is warning the public to not approach the suspected individual or engage with them because a firearm was involved in the incident. Instead, call 9-1-1 immediately to advise police of the suspects whereabouts.

The OPP is asking anyone in the area to check, save and secure any potential video evidence from devices at their homes or business between Oct. 7 at 11:15 p.m. and Oct. 8 at 12 a.m. Anyone with information regarding this investigation is asked to contact the OPP at 1-888-310-1122. You can also provide

information anonymously by contacting Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477).

When you contact Crime Stoppers, you stay anonymous, you never have to testify, and you could receive a cash reward of up to \$2,000 upon an arrest.

Videos of the individual entering and leaving the gas station are on the OPP Central Region's Facebook, Instagram and Twitter (X) pages.

Dundalk man registers three times over legal limit in downtown Shelburne

Dufferin Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers recently charged a Dundalk man with impaired driving after registering three times over the legal limit of alcohol at a traffic stop.

Dufferin OPP officers were conducting traffic enforcement in the area of Main Street and Owen Sound Street in Shelburne on Oct.

12, at approximately 1:45 a.m., when they noticed a vehicle wasn't staying in its lane.

The officers conducted a traffic stop and after a brief conversation, they were led into an impaired driving investigation.

As a result of the investigation, Mark Cope, a 34-year-old man from Dundalk, has been charged with:

- Operation while impaired - blood alcohol concentration (80 plus)
- Drive motor vehicle - no licence
- Operation while impaired - alcohol and drugs
- Fail to surrender insurance card
- Fail to surrender permit for motor vehicle

The accused individual is scheduled to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Orangeville.

Cope's driver's licence has been suspended 90 days, and their vehicle has been impounded for seven days.

None of the listed charges have been proven in court.

Nearly 300 people dead this year from mostly preventable collisions on OPP patrolled roadways

So far this year, almost 300 people have died on highways and roads patrolled by the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP).

The vast majority of the road incidents that have tragically ended the lives of drivers, passengers, pedestrians and other road users were preventable and attributed to poor and careless actions or behaviours.

Deaths linked to driver inattention are up 40 per cent over this time last year, with speeding,

impaired driving and seatbelt non-compliance among other factors contributing to the preventable loss of life in 2024.

Cyclists and pedestrians have been particularly at risk this year, with fatalities in these two road user classes up 100 per cent and 82 per cent respectively over this time last year. Motorcyclist deaths are also up significantly, marking a 41 per cent increase.

In its latest efforts to reduce the number

of deaths and injuries on roads, the OPP is joined police services across Canada over the Thanksgiving long weekend for Operation Impact.

During the annual traffic safety campaign, officers collectively targeted motorists who speed, drive distracted, impaired or fatigued, as well as drivers/passengers who are not buckled up or do not have children/toddlers safely restrained in appropriate child car

booster seats.

"The motoring public is reminded that keeping roads safe is a shared responsibility and that every citizen has the right to make it to and from their destination safely," said Central Region OPP in a press release.

Operation Impact is led by the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police under the leadership of its Traffic Safety Committee, in support of Canada's Road Safety Strategy 2025.

The County of Dufferin recently issued information for the public regarding the upcoming hunting seasons in the Dufferin County Forest.

Hunting of White-tailed deer with bows began Oct. 1 and ends Nov. 3. This type of hunting resumes from Nov. 9 to Dec. 1, and again from Dec. 7 to 31.

White-tailed deer with a shotgun runs Nov. 4 to 8 and Dec. 2 to 6.

For wild turkey hunting with bows, the season runs from Oct. 1 to Oct. 31.

Wild turkey hunting with a shotgun runs from Oct. 15 to 27.

"During these periods, it is anticipated that

hunters will be actively using various forest tracts," said the County of Dufferin in a press release. "All visitors are advised to exercise caution and to wear bright-coloured clothing to ensure visibility and safety while enjoying the Forest."

Please note that hunting is always prohibited in the north portion of Amaranth, Hockley, Leening, Levitt, Little, Main, Mono, Thomson and River Road.

Anyone who witnesses activity that violates the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act is encouraged to report it to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry by phone at 1-877-847-7667 (877-TIPS-MNR).

Local fitness trainer qualifies for her third Boston Marathon

Long-distance running is an activity that requires physical conditioning, determination, and mental preparedness.

Hannah Sine, owner of Shelburne's Towne Fitness, has what it takes to run the long distances.

Sine qualified to run in the Boston Marathon in Boston, Massachusetts, which takes place on April 21, 2025. She will join 25,000 other long-distance runners from over 50 countries to participate in one of the best-known, and most prestigious long-distance races in the world.

Running for 12 years, Sine began her long-distance running journey later in life than most people. She has always been active and played sports, then started running and enjoyed the sport, as well as the feeling of satisfaction when completing a race.

Sine is no beginner in long-distance runs. She has competed in the Boston Marathon two times – in 2016 and 2018 – and completed a 100 km run in Australia.

"To qualify, you're given a period of time in which you need to run a race," Sine said. "It has to be a sanctioned qualifier, so when you sign up for a race you have to make sure it's sanctioned by the Boston Marathon Association or the Boston Athletic Association. Each age group is given a specific time in which they have to run the race in, in order to apply for the Boston Marathon. Once you get your time, they open the window in September and they announce if you have a qualifying time, and you can apply. For my age group, I had to qualify with a time under four hours, five minutes."

Sine ran a marathon in Georgina and finished with a time of 3 hours 51 minutes 41 seconds.

Training for a marathon is a huge undertaking starting weeks before an event. Sine does everything from running to dry land training and watching what she eats.

"During a marathon cycle, we run from five to six days a week," Sine explained.

Sine has a knee injury so she trains in a way that minimizes the impact on that knee. During training, she runs on pavement because the actual race takes place on pavement.

"During training, you try and emulate what you are going to do on race day," Sine said. "I knew the marathon isn't going to be on hilly terrain so I didn't have to train on hills. I had to train to be consistent."

Sine is proud to be older than the typical marathon runner.

"I ran my first Boston Marathon when I was 50," Sine said. "This will be my third one and I'll be 58 when I run it."

To avoid mass confusion when 25,000 peo-

ple start the same race, the elite world-class runners start at the head of the pack. Every runner has a chip in their bib that records when they leave the start line and when they cross the finish so everyone is electronically timed down to the second.


Sine first began running for cathartic reasons, however, her husband realized her potential and encouraged her to work harder and suggested if she could get her time down, she could qualify for the Boston Marathon.

The marathon will be a grueling test of physical fitness, determination, and mental preparation.

severe weather events, chemical incidents and other emergencies, residents may be forced to evacuate their homes. Shelter volunteers play a vital role by providing a safe and welcoming environment where people can access shelter, meals, clothing and other immediate needs.

Where are volunteers be needed?

Every municipality in Dufferin County has designated shelter sites and volunteers

will generally be assigned to a location close to their home.

During major events, volunteers may be asked to assist in other municipalities on a voluntary basis.

When is support needed?

The need for shel-

ter volunteers can arise at any time due to severe weather, fires and chemical spills or evacuations.

Why volunteer?

By volunteering, you will help emergency services focus on the incident at hand, while ensuring that those affected receive the immediate care they need. Your efforts will help protect vulnerable residents and bring the community together in a time of need.

How to get involved?

All volunteers will receive thorough training. Each municipality in Dufferin County is equipped with disaster trailers that can supply a 50-person shelter and local municipalities will maintain a list of volunteers to call upon when necessary.
